Synonyms of "Din" as a noun (18 Words)

- babel** (Genesis 11:1-11) a tower built by Noah's descendants (probably in Babylon) who intended it to reach up to heaven; God foiled them by confusing their language so they could no longer understand one another.
*The potential for confusion in this **babel** of textual formats is enormous.*
- blare** A loud harsh or strident noise.
*A **blare** of trumpets.*
- blaring** A loud harsh or strident noise.
- cacophony** Loud confusing disagreeable sounds.
*A **cacophony** of deafening alarm bells.*
- [clamor](#) Loud and persistent outcry from many people.
*He ignored the **clamor** of the crowd.*
- clangour** A loud resonant repeating noise.
*He went deaf because of the **clangour** of the steam hammers.*

clash	A sports fixture (used chiefly in journalism). <i>The Euro 2000 clash between England and Germany.</i>
clatter	A continuous rattling sound as of hard objects falling or striking each other. <i>The shutters clattered against the house.</i>
commotion	Confused movement. <i>She was distracted by a commotion across the street.</i>
crash	The sudden failure of a business. <i>A car crash.</i>
fracas	Noisy quarrel. <i>The fracas was broken up by stewards.</i>
hubbub	Loud confused noise from many sources. <i>A hubbub of laughter and shouting.</i>
racket	A snowshoe resembling a racket. <i>A squash racket.</i>
ruckus	A row or commotion. <i>A child is raising a ruckus in class.</i>
ruction	The act of making a noisy disturbance. <i>If Mrs Salt catches her there ll be ructions.</i>
rumpus	A noisy disturbance; a row. <i>He caused a rumpus with his flair for troublemaking.</i>
tumult	A state of confusion or disorder. <i>A tumult of shouting and screaming broke out.</i>
uproar	Loud confused noise from many sources. <i>The room was in an uproar.</i>

- *The fans made an awful din.*



Din as a Verb

Definitions of "Din" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "din" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Instill (into a person) by constant repetition.*
- *Make a loud, unpleasant, and prolonged noise.*
- *Make (someone) learn or remember an idea by constant repetition.*
- *Make a resonant sound, like artillery.*



Synonyms of "Din" as a verb (15 Words)

- blare** Make a strident sound.
*The horns of the taxis **blared**.*
- blast** Destroy or ruin.
*Damn and **blast** this awful place.*
- boom** (of a bittern) utter its characteristic resonant cry.
*His deep voice **boomed** through the hall.*
- clamour** Utter or proclaim insistently and noisily.
*The surging crowds **clamoured** for attention.*
- clang** Make or cause to make a clang.
*The belfry still **clangs** its bell at 9 p m.*
- clatter** Fall or move with a clatter.
*Bennett **clattered** Coleman ten yards out from goal.*
- crash** Cause to crash.
*A jet **crashed** 200 yards from the school.*
- drill** Make a hole in or through something by using a drill.
*I didn't like having my teeth **drilled** but extractions were worse.*
- drive** Have certain properties when driven.
***Drive** a ball.*
- drum** Play on a drum or drums.
*I'm **drumming** you if they come I'm going.*
- hammer** Hit or beat something repeatedly with a hammer or similar object.
*Maclean was presented with a great chance but he **hammered** the ball over the bar from 10 yards.*
- implant** Provide someone or something with something by implantation.
*This idea was **implanted** in my mind by a coincidence.*
- inculcate** Teach (someone) an attitude, idea, or habit by persistent instruction.
***Inculcate** values into the young generation.*
- ingrain** Firmly fix or establish (a habit, belief, or attitude) in a person.
*They trivialize the struggle and further **ingrain** the long standing attitudes.*
- instil** Enter drop by drop.
***Instill** medication into my eye.*



Usage Examples of "Din" as a verb

- *The sound dinned irritatingly into Marian's head.*
- *He dinned the lessons into his students.*
- *A runner-up, he dinned into them, was a loser.*



Associations of "Din" (30 Words)

blare	A loud harsh or strident noise. <i>A blare of trumpets.</i>
brassy	Unrestrained by convention or propriety. <i>Audience members are tapping their feet to the brassy music of the band.</i>
brouhaha	A noisy and overexcited reaction or response to something. <i>The brouhaha over those infamous commercials.</i>
cacophonous	Involving or producing a harsh, discordant mixture of sounds. <i>The cacophonous sound of slot machines.</i>
cacophony	A harsh discordant mixture of sounds. <i>A cacophony of deafening alarm bells.</i>
<u>clamor</u>	Compel someone to do something by insistent clamoring. <i>The delegates clamored their disappointment.</i>

clamorous	Making a loud and confused noise. <i>A jostling clamorous mob.</i>
clatter	Fall or move with a clatter. <i>The shutters clattered against the house.</i>
<u>commotion</u>	The act of making a noisy disturbance. <i>A commotion of people fought for the exits.</i>
deafening	(of a noise) so loud as to make it impossible to hear anything else. <i>The music reached a deafening crescendo.</i>
disorderly	Lacking organization; untidy. <i>A disorderly pile of books.</i>
dissonance	A conflict of people's opinions or actions or characters. <i>A session full of jangling dissonances.</i>
<u>disturbance</u>	Activity that is a malfunction, intrusion, or interruption. <i>Children with learning difficulty and personality disturbance.</i>
gruff	(of a voice) rough and low in pitch. <i>Robert s gruff no nonsense approach.</i>
hubbub	A chaotic din caused by a crowd of people. <i>A hubbub of laughter and shouting.</i>
<u>jarring</u>	Causing a physical shock, jolt, or vibration. <i>The van came to a jarring halt.</i>
loud	Used chiefly as a direction or description in music loud with force. <i>Cried aloud for help.</i>
noise	Make a lot of noise. <i>Over half the magnitude of the differences came from noise in the data.</i>
<u>noisy</u>	Making or given to making a lot of noise. <i>Diesel cars can be very noisy.</i>
pandemonium	Wild and noisy disorder or confusion; uproar. <i>There was complete pandemonium everyone just panicked.</i>
racket	Hit a ball with a racket. <i>A squash racket.</i>
<u>rambunctious</u>	Uncontrollably exuberant; boisterous. <i>A rambunctious tyke.</i>
raspy	Unpleasantly harsh or grating in sound. <i>His voice was raspy from days of non stop campaigning.</i>
<u>raucous</u>	Disturbing the public peace; loud and rough. <i>Raucous youths.</i>

<u>rowdy</u>	Noisy and disorderly. Rowdy teenagers.
strident	Being sharply insistent on being heard. Strident demands.
tumult	Violent agitation. A tumult of shouting and screaming broke out.
<u>turbulence</u>	Unstable flow of a liquid or gas. The plane shuddered as it entered some turbulence .
<u>uproar</u>	Loud confused noise from many sources. The room was in an uproar .
vociferous	Expressing or characterized by vehement opinions; loud and forceful. A vociferous mob.
