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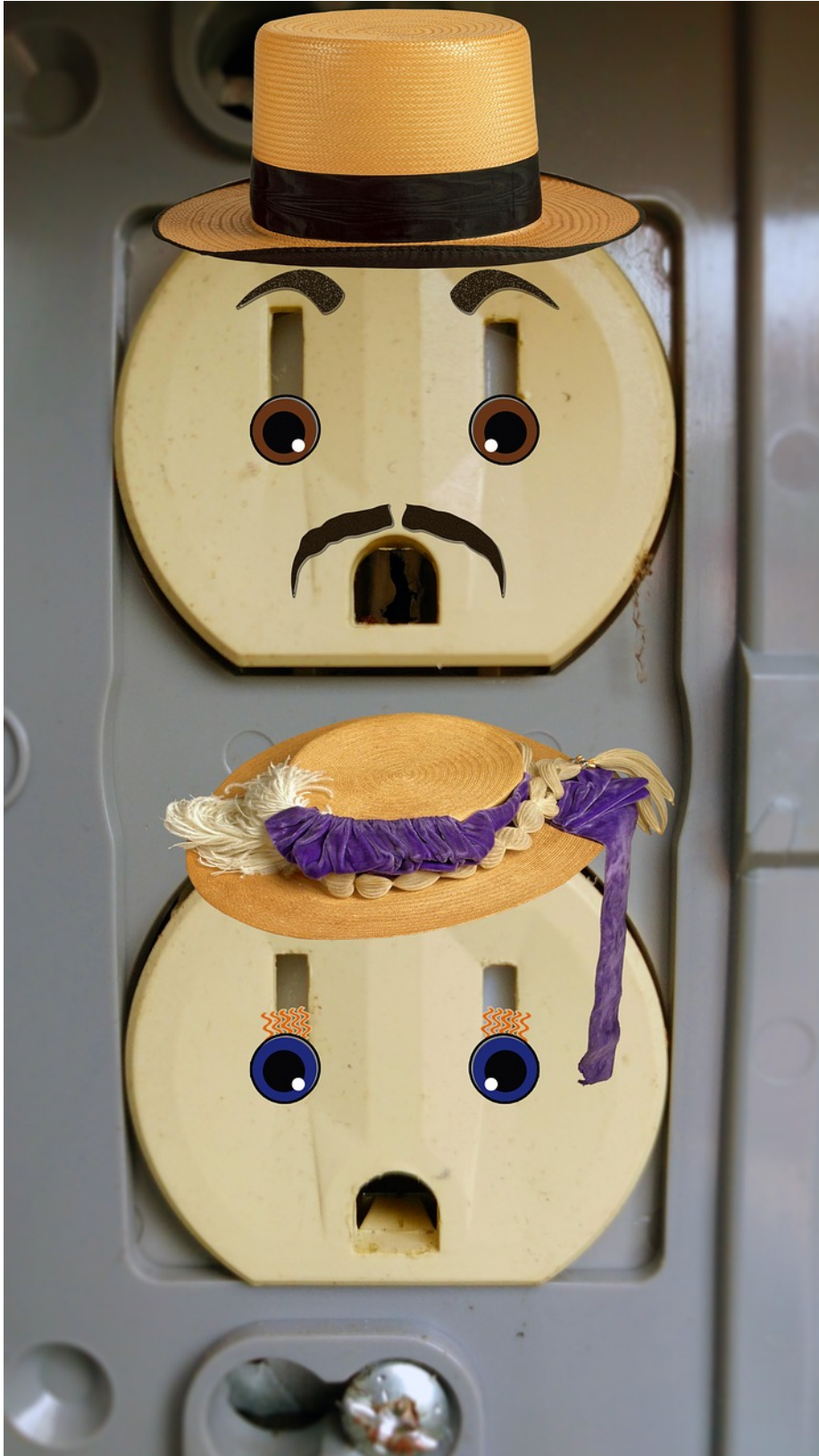

