abominable	Exceptionally bad or displeasing. <i>Abominable treatment of prisoners.</i>
bad-tempered	Annoyed and irritable.
crabbed	(of handwriting) very small and difficult to decipher. <i>Crabbed legal language.</i>
<u>cross</u>	Extending or lying across in a crosswise direction at right angles to the long axis. <i>He seemed to be very cross about something.</i>
curmudgeonly	Brusque and surly and forbidding. <i>His curmudgeonly temper.</i>
detestable	Unequivocally detestable. <i>Detestable vices.</i>
disgusting	Highly offensive; arousing aversion or disgust. <i>He had the most disgusting rotten teeth.</i>

displeasing	Causing annoyance or dissatisfaction; disagreeable. <i>It was not entirely displeasing to be the centre of such a drama.</i>
distasteful	Highly offensive; arousing aversion or disgust. <i>Distasteful language.</i>
dreadful	Causing or involving great suffering, fear, or unhappiness; extremely bad or serious. <i>Dreadful manners.</i>
foul	Not hit between the foul lines. <i>He walked in fair and foul weather.</i>
frightful	Extreme in degree or extent or amount or impact. <i>In a frightful hurry.</i>
grumpy	Annoyed and irritable. <i>His performance as the grumpy gateman.</i>
hateful	Characterized by malice. <i>No vice is universally as hateful as ingratitude.</i>
horrible	Causing or likely to cause horror; shocking. <i>A horrible massacre.</i>
horrid	Grossly offensive to decency or morality; causing horror. <i>A horrid brown colour.</i>
ill-humoured	Brusque and surly and forbidding.
ill-natured	Having an irritable and unpleasant disposition.
ill-tempered	Annoyed and irritable.
irritable	Capable of responding to stimuli. <i>The seeds have been reputed to help conditions such as irritable bladder.</i>
nasty	Disgustingly dirty; filled or smeared with offensive matter. <i>Her stories are very nasty full of murder and violence.</i>
nauseating	Causing or able to cause nausea. <i>The stench was nauseating.</i>
objectionable	Liable to objection or debate; used of something one might take exception to. <i>A vulgar and objectionable person.</i>
obnoxious	Extremely unpleasant. <i>He found her son somewhat obnoxious.</i>
odious	Extremely unpleasant; repulsive. <i>A pretty odious character.</i>
offensive	Morally offensive. <i>Offensive odors.</i>

peevish	Easily irritated or annoyed. <i>A thin peevish voice.</i>
<u>petulant</u>	Easily irritated or annoyed. <i>A petulant shake of the head.</i>
prickly	Covered in prickles. <i>This is a prickly subject.</i>
repellent	Highly offensive; arousing aversion or disgust. <i>Water repellent nylon.</i>
repugnant	Given to stubborn resistance. <i>Morally repugnant customs.</i>
repulsive	Offensive to the mind. <i>A repulsive force.</i>
<u>revolting</u>	Highly offensive; arousing aversion or disgust. <i>There was a revolting smell that lingered in the air.</i>
<u>sickening</u>	Causing or liable to cause a feeling of nausea or disgust. <i>She hit the ground with a sickening thud.</i>
snappish	Irritable and curt. <i>She was often snappish with the children.</i>
sulky	Morose, bad-tempered, and resentful; refusing to be cooperative or cheerful. <i>She had a sultry sulky mouth.</i>
sullen	Showing a brooding ill humor. <i>A sullen pout.</i>
<u>unpalatable</u>	Not pleasant or acceptable to the taste or mind. <i>Unpalatable behavior.</i>
<u>unpleasant</u>	Causing discomfort, unhappiness, or revulsion; disagreeable. <i>Unpleasant odors.</i>
unsavoury	Disagreeable to taste, smell, or look at. <i>An unsavoury reputation.</i>
unsympathetic	Lacking in sympathy and kindness. <i>A job temperamentally unsympathetic to him.</i>
vile	Morally reprehensible. <i>He has a vile temper.</i>

bothersome	Annoying; troublesome. <i>Most childhood stomach aches though bothersome aren't serious.</i>
detestable	Unequivocally detestable Edmund Burke. <i>Detestable vices.</i>
displeasing	Causing annoyance or dissatisfaction; disagreeable. <i>It was not entirely displeasing to be the centre of such a drama.</i>
eyesore	A thing that is very ugly, especially a building. <i>The office crumbled into an eyesore.</i>

galling	Causing annoyance or resentment; annoying. <i>It would be galling to lose your job because of a dispute with a customer.</i>
hateful	Very unpleasant. <i>That hateful arrogant woman.</i>
irritating	Causing annoyance, impatience, or mild anger. <i>An irritating delay.</i>
<u>irritation</u>	Abnormal sensitivity to stimulation. <i>Some chemicals cause a direct irritation to the skin leading to dermatitis.</i>
libelous	(used of statements) harmful and often untrue; tending to discredit or malign.
nuisance	A bothersome annoying person. <i>It s a nuisance having all those people clomping through the house.</i>
objectionable	Liable to objection or debate; used of something one might take exception to. <i>Found the politician s views objectionable.</i>
<u>obnoxious</u>	Extremely unpleasant. <i>He found her son somewhat obnoxious.</i>
offensive	Morally offensive. <i>Offensive odors.</i>
opprobrious	Expressing offensive reproach. <i>Opprobrious remarks.</i>
repellent	A substance that deters insects or other pests from approaching or settling. <i>Treat brick with a silicone water repellent.</i>
repelling	Highly offensive; arousing aversion or disgust.
repugnant	In conflict or incompatible with. <i>Morally repugnant customs.</i>
repulsive	So extremely ugly as to be terrifying. <i>A repulsive force.</i>
scurrilous	Expressing offensive reproach. <i>A scurrilous attack on his integrity.</i>
<u>troublesome</u>	Difficult to deal with. <i>A troublesome situation.</i>
trying	Hard to endure. <i>It had been a very trying day.</i>
unacceptable	Used of persons or their behavior. <i>Unacceptable behaviour.</i>

<u>uncomfortable</u>	Conducive to or feeling mental discomfort. <i>An uncomfortable silence.</i>
<u>unpalatable</u>	Not pleasant or acceptable to the taste or mind. <i>Unpalatable truths.</i>
<u>unpleasant</u>	Causing discomfort, unhappiness, or revulsion; disagreeable. <i>Unpleasant odors.</i>
<u>unsavory</u>	Not pleasing in odor or taste. <i>An unsavory reputation.</i>
upsetting	The shortening and thickening of the end or edge of a metal bar, wheel rim, or other object, especially by hammering or pressure when heated. <i>An upsetting experience.</i>
vexing	Causing annoyance, frustration, or worry. <i>It is vexing to have to admit you are wrong.</i>
