<b>displeasing</b>	Causing annoyance or dissatisfaction; disagreeable. <i>It was not entirely <b>displeasing</b> to be the centre of such a drama.</i>
<b>distasteful</b>	Highly offensive; arousing aversion or disgust. <i><b>Distasteful</b> language.</i>
<b>dreadful</b>	Causing or involving great suffering, fear, or unhappiness; extremely bad or serious. <i><b>Dreadful</b> manners.</i>
<b>foul</b>	Not hit between the foul lines. <i>He walked in fair and <b>foul</b> weather.</i>
<b>frightful</b>	Extreme in degree or extent or amount or impact. <i>In a <b>frightful</b> hurry.</i>
<b>grumpy</b>	Annoyed and irritable. <i>His performance as the <b>grumpy</b> gateman.</i>
<b>hateful</b>	Characterized by malice. <i>No vice is universally as <b>hateful</b> as ingratitude.</i>
<b>horrible</b>	Causing or likely to cause horror; shocking. <i>A <b>horrible</b> massacre.</i>
<b>horrid</b>	Grossly offensive to decency or morality; causing horror. <i>A <b>horrid</b> brown colour.</i>
<b>ill-humoured</b>	Brusque and surly and forbidding.
<b>ill-natured</b>	Having an irritable and unpleasant disposition.
<b>ill-tempered</b>	Annoyed and irritable.
<b>irritable</b>	Capable of responding to stimuli. <i>The seeds have been reputed to help conditions such as <b>irritable</b> bladder.</i>
<b>nasty</b>	Disgustingly dirty; filled or smeared with offensive matter. <i>Her stories are very <b>nasty</b> full of murder and violence.</i>
<b>nauseating</b>	Causing or able to cause nausea. <i>The stench was <b>nauseating</b>.</i>
<b>objectionable</b>	Liable to objection or debate; used of something one might take exception to. <i>A vulgar and <b>objectionable</b> person.</i>
<b>obnoxious</b>	Extremely unpleasant. <i>He found her son somewhat <b>obnoxious</b>.</i>
<b>odious</b>	Extremely unpleasant; repulsive. <i>A pretty <b>odious</b> character.</i>
<b>offensive</b>	Morally offensive. <i><b>Offensive</b> odors.</i>

<b>peevish</b>	Easily irritated or annoyed. <i>A thin <b>peevish</b> voice.</i>
<b><u>petulant</u></b>	Easily irritated or annoyed. <i>A <b>petulant</b> shake of the head.</i>
<b>prickly</b>	Covered in prickles. <i>This is a <b>prickly</b> subject.</i>
<b>repellent</b>	Highly offensive; arousing aversion or disgust. <i>Water <b>repellent</b> nylon.</i>
<b>repugnant</b>	Given to stubborn resistance. <i>Morally <b>repugnant</b> customs.</i>
<b>repulsive</b>	Offensive to the mind. <i>A <b>repulsive</b> force.</i>
<b><u>revolting</u></b>	Highly offensive; arousing aversion or disgust. <i>There was a <b>revolting</b> smell that lingered in the air.</i>
<b><u>sickening</u></b>	Causing or liable to cause a feeling of nausea or disgust. <i>She hit the ground with a <b>sickening</b> thud.</i>
<b>snappish</b>	Irritable and curt. <i>She was often <b>snappish</b> with the children.</i>
<b>sulky</b>	Morose, bad-tempered, and resentful; refusing to be cooperative or cheerful. <i>She had a sultry <b>sulky</b> mouth.</i>
<b>sullen</b>	Showing a brooding ill humor. <i>A <b>sullen</b> pout.</i>
<b><u>unpalatable</u></b>	Not pleasant or acceptable to the taste or mind. <i><b>Unpalatable</b> behavior.</i>
<b><u>unpleasant</u></b>	Causing discomfort, unhappiness, or revulsion; disagreeable. <i><b>Unpleasant</b> odors.</i>
<b>unsavoury</b>	Disagreeable to taste, smell, or look at. <i>An <b>unsavoury</b> reputation.</i>
<b>unsympathetic</b>	Lacking in sympathy and kindness. <i>A job temperamentally <b>unsympathetic</b> to him.</i>
<b>vile</b>	Morally reprehensible. <i>He has a <b>vile</b> temper.</i>

<b>irritating</b>	Causing annoyance, impatience, or mild anger. <i>An <b>irritating</b> delay.</i>
<b><u>irritation</u></b>	Abnormal sensitivity to stimulation. <i>Some chemicals cause a direct <b>irritation</b> to the skin leading to dermatitis.</i>
<b>libelous</b>	(used of statements) harmful and often untrue; tending to discredit or malign.
<b>nuisance</b>	A bothersome annoying person. <i>It s a <b>nuisance</b> having all those people clomping through the house.</i>
<b>objectionable</b>	Liable to objection or debate; used of something one might take exception to. <i>Found the politician s views <b>objectionable</b>.</i>
<b><u>obnoxious</u></b>	Extremely unpleasant. <i>He found her son somewhat <b>obnoxious</b>.</i>
<b>offensive</b>	Morally offensive. <i><b>Offensive</b> odors.</i>
<b>opprobrious</b>	Expressing offensive reproach. <i><b>Opprobrious</b> remarks.</i>
<b>repellent</b>	A substance that deters insects or other pests from approaching or settling. <i>Treat brick with a silicone water <b>repellent</b>.</i>
<b>repelling</b>	Highly offensive; arousing aversion or disgust.
<b>repugnant</b>	In conflict or incompatible with. <i>Morally <b>repugnant</b> customs.</i>
<b>repulsive</b>	So extremely ugly as to be terrifying. <i>A <b>repulsive</b> force.</i>
<b>scurrilous</b>	Expressing offensive reproach. <i>A <b>scurrilous</b> attack on his integrity.</i>
<b><u>troublesome</u></b>	Difficult to deal with. <i>A <b>troublesome</b> situation.</i>
<b>trying</b>	Hard to endure. <i>It had been a very <b>trying</b> day.</i>
<b>unacceptable</b>	Used of persons or their behavior. <i><b>Unacceptable</b> behaviour.</i>

***Unpalatable** truths.*

- unsavory** Not pleasing in odor or taste.  
*An **unsavory** reputation.*
- upsetting** The shortening and thickening of the end or edge of a metal bar, wheel rim, or other object, especially by hammering or pressure when heated.

- vexing** Causing annoyance, frustration, or worry.
