#### Definitions of "Discord" as a noun

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "discord" as a noun can have the following definitions:

- Strife resulting from a lack of agreement.
- A chord which (in conventional harmonic terms) is regarded as unpleasing or requiring resolution by another.
- Lack of harmony between notes sounding together.
- Lack of agreement or harmony.
- A single note dissonant with another.
- A harsh mixture of sounds.
- Disagreement among those expected to cooperate.
- Any interval except unison, an octave, a perfect fifth or fourth, a major or minor third and sixth, or their octaves.
- Disagreement between people.
- Lack of agreement or harmony between things.





# Synonyms of "Discord" as a noun (10 Words)

cacophony	A loud harsh or strident noise. A <b>cacophony</b> of deafening alarm bells.
conflict	A disagreement or argument about something important. This form of <b>conflict</b> is essential to Mann s writing.
discordance	A harsh mixture of sounds. Fast songs can go through slow phases and minor keys and <b>discordance</b> may be employed.
disharmony	Lack of harmony or agreement. We will become evermore a nation of social <b>disharmony</b> .
dissension	Disagreement that leads to discord. These issues caused bitter <b>dissension</b> in the party.
dissonance	Disagreeable sounds. The party faithful might be willing to put up with such <b>dissonance</b> among their candidates.



friction	The action of one surface or object rubbing against another. <i>The friction of braking.</i>
<u>hostility</u>	A hostile (very unfriendly) disposition. Their <b>hostility</b> to all outsiders.
lack of harmony The state of needing something that is absent or unavailable.	
strife	Trouble or difficulty of any kind. Decades of civil <b>strife</b> .

### **Definitions of "Discord" as a verb**

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "discord" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- (of things) be different.
- Be different from one another.
- (of people) disagree.

### Synonyms of "Discord" as a verb (2 Words)

disaccordDisagree; be at variance.<br/>This disaccords with the precise date.disagreeHave or express a different opinion.<br/>The sea crossing disagreed with her.

#### Usage Examples of "Discord" as a verb

- We discorded commonly on two points.

### Associations of "Discord" (30 Words)

<u>argument</u>	An independent variable associated with a function or proposition and determining its value For example in the expression y F x x the arguments of the function F are x and x and the value is y. <i>The editor added the argument to the poem.</i>
cacophony	A loud harsh or strident noise. A <b>cacophony</b> of deafening alarm bells.
conflict	Be in conflict. <i>Regional <b>conflict</b>s.</i>
<u>controversy</u>	A contentious speech act; a dispute where there is strong disagreement. <i>The announcement ended a protracted controversy</i> .
cracked	Informal or slang terms for mentally irregular. You must think my family are <b>cracked</b> .



<u>din</u>	Make (someone) learn or remember an idea by constant repetition. The sound <b>din</b> ned irritatingly into Marian s head.
<u>disagree</u>	Have or express a different opinion. The sea crossing <b>disagree</b> d with her.
<u>disagreement</u>	Lack of consensus or approval. There was some <b>disagreement</b> about the details.
discomfit	Make (someone) feel uneasy or embarrassed. <i>He was not noticeably <b>discomfit</b>ed by her tone.</i>
disconcert	Cause to feel embarrassment. The abrupt change of subject <b>disconcert</b> ed her.
<u>discordant</u>	Disagreeing or incongruous. The operative principle of democracy is a balance of <b>discordant</b> qualities.
discrepancy	An illogical or surprising lack of compatibility or similarity between two or more facts. <i>There s a <b>discrepancy</b> between your account and his.</i>
discrepant	Not in accord. Widely <b>discrepant</b> statements.
dispute	Compete for; strive to win. The point has been much <b>dispute</b> d.
dissension	Disagreement that leads to discord. These issues caused bitter <b>dissension</b> in the party.
dissonance	A conflict of people's opinions or actions or characters. An unusual degree of <b>dissonance</b> for such choral styles.
dissonant	Lacking harmony. Irregular <b>dissonant</b> chords.
<u>divergence</u>	The act of moving away in different direction from a common point. An angle is formed by the <b>divergence</b> of two straight lines.
<u>divisive</u>	Dissenting (especially dissenting with the majority opinion. <i>The highly <b>divisive</b> issue of abortion.</i>
factious	Dissenting (especially dissenting with the majority opinion. A <b>factious</b> country.
fight	The act of fighting any contest or struggle. Britain might have given up her <b>fight</b> against Germany.
<u>incompatible</u>	Used especially of drugs or muscles that counteract or neutralize each other's effect. All four prototype camcorders used special tapes and were <b>incompatible</b> with each other.



<u>inconsistency</u>	The quality of being inconsistent and lacking a harmonious uniformity among things or parts. The <b>inconsistency</b> between his expressed attitudes and his actual behaviour.
inharmonious	Not in harmony. An <b>inharmonious</b> or incongruous mixture of architectural styles.
<u>quarrel</u>	An arrow that is shot from a crossbow; has a head with four edges. They had a <b>quarrel</b> .
racket	Hit a ball with a racket. A squash <b>racket</b> .
squabble	A quarrel about petty points. Family <b>squabble</b> s.
strife	Trouble or difficulty of any kind. <i>Strife</i> within the community.
struggle	Be engaged in a fight; carry on a fight. Getting through the crowd was a real <b>struggle</b> .
wrestle	A wrestling bout or contest. For over a year David <b>wrestle</b> d with a guilty conscience.
