blacken	Burn slightly and superficially so as to affect color. <i>Stone blackened by the soot of ages.</i>

blur	Make unclear indistinct or blurred. <i>In front of him the page blurred.</i>
cloud over	Make less visible or unclear.
darken	Make or become dark or darker. <i>His mood darkened.</i>
dip	Dip into a liquid while eating. <i>I had to dip into my savings to buy him this present.</i>
dull	Make or become dull or less intense. <i>Time dulls the memory.</i>
fade	Become feeble. <i>The scene begins to fade.</i>
grow dark	Become attached by or as if by the process of growth.
grow dim	Come into existence; take on form or shape.
grow faint	Become larger, greater, or bigger; expand or gain.
grow feeble	Come into existence; take on form or shape.
grow leaden	Cultivate by growing, often involving improvements by means of agricultural techniques.
lower	Make lower or quieter.
lower	Move something or somebody to a lower position. <i>Lower a rating.</i>
slur	Mark notes with a slur. <i>The pianist slurred the most beautiful passage in the sonata.</i>
turn down	Change to the contrary.

brainless	Stupid; very foolish. <i>A brainless bimbo.</i>
confused	Mentally confused unable to think with clarity or act intelligently. <i>Reports about the incident were rather confused.</i>
dark	Of a person having dark skin hair or eyes. <i>Dark as the inside of a black cat.</i>
darkish	Marked by difficulty of style or expression. <i>Darkish red.</i>
dense	Hard to pass through because of dense growth. <i>She made her way through the dense undergrowth.</i>
depressing	Causing sad feelings of gloom and inadequacy. <i>The mortgage rate increase will have a depressing effect on the housing market.</i>
dimmed	Lacking clarity or distinctness. <i>The dimmed houselights brought a hush of anticipation.</i>
dingy	Causing dejection. <i>A dingy room.</i>
discouraging	Expressing disapproval. <i>Where never is heard a discouraging word.</i>
disheartening	Destructive of morale and self-reliance. <i>Her death is particularly disheartening because it was preventable.</i>
dismal	Pitifully or disgracefully bad. <i>The dismal weather made the late afternoon seem like evening.</i>
dispiriting	Causing someone to lose enthusiasm and hope; disheartening. <i>It was a dispiriting occasion.</i>
doltish	Heavy and dull and stupid. <i>A doltish character.</i>
dull	Lacking brightness, vividness, or sheen. <i>There was a dull pain in his lower jaw.</i>
dumb	Slow to learn or understand; lacking intellectual acuity- Thackeray. <i>A dumb question.</i>
dusky	Used in names of animals with dark coloration e g dusky dolphin dusky warbler. <i>The dusky night rides down the sky And ushers in the morn.</i>
empty-headed	Lacking seriousness; given to frivolity.

faint	(of a sight, smell, or sound) barely perceptible. <i>Faint</i> resistance.
feeble	Lacking bodily or muscular strength or vitality. A <i>feeble</i> excuse.
flat	Flattened laterally along the whole length e.g. certain leafstalks or flatfishes. <i>Flat</i> wall paint.
foggy	Unable to think clearly; confused. A dark and <i>foggy</i> night.
foolish	Having or revealing stupidity. He was <i>foolish</i> enough to confide in her.
fuzzy	(of a person or the mind) unable to think clearly; confused. That <i>fuzzy</i> line between right and wrong.
gloomy	Depressingly dark. A dark <i>gloomy</i> day.
half-witted	Retarded in intellectual development.
hazy	Indistinct or hazy in outline. School leavers were often <i>hazy</i> about employment.
idiotic	Having a mental age of three to seven years. I was able to hum its <i>idiotic</i> theme tune.
ignorant	Angry or quick-tempered. He was completely <i>ignorant</i> of the circumstances.
ill-defined	Poorly stated or described.
imbecile	Having a mental age of three to seven years. Try not to make <i>imbecile</i> remarks.
imbecilic	Having a mental age of three to seven years.
imperceptible	Impossible or difficult to perceive by the mind or senses. An <i>imperceptible</i> drop in temperature.
imperfect	(of a tense) denoting a past action in progress but not completed at the time in question. Drainage here is <i>imperfect</i> .
imprecise	Lacking exactness and accuracy of expression or detail. The witness could give only vague and <i>imprecise</i> descriptions.
indistinct	Not clear or sharply defined. <i>Indistinct</i> shapes in the gloom.
lustreless	Not bright or shiny; dull. Her uncombed <i>lustreless</i> black hair.

