Infelicitous phrasing.

inferior Of low or inferior quality.

Her social and intellectual **inferior**s.

misadventure An unfortunate incident; a mishap.

The petty misdemeanours and **misadventure**s of childhood.

mischance An unpredictable outcome that is unfortunate.

Innumerable **mischance**s might ruin the enterprise.

Of very poor quality or condition.

miserable

Their happiness made Anne feel even more miserable.

An unlucky accident.

mishap

The event passed without mishap.

neediness A state of extreme poverty.

He recognized her **neediness** but had no time to respond to it.
