| <b>discrepancy</b>           | An illogical or surprising lack of compatibility or similarity between two or more facts.<br><i>There s a <b>discrepancy</b> between your account and his.</i>                          |
| <b>disparity</b>             | Inequality or difference in some respect.<br><i>The arrangements could lead to <b>disparity</b> of treatment between companies.</i>   |
| <b>disputation</b>           | Debate or argument.<br><i>Promoting consensus rather than <b>disputation</b>.</i>   |
| <b>dispute</b>               | A disagreement or argument.<br><i>An industrial <b>dispute</b>.</i>   |
| <b>dissension</b>            | Disagreement that leads to discord.<br><i>These issues caused bitter <b>dissension</b> in the party.</i>  |
| <b>dissent</b>               | The act of protesting a public often organized manifestation of dissent.<br><i>He was sent off for <b>dissent</b>.</i>  |
| <b>dissimilarity</b>         | The quality of being dissimilar.<br><i>The similarity or <b>dissimilarity</b> between humans and other animals.</i>   |
| <b>dissimilitude</b>         | Dissimilarity or diversity.   |
| <b>dissonance</b>            | The auditory experience of sound that lacks musical quality; sound that is a disagreeable auditory experience.<br><i>An unusual degree of <b>dissonance</b> for such choral styles.</i> |
| <b>divergence</b>            | A variation that deviates from the standard or norm.<br><i>A growing <b>divergence</b> of opinion.</i>  |
| <b>lack of agreement</b>     | The state of needing something that is absent or unavailable.   |
| <b>misunderstanding</b>      | A disagreement or quarrel.<br><i>He left the army after a slight <b>misunderstanding</b> with his commanding officer.</i>   |
| <b>quarrel</b>               | A reason for disagreement with a person, group, or principle.<br><i>We have no <b>quarrel</b> with the people of the country only with the dictator.</i>                                |
| <b>squabble</b>              | A quarrel about petty points.<br><i>Family <b>squabbles</b>.</i>  |
| <b>unlikeness</b>            | Dissimilarity evidenced by an absence of likeness.  |
| <b>variance</b>              | The quality of being subject to variation.<br><i>A zoning <b>variance</b>.</i>  |

**variation**

A deviation of a celestial body from its mean orbit or motion.  
*He makes the preparation for his **variation** with utmost care and accuracy.*

**war of words**

A legal state created by a declaration of war and ended by official declaration during which the international rules of war apply.

**wrangle**

An instance of intense argument (as in bargaining).  
*An insurance **wrangle** is holding up compensation payments.*

## Associations of "Disagreement" (30 Words)

### argument

An independent variable associated with a function or proposition and determining its value For example in the expression  $y = F(x)$  the arguments of the function  $F$  are  $x$  and  $x$  and the value is  $y$ .

*There is a strong **argument** for submitting a formal appeal.*

### **cacophony**

A loud harsh or strident noise.

*A **cacophony** of deafening alarm bells.*

### **conflict**

Be in conflict.

*The date for the match **conflicted** with a religious festival.*

### controversy

Prolonged public disagreement or heated discussion.

*The design of the building has caused **controversy**.*

### **cracked**

Used of skin roughened as a result of cold or exposure.

*The captain was screaming orders in a **cracked** baritone.*

### din

A loud, unpleasant, and prolonged noise.

*A runner up he **dinned** into them was a loser.*

### disagree

Disapprove of.

*The two approaches **disagree** about how to explain the decentralization in the 1960s and early 70s.*

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| <b>discomfit</b>            | Make (someone) feel uneasy or embarrassed.<br><i>He was not noticeably <b>discomfited</b> by her tone.</i>  |
| <b>disconcert</b>           | Disturb the composure of; unsettle.<br><i>The abrupt change of subject <b>disconcerted</b> her.</i>   |
| <b><u>discord</u></b>       | A single note dissonant with another.<br><i>The music faded in <b>discord</b>.</i>  |
| <b><u>discordant</u></b>    | (of a matched pair of subjects, especially twins) not having the same trait or disease.<br><i>The operative principle of democracy is a balance of <b>discordant</b> qualities.</i> |
| <b>discrepancy</b>          | A difference between conflicting facts or claims or opinions.<br><i>There s a <b>discrepancy</b> between your account and his.</i>  |
| <b>discrepant</b>           | Not in accord.<br><i>The reasons for these <b>discrepant</b> results are unclear.</i>   |
| <b>dissension</b>           | Disagreement that leads to discord.<br><i>These issues caused bitter <b>dissension</b> in the party.</i>  |
| <b>dissonance</b>           | Lack of agreement or harmony between people or things.<br><i>A session full of jangling <b>dissonances</b>.</i>   |
| <b>dissonant</b>            | Lacking harmony.<br><i>Irregular <b>dissonant</b> chords.</i>   |
| <b><u>divergence</u></b>    | A difference between conflicting facts or claims or opinions.<br><i>A fundamental <b>divergence</b> of attitude.</i>  |
| <b><u>divisive</u></b>      | Dissenting (especially dissenting with the majority opinion).<br><i>The highly <b>divisive</b> issue of abortion.</i>   |
| <b>factionous</b>           | Dissenting (especially dissenting with the majority opinion).<br><i>A <b>factionous</b> country.</i>  |
| <b>fight</b>                | Be engaged in a fight carry on a fight.<br><i>The team was full of <b>fight</b>.</i>  |
| <b><u>incompatible</u></b>  | (of two people) unable to live together harmoniously.<br><i>All four prototype camcorders used special tapes and were <b>incompatible</b> with each other.</i>                      |
| <b><u>inconsistency</u></b> | The relation between propositions that cannot both be true at the same time.<br><i>The <b>inconsistency</b> between his expressed attitudes and his actual behaviour.</i>           |
| <b>inharmonious</b>         | Not in harmony.<br><i>An <b>inharmonious</b> or incongruous mixture of architectural styles.</i>  |

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| <b>opposition</b> | A body of people united in opposing something.<br><i>The <b>opposition</b> between practical and poetic language.</i>                     |
| <b>quarrel</b>    | Have a disagreement over something.<br><i>She made the mistake of picking a <b>quarrel</b> with John.</i>                                 |
| <b>racket</b>     | A snowshoe resembling a racket.<br><i>A squash <b>racket</b>.</i>   |
| <b>raspy</b>      | Unpleasantly harsh or grating in sound.<br><i>His voice was <b>raspy</b> from days of non stop campaigning.</i>                           |
| <b>strife</b>     | Bitter conflict; heated often violent dissension.<br><i><b>Strife</b> within the community.</i>   |
| <b>struggle</b>   | Make forceful or violent efforts to get free of restraint or constriction.<br><i>Passengers <b>struggle</b> with bags and briefcases.</i> |