<u>mindless</u>	Not marked by the use of reason. <i>Mindless violence.</i>
moronic	Having a mental age of between eight and twelve years. <i>Television s latest moronic soap opera.</i>
<u>murky</u>	Obscure or morally questionable. <i>Murky rooms lit by smoke blackened lamps.</i>
muted	Being or made softer or less loud or clear. <i>Muted anger.</i>
nebulous	Lacking definition or definite content. <i>Nebulous reasons.</i>
<u>obscure</u>	Not clearly understood or expressed-Anatole Broyard- P.A.So. <i>An obscure village.</i>
obscured	Not drawing attention.
obtuse	Difficult to understand, especially deliberately so. <i>It had strange obtuse teeth.</i>
<u>pale</u>	Very light colored; highly diluted with white. <i>The pale or wan stars.</i>
<u>remote</u>	Denoting a device which can only be accessed by means of a network. <i>A remote contingency.</i>
shadowy	Of uncertain identity or nature. <i>Strange fancies of unreal and shadowy worlds.</i>
simple-minded	Lacking mental capacity and subtlety.
<u>sketchy</u>	Not thorough or detailed. <i>A sketchy neighbourhood.</i>
slow	Of a sports field or ground likely to make the ball bounce or run slowly or to prevent competitors from travelling fast. <i>He was slow in reacting to the news.</i>
slow-witted	Retarded in intellectual development.
soft	Used chiefly as a direction or description in music soft in a quiet subdued tone. <i>Her hair felt very soft.</i>
sombre	Having or conveying a feeling of deep seriousness and sadness. <i>He looked at her with a sombre expression.</i>
subdued	In a softened tone. <i>I felt strangely subdued as I drove home.</i>
<u>unclear</u>	Not clear to the mind. <i>Users are still unclear about what middleware does.</i>

unfavourable	Expressing or showing a lack of approval or support. <i>Single mothers are often the target of unfavourable press attention.</i>
<u>unintelligent</u>	Having or showing a low level of intelligence. <i>A dull job with lazy and unintelligent co workers.</i>
unpromising	Unlikely to bring about favorable results or enjoyment. <i>Music for unpromising combinations of instruments.</i>
vacuous	Devoid of intelligence. <i>Vacuous comments.</i>
<u>vague</u>	Thinking or communicating in an unfocused or imprecise way. <i>Vague feelings of sadness.</i>
<u>vapid</u>	Lacking taste or flavor or tang. <i>A bunch of vapid schoolgirls.</i>
<u>weak</u>	Relating to or denoting the weakest of the known kinds of force between particles which acts only at distances less than about 10 cm is very much weaker than the electromagnetic and the strong interactions and conserves neither strangeness parity nor isospin. <i>A weak president.</i>
wispy	(of hair, threads, smoke, etc.) fine; feathery. <i>A few wispy memories of childhood.</i>
witless	Lacking sense or understanding or judgment. <i>He was scared witless.</i>

<u>blurry</u>	Indistinct or hazy in outline. <i>Video projectors provided extremely blurry images.</i>
<u>cave</u>	Hollow out as if making a cave or opening. <i>They say they cave for the adventure challenge and physical exercise.</i>
<u>cloudy</u>	Uncertain; unclear. <i>A very grey cloudy day.</i>

dark	Used of color having a dark hue. <i>Dark eyes.</i>
darkling	Growing dark or characterized by darkness. <i>The darkling sky.</i>
darkness	An unenlightened state. <i>He moved off into the darkness.</i>
dusky	Used in names of animals with dark coloration e g dusky dolphin dusky warbler. <i>A dusky complexion.</i>
<u>fade</u>	Gradually ceasing to be visible. <i>The ball faded toward an area left of the green.</i>
<u>faint</u>	Lacking clarity or distinctness. <i>Faint heart ne er won fair lady.</i>
<u>hazy</u>	Indistinct or hazy in outline. <i>It was a beautiful day but quite hazy.</i>
<u>inconspicuous</u>	Not clearly visible or attracting attention. <i>He pushed the string through an inconspicuous hole.</i>
indistinct	Not clearly defined or easy to perceive or understand. <i>Indistinct shapes in the gloom.</i>
murkiness	An atmosphere in which visibility is reduced because of a cloud of some substance.
<u>obfuscate</u>	Make obscure or unclear. <i>The spelling changes will deform some familiar words and obfuscate their etymological origins.</i>
<u>obscure</u>	Make obscure or unclear. <i>An impulse to go off and fight certain obscure battles of his own spirit.</i>
<u>overshadow</u>	Cast a shadow upon. <i>He was always overshadowed by his brilliant elder brother.</i>
<u>puzzling</u>	Not clear to the understanding. <i>Only one very puzzling question remains unanswered.</i>
<u>shadow</u>	Cast a shadow over. <i>The poor child was his mother s shadow.</i>
shadowy	Lacking in substance- W.A.Butler. <i>A long shadowy cobbled passage.</i>
<u>shady</u>	Unscrupulous. <i>They sprawled under a shady carob tree.</i>

subtlety	The quality or state of being subtle. <i>The textural subtlety of Degas.</i>
swarthy	Naturally having skin of a dark color. <i>Swarthy men with gleaming teeth.</i>
tenebrous	Dark and gloomy. <i>A tenebrous cave.</i>
turbid	Clouded as with sediment. <i>A turbid piece of cinema.</i>
unclear	Not obvious or definite; ambiguous. <i>Their future remains unclear.</i>
unintelligible	Hard or impossible to understand. <i>Dolphin sounds are unintelligible to humans.</i>
vague	Lacking clarity or distinctness. <i>Their descriptions of human behavior become vague dull and unclear.</i>
wispy	Lacking clarity or distinctness. <i>The sky was blue with a few wispy clouds.</i>
