## Synonyms of "Disbelief" as a noun (25 Words)

<b>agnosticism</b>	Someone who is doubtful or noncommittal about something. <i><b>Agnosticism</b> holds that you can neither prove nor disprove God's existence.</i>
<b>atheism</b>	A lack of belief in the existence of God or gods.
<b>cautiousness</b>	The trait of being cautious and watchful.
<b>cynicism</b>	An inclination to believe that people are motivated purely by self-interest; scepticism. <i><b>Cynicism</b> about the future.</i>
<b>distrust</b>	The feeling that someone or something cannot be relied upon. <i>The public's <b>distrust</b> of politicians.</i>
<b>doubt</b>	A feeling of uncertainty or lack of conviction. <i>They had <b>doubts</b> that they would ever win.</i>
<b>doubtfulness</b>	Uncertainty about the truth or factuality or existence of something.
<b>dubiety</b>	The state or quality of being doubtful; uncertainty. <i>His enemies made much of the <b>dubiety</b> of his paternity.</i>
<b>dubiousness</b>	Uncertainty about the truth or factuality or existence of something. <i>The <b>dubiousness</b> of his claim.</i>
<b>godlessness</b>	The doctrine or belief that there is no God.
<b>impiety</b>	Unrighteousness by virtue of lacking respect for a god. <i>He blamed the fall of the city on the <b>impiety</b> of the people.</i>
<b>incredulity</b>	The state of being unwilling or unable to believe something. <i>He stared down the street in <b>incredulity</b>.</i>
<b>irreligion</b>	Indifference or hostility to religion, or lack of religious belief. <i>They can't allow themselves to be seen as the party of <b>irreligion</b>.</i>
<b>lack of belief</b>	The state of needing something that is absent or unavailable.
<b>lack of conviction</b>	The state of needing something that is absent or unavailable.
<b>lack of credence</b>	The state of needing something that is absent or unavailable.
<b>mistrust</b>	The trait of not trusting others. <i>The public <b>mistrust</b> of government.</i>
<b>nihilism</b>	Complete denial of all established authority and institutions.
<b>questioning</b>	A request for information. <i>The young lieutenant escorted us to the barracks for <b>questioning</b>.</i>
<b>scepticism</b>	A sceptical attitude; doubt as to the truth of something. <i>These claims were treated with <b>scepticism</b>.</i>



<b>skepticism</b>	The disbelief in any claims of ultimate knowledge. Cautious distrust. <i>She had a sneaking <b>suspicion</b> that he was laughing at her.</i>
<b>suspicion</b>	
<b>unbelief</b>	A rejection of belief. <i>The darkness of <b>unbelief</b>.</i>
<b>ungodliness</b>	Impiety by virtue of not being a godly person.
<b>wariness</b>	The trait of being cautious and watchful. <i>Her mother's <b>wariness</b> of computers.</i>



## Usage Examples of "Disbelief" as a noun

## Associations of "Disbelief" (30 Words)

<b>agnostic</b>	Relating to agnostics or agnosticism. <i>Many common file formats JPEG MP3 etc are platform <b>agnostic</b>.</i>
<b><u>amazement</u></b>	The feeling that accompanies something extremely surprising. <i>She shook her head in <b>amazement</b>.</i>
<b>atheism</b>	The doctrine or belief that there is no God.
<b><u>atheist</u></b>	Someone who does not believe in the existence of a god. <i>He is a committed <b>atheist</b>.</i>
<b><u>cynical</u></b>	Contemptuous; mocking. <i>He gave a <b>cynical</b> laugh.</i>
<b>deist</b>	Of or relating to deism.
<b><u>distrust</u></b>	The feeling that someone or something cannot be relied upon. <i>The public s <b>distrust</b> of politicians.</i>
<b><u>doubt</u></b>	Consider unlikely or have doubts about. <i>I <b>doubt</b> if anyone slept that night.</i>
<b>doubtful</b>	Feeling uncertain about something. <i>They were <b>doubtful</b> that the cord would hold.</i>

<b>dubious</b>	Morally suspect. <i>What one found uncertain the other found <b>dubious</b> or downright false.</i>
<b>freethinker</b>	A person who rejects religion.
<b>gentile</b>	Not Jewish. <i>Christians refer to themselves as <b>gentiles</b>.</i>
<b>heathen</b>	Relating to heathens. <i><b>Heathen</b> practices.</i>
<b>humanism</b>	(among some contemporary writers) a system of thought criticized as being centred on the notion of the rational, autonomous self and ignoring the conditioned nature of the individual.
<b>incredulity</b>	Doubt about the truth of something. <i>He stared down the street in <b>incredulity</b>.</i>
<b>incredulous</b>	(of a person or their manner) unwilling or unable to believe something. <i>An <b>incredulous</b> gasp.</i>
<b>infidel</b>	A person who does not acknowledge your god. <i>The <b>infidel</b> foe.</i>
<b>pessimist</b>	A person who expects the worst. <i>The <b>pessimists</b> point to ways in which life has deteriorated.</i>
<b>polytheism</b>	Belief in multiple Gods. <i>The <b>polytheism</b> of the ancient Near East.</i>
<b>proselytize</b>	Convert to another faith or religion. <i>Davis wanted to share his concept and <b>proselytize</b> his ideas.</i>
<b>questioning</b>	Showing an interest in learning new things. <i>This situation should prompt <b>questioning</b>.</i>
<b>sceptic</b>	An ancient or modern philosopher who denies the possibility of knowledge, or even rational belief, in some sphere.
<b>sceptical</b>	Not easily convinced; having doubts or reservations. <i>The public were deeply <b>sceptical</b> about some of the proposals.</i>
<b>skeptic</b>	Someone who habitually doubts accepted beliefs.
<b>skeptical</b>	Marked by or given to doubt. <i>A <b>skeptical</b> listener.</i>
<b>skepticism</b>	The disbelief in any claims of ultimate knowledge.
<b>surprise</b>	Cause to be surprised. <i>The news really <b>surprised</b> me.</i>
<b>suspicious</b>	Not as expected. <i><b>Suspicious</b> behavior.</i>

**unbelievable** Having a probability too low to inspire belief.  
***Unbelievable** or not it happened.*
