Definitions of "Disarming" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "disarming" as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Capable of allaying hostility.*
- *(of manner or behaviour) having the effect of allaying suspicion or hostility, especially through charm.*

Synonyms of "Disarming" as an adjective (5 Words)

<u>beguiling</u>	Misleading by means of pleasant or alluring methods. <i>The voice was low and beguiling.</i>
<u>charming</u>	Very pleasant or attractive. <i>He was a charming affectionate colleague.</i>
<u>enchanting</u>	Capturing interest as if by a spell. <i>Enchanting music.</i>
likeable	(especially of a person) pleasant, friendly, and easy to like. <i>A very likeable young woman.</i>
winning	Having won. <i>A winning streak.</i>

Usage Examples of "Disarming" as an adjective

- *He gave her a disarming smile.*

Associations of "Disarming" (30 Words)

<u>armament</u>	The act of equipping with weapons in preparation for war. <i>Instruments of disarmament rather than of armament.</i>
<u>armed</u>	(used of persons or the military) characterized by having or bearing arms. <i>A lion rampant argent armed and langued azure.</i>
<u>armored</u>	Used of animals; provided with protective covering.
<u>army</u>	The army of the United States of America the agency that organizes and trains soldiers for land warfare. <i>Army officers.</i>

artillery	Large-calibre guns used in warfare on land. <i>Each corps included two regiments of field artillery.</i>
barbaric	Without civilizing influences-Margaret Meade. <i>Barbaric practices.</i>
belligerent	A nation or person engaged in war or conflict, as recognized by international law. <i>A belligerent tone.</i>
brigade	Form into a brigade. <i>The militia which was brigaded with regular formations to improve its training.</i>
brigadier	A general officer ranking below a major general.
cantonment	A military garrison or camp.
combatant	Someone who fights (or is fighting). <i>All the combatant armies went to war with machine guns.</i>
commander	A commissioned naval officer who ranks above a lieutenant commander and below a captain. <i>The commander of a paratroop regiment.</i>
conscription	Compulsory military service. <i>Conscription was extended to married men.</i>
crossfire	Gunfire from two or more directions passing through the same area. <i>The sponsors are caught in the crossfire of the battle between the world champion and his team boss.</i>
demobilize	Cease military operations. <i>Germany demanded that they demobilize within twelve hours.</i>
empire	A group of diverse companies under common ownership and run as a single organization. <i>He encouraged the Greeks in their dream of empire in Asia Minor.</i>
fighter	A high-speed military or naval airplane designed to destroy enemy aircraft in the air. <i>There ll be months of physiotherapy but medical staff say she s a fighter.</i>
invader	Someone who enters by force in order to conquer. <i>It is a country that has repelled all invaders.</i>
martial	Relating to fighting or war. <i>Martial bravery.</i>
militant	A militant reformer. <i>Militants became increasingly impatient of parliamentary manoeuvres.</i>

<u>military</u>	Characteristic of or associated with soldiers or the military. <i>He organized his shows with military precision.</i>
militia	Civilians trained as soldiers but not part of the regular army. <i>Their troops were untrained militia.</i>
munition	Supply with munitions. <i>Reserves of nuclear chemical and conventional munitions.</i>
naval	Connected with or belonging to or used in a navy. <i>A naval officer.</i>
<u>overpower</u>	Overcome, as with emotions or perceptual stimuli. <i>They were overpowered by the fumes.</i>
<u>soldier</u>	Serve as a soldier. <i>I soldiered with your father on his last four campaigns.</i>
<u>warlike</u>	Disposed towards or threatening war; hostile. <i>Warlike policies.</i>
<u>warring</u>	(of two or more people or groups) in conflict with each other. <i>Belligerent or warring nations.</i>
<u>warrior</u>	Any of a number of standing poses in yoga in which the legs are held apart and the arms are stretched outwards. <i>I really love the warrior pose it makes me feel centred and strong.</i>
weaponry	Weapons considered collectively. <i>He is in charge of some of the most sophisticated weaponry ever designed.</i>