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| agnosticism | Someone who is doubtful or noncommittal about something. <i>Agnosticism holds that you can neither prove nor disprove God's existence.</i> |
| atheism | A lack of belief in the existence of God or gods. |
| cautiousness | The trait of being cautious and watchful. |
| cynicism | An inclination to believe that people are motivated purely by self-interest; scepticism. <i>Cynicism about the future.</i> |
| distrust | The feeling that someone or something cannot be relied upon. <i>The public's distrust of politicians.</i> |
| doubt | A feeling of uncertainty or lack of conviction. <i>They had doubts that they would ever win.</i> |
| doubtfulness | Uncertainty about the truth or factuality or existence of something. |
| dubiety | The state or quality of being doubtful; uncertainty. <i>His enemies made much of the dubiety of his paternity.</i> |
| dubiousness | Uncertainty about the truth or factuality or existence of something. <i>The dubiousness of his claim.</i> |
| godlessness | The doctrine or belief that there is no God. |
| impiety | Unrighteousness by virtue of lacking respect for a god. <i>He blamed the fall of the city on the impiety of the people.</i> |
| incredulity | The state of being unwilling or unable to believe something. <i>He stared down the street in incredulity.</i> |
| irreligion | Indifference or hostility to religion, or lack of religious belief. <i>They can't allow themselves to be seen as the party of irreligion.</i> |
| lack of belief | The state of needing something that is absent or unavailable. |
| lack of conviction | The state of needing something that is absent or unavailable. |
| lack of credence | The state of needing something that is absent or unavailable. |
| mistrust | The trait of not trusting others. <i>The public mistrust of government.</i> |
| nihilism | Complete denial of all established authority and institutions. |
| questioning | A request for information. <i>The young lieutenant escorted us to the barracks for questioning.</i> |
| scepticism | A sceptical attitude; doubt as to the truth of something. <i>These claims were treated with scepticism.</i> |

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| skepticism | The disbelief in any claims of ultimate knowledge. Cautious distrust. |
| suspicion | <i>She had a sneaking suspicion that he was laughing at her.</i> |
| unbelief | A rejection of belief. <i>The darkness of unbelief.</i> |
| ungodliness | Impiety by virtue of not being a godly person. |
| wariness | The trait of being cautious and watchful. <i>Her mother s wariness of computers.</i> |

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| agnostic | Relating to agnostics or agnosticism. <i>Many common file formats JPEG MP3 etc are platform agnostic.</i> |
| <u>amazement</u> | The feeling that accompanies something extremely surprising. <i>She shook her head in amazement.</i> |
| atheism | The doctrine or belief that there is no God. |
| <u>atheist</u> | Someone who does not believe in the existence of a god. <i>He is a committed atheist.</i> |
| <u>cynical</u> | Contemptuous; mocking. <i>He gave a cynical laugh.</i> |
| deist | Of or relating to deism. |
| <u>distrust</u> | The feeling that someone or something cannot be relied upon. <i>The public s distrust of politicians.</i> |
| <u>doubt</u> | Consider unlikely or have doubts about. <i>I doubt if anyone slept that night.</i> |
| doubtful | Feeling uncertain about something. <i>They were doubtful that the cord would hold.</i> |

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| dubious | Morally suspect. <i>What one found uncertain the other found dubious or downright false.</i> |
| freethinker | A person who rejects religion. |
| gentile | Not Jewish. <i>Christians refer to themselves as gentiles.</i> |
| heathen | Relating to heathens. <i>Heathen practices.</i> |
| humanism | (among some contemporary writers) a system of thought criticized as being centred on the notion of the rational, autonomous self and ignoring the conditioned nature of the individual. |
| incredulity | Doubt about the truth of something. <i>He stared down the street in incredulity.</i> |
| incredulous | (of a person or their manner) unwilling or unable to believe something. <i>An incredulous gasp.</i> |
| infidel | A person who does not acknowledge your god. <i>The infidel foe.</i> |
| pessimist | A person who expects the worst. <i>The pessimists point to ways in which life has deteriorated.</i> |
| polytheism | Belief in multiple Gods. <i>The polytheism of the ancient Near East.</i> |
| proselytize | Convert to another faith or religion. <i>Davis wanted to share his concept and proselytize his ideas.</i> |
| questioning | Showing an interest in learning new things. <i>This situation should prompt questioning.</i> |
| sceptic | An ancient or modern philosopher who denies the possibility of knowledge, or even rational belief, in some sphere. |
| sceptical | Not easily convinced; having doubts or reservations. <i>The public were deeply sceptical about some of the proposals.</i> |
| skeptic | Someone who habitually doubts accepted beliefs. |
| skeptical | Marked by or given to doubt. <i>A skeptical listener.</i> |
| skepticism | The disbelief in any claims of ultimate knowledge. |
| surprise | Cause to be surprised. <i>The news really surprised me.</i> |
| suspicious | Not as expected. <i>Suspicious behavior.</i> |
