<b>disadvantage</b>	An unfavourable circumstance or condition that reduces the chances of success or effectiveness. <i>A major <b>disadvantage</b> is the limited nature of the data.</i>
<b>discomfiture</b>	Anxious embarrassment. <i>Many MPs are secretly enjoying his <b>discomfiture</b>.</i>
<b>discomposure</b>	The state or feeling of being disturbed or agitated; agitation. <i>She laughed to mask her <b>discomposure</b>.</i>
<b>distress</b>	A state of physical strain, especially difficulty in breathing. <i>A company in financial <b>distress</b>.</i>
<u><b>drawback</b></u>	The quality of being a hindrance. <i>He pointed out all the <b>drawbacks</b> to my plan.</i>
<b>embarrassment</b>	A person or thing causing feelings of embarrassment. <i>Her extreme views might be an <b>embarrassment</b> to the movement.</i>
<b>inconvenience</b>	The quality of not being useful or convenient. <i>The <b>inconvenience</b> of having to change trains.</i>
<u><b>irritation</b></u>	The act of troubling or annoying someone. <i>Much to my <b>irritation</b> Chris fell asleep.</i>
<u><b>malaise</b></u>	A general feeling of discomfort, illness, or unease whose exact cause is difficult to identify. <i>A general air of <b>malaise</b>.</i>
<u><b>nervousness</b></u>	A sensitive or highly strung temperament. <i>There was a trace of <b>nervousness</b> in his voice.</i>
<b>nuisance</b>	A broad legal concept including anything that disturbs the reasonable use of your property or endangers life and health or is offensive. <i>I hope you re not going to make a <b>nuisance</b> of yourself.</i>
<b>pain</b>	Emotional distress; a fundamental feeling that people try to avoid. <i>Chest <b>pains</b>.</i>
<b>perturbation</b>	A disposition that is confused or nervous and upset. <i>These shifts and swings in wildlife populations are possibly related to climatic <b>perturbations</b>.</i>

<b>problem</b>	A proposition in which something has to be constructed. <i>She and her husband are having <b>problems</b>.</i>
<b>soreness</b>	Pain in a part of one's body. <i>Stretching after exercise helps prevent muscle <b>soreness</b>.</i>
<b>stiffness</b>	The inelegance of someone stiff and unrelaxed (as by embarrassment). <i>A charming host without any touch of <b>stiffness</b> or pomposity.</i>
<b>tenderness</b>	A boat for communication between ship and shore. <i><b>Tenderness</b> for the opposite sex.</i>
<a href="#"><u>trial</u></a>	An annoying or frustrating or catastrophic event. <i>The <b>trials</b> and tribulations of married life.</i>
<b>tribulation</b>	An annoying or frustrating or catastrophic event. <i>The <b>tribulations</b> of being a megastar.</i>
<b>trouble</b>	Difficulty or problems. <i>She s not the first girl who s got herself into <b>trouble</b>.</i>

Make (someone) feel embarrassed, disconcerted, or ashamed.  
*If anything was officially done or said to him it did not **abash** him.*

<b>discompose</b>	Disturb or agitate (someone). <i>Nothing could <b>discompose</b> her.</i>
<b>disconcert</b>	Cause to feel embarrassment. <i>The abrupt change of subject <b>disconcerted</b> her.</i>
<b><u>disturb</u></b>	Interrupt the sleep, relaxation, or privacy of. <i>I ll see my patient now and we are not to be <b>disturbed</b>.</i>

<b>perturb</b>	Subject (a system, moving object, or process) to an influence tending to alter its normal or regular state or path. <i>Fundamentalists threaten to <b>perturb</b> the social order.</i>

<b>ruffle</b>	Pleat or gather into a ruffle. <i>He <b>ruffled</b> her hair affectionately.</i>
<b>take aback</b>	Lay claim to; as of an idea.
<b>unnerve</b>	Make (someone) lose courage or confidence. <i>The journey over the bridge had <b>unnerved</b> me.</i>
<b>unsettle</b>	Cause to feel anxious or uneasy; disturb. <i>The crisis has <b>unsettled</b> financial markets.</i>
<b>upset</b>	Disturb the balance or stability of. <i>The accusation <b>upset</b> her.</i>

<b>discontented</b>	Dissatisfied, especially with one's circumstances. <i>Was <b>discontented</b> with his position.</i>
<u><b>disgruntled</b></u>	In a state of sulky dissatisfaction. <i>Judges receive letters from <b>disgruntled</b> members of the public.</i>
<u><b>displeasure</b></u>	A feeling of annoyance or disapproval. <i>He started hanging around the local pubs much to the <b>displeasure</b> of his mother.</i>
<u><b>dissatisfied</b></u>	In a state of sulky dissatisfaction. <i><b>Dissatisfied</b> customers.</i>
<b>distress</b>	Bring into difficulties or distress especially financial hardship. <i>Her fingers flew to her throat in <b>distress</b>.</i>
<b>headache</b>	Something or someone that causes anxiety; a source of unhappiness. <i>She complained of a severe <b>headache</b>.</i>
<b>inconvenience</b>	To cause inconvenience or discomfort to. <i>The <b>inconvenience</b> of having to change trains.</i>
<u><b>irritation</b></u>	A sudden outburst of anger. <i>Any food produced <b>irritation</b> of the stomach.</i>
<b>itching</b>	An irritating cutaneous sensation that produces a desire to scratch.
<b>malcontent</b>	A person who is dissatisfied and rebellious. <i>The <b>malcontent</b> generals saw their role as leaders of this counter revolution.</i>
<u><b>nausea</b></u>	A feeling of loathing or disgust. <i>A wave of <b>nausea</b> engulfed him.</i>
<b>nuisance</b>	A bothersome annoying person. <i>It s a <b>nuisance</b> having all those people clomping through the house.</i>
<b>offend</b>	Break a commonly accepted rule or principle. <i>A small hard core of young criminals who <b>offend</b> again and again.</i>
<b>trouble</b>	Take the trouble to do something concern oneself. <i>My legs started to <b>trouble</b> me.</i>

<b>umbrage</b>	Shade or shadow, especially as cast by trees. <i>She took <b>umbrage</b> at his remarks.</i>
<b>unacceptable</b>	Not acceptable; not welcome. <i>A word <b>unacceptable</b> in polite society.</i>
<b>unhappy</b>	Causing discomfort. <i>The <b>unhappy</b> truth.</i>
<b>unpleasantness</b>	The state or quality of being unpleasant. <i>The recent <b>unpleasantness</b> of the weather.</i>
<b>vex</b>	Subject to prolonged examination, discussion, or deliberation. <i>The memory of the conversation still <b>vexed</b> him.</i>
<b><u>vexation</u></b>	Anger produced by some annoying irritation. <i>The <b>vexations</b> of life under canvas.</i>
<b>vexing</b>	Extremely annoying or displeasing. <i>It is <b>vexing</b> to have to admit you are wrong.</i>
