Definitions of "Disciple" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “disciple” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *Someone who believes and helps to spread the doctrine of another.*
- *A follower or pupil of a teacher, leader, or philosopher.*
- *A personal follower of Christ during his life, especially one of the twelve Apostles.*



Synonyms of "Disciple" as a noun (8 Words)

- acolyte** An assistant or follower.
*She runs the department through a small group of **acolytes**.*
- adherent** Someone who supports a particular party, person, or set of ideas.
*He was a strong **adherent** of monetarism.*
- admirer** A person who admires; someone who esteems or respects or approves.
*He was a great **admirer** of Henry James.*
- apostle** Any important early teacher of Christianity or a Christian missionary to a people.
*Kiril and Metodije the **apostles** of the Slavs.*
- believer** An adherent of a particular religion; someone with religious faith.
*A firm **believer** that party politics has no place in local government.*
- devotee** A strong believer in a particular religion or god.
*A **devotee** of Lewis Carroll.*

Someone who travels behind or pursues another.

follower *She remains an immensely divisive figure but she has a million **followers** on Facebook.*

A priest or priestess (or consecrated worshipper) in a non-Christian religion or cult.

votary *He was a **votary** of John Keats.*



Usage Examples of "Disciple" as a noun

- *A disciple of Rousseau.*



Associations of "Disciple" (30 Words)

academy

(in England) an inner-city school which is funded by the government and sometimes also by a private individual or organization but is not controlled by the local authority.

*A police **academy**.*

admirer

A person who backs a politician or a team etc.

*He was a great **admirer** of Henry James.*

campus

The grounds of a school, hospital, or other institution.

*For the first year I had a room on **campus**.*

collegian

A member of a college, especially within a university.

education	The United States federal department that administers all federal programs dealing with education including federal aid to educational institutions and students created 1979. <i>Education is a preparation for life.</i>
<u>educator</u>	Someone who educates young people. <i>The perspective of a professional educator.</i>
emeritus	Honorably retired from assigned duties and retaining your title along with the additional title emeritus as in professor emeritus. <i>The National Gallery's director emeritus.</i>
grad	A person who has received a degree from a school (high school or college or university).
<u>graduate</u>	A person who has successfully completed a course of study or training especially a person who has been awarded an undergraduate or first academic degree. <i>Graduate a cylinder.</i>
<u>guru</u>	A recognized leader in some field or of some movement. <i>A management guru.</i>
headmaster	Presiding officer of a school.
homeroom	A classroom in which a group of students assembles daily with the same teacher before dispersing to other classes.
lecturer	A public lecturer at certain universities. <i>A senior lecturer in surgery at Leeds University.</i>
matriculate	A person who has matriculated. <i>A total of 123 boys and girls who matriculated last year were registered with his department.</i>
pedagogy	The method and practice of teaching, especially as an academic subject or theoretical concept. <i>Pedagogy is recognized as an important profession.</i>
postgraduate	A student engaged in a postgraduate course. <i>A postgraduate degree.</i>
<u>professor</u>	An associate professor or an assistant professor. <i>The professors of true religion.</i>
pupil	A person who is taught by another, especially a schoolchild or student in relation to a teacher. <i>Will you take me on as your pupil.</i>
<u>scholar</u>	A university student holding a scholarship. <i>A Hebrew scholar.</i>
schoolmaster	Any person (or institution) who acts as an educator.

semester	Half a year; a period of 6 months. <i>The opening week of Harvard s autumn semester.</i>
student	A school pupil. <i>A group of student nurses.</i>
teach	Work as a teacher. <i>He came one day each week to teach painting.</i>
<u>teacher</u>	A personified abstraction that teaches. <i>Experience is a demanding teacher.</i>
<u>tuition</u>	Teaching or instruction, especially of individual pupils or small groups. <i>Private tuition in French.</i>
tutelage	Attention and management implying responsibility for safety. <i>He felt privileged to be under the tutelage of an experienced actor.</i>
<u>tutor</u>	Be a tutor to someone give individual instruction. <i>She tutored me in Spanish.</i>
tutorship	Teaching pupils individually (usually by a tutor hired privately).
undergraduate	Denoting or relating to an undergraduate. <i>A group of Oxford undergraduates.</i>
<u>university</u>	The body of faculty and students at a university. <i>I went to university at the Sorbonne.</i>
