Discord as a Noun

Definitions of "Discord" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “discord” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *Strife resulting from a lack of agreement.*
- *A chord which (in conventional harmonic terms) is regarded as unpleasing or requiring resolution by another.*
- *Lack of harmony between notes sounding together.*
- *Lack of agreement or harmony.*
- *A single note dissonant with another.*
- *A harsh mixture of sounds.*
- *Disagreement among those expected to cooperate.*
- *Any interval except unison, an octave, a perfect fifth or fourth, a major or minor third and sixth, or their octaves.*
- *Disagreement between people.*
- *Lack of agreement or harmony between things.*



Synonyms of "Discord" as a noun (10 Words)

cacophony	A loud harsh or strident noise. <i>A cacophony of deafening alarm bells.</i>
conflict	A disagreement or argument about something important. <i>This form of conflict is essential to Mann's writing.</i>
discordance	A harsh mixture of sounds. <i>Fast songs can go through slow phases and minor keys and discordance may be employed.</i>
disharmony	Lack of harmony or agreement. <i>We will become evermore a nation of social disharmony.</i>
dissension	Disagreement that leads to discord. <i>These issues caused bitter dissension in the party.</i>
dissonance	Disagreeable sounds. <i>The party faithful might be willing to put up with such dissonance among their candidates.</i>

friction	The action of one surface or object rubbing against another. <i>The friction of braking.</i>
hostility	A hostile (very unfriendly) disposition. <i>Their hostility to all outsiders.</i>
lack of harmony	The state of needing something that is absent or unavailable.
strife	Trouble or difficulty of any kind. <i>Decades of civil strife.</i>



Usage Examples of "Discord" as a noun

- *A prosperous family who showed no signs of discord.*
- *The music faded in discord.*
- *The discord between indigenous and Western cultures.*



Discord as a Verb

Definitions of "Discord" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "discord" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *(of things) be different.*
- *Be different from one another.*
- *(of people) disagree.*

Synonyms of "Discord" as a verb (2 Words)

disaccord Disagree; be at variance.
*This **disaccords** with the precise date.*

disagree Have or express a different opinion.
*The sea crossing **disagreed** with her.*

Usage Examples of "Discord" as a verb

- *We discorded commonly on two points.*
- *The party's views were apt to discord with those of the leading members of the government.*

Associations of "Discord" (30 Words)

argument An independent variable associated with a function or proposition and determining its value For example in the expression $y = F(x)$ the arguments of the function F are x and x and the value is y .
*The editor added the **argument** to the poem.*

cacophony A loud harsh or strident noise.
*A **cacophony** of deafening alarm bells.*

conflict Be in conflict.
*Regional **conflicts**.*

controversy A contentious speech act; a dispute where there is strong disagreement.
*The announcement ended a protracted **controversy**.*

cracked Informal or slang terms for mentally irregular.
*You must think my family are **cracked**.*

din	Make (someone) learn or remember an idea by constant repetition. <i>The sound dinned irritatingly into Marian s head.</i>
disagree	Have or express a different opinion. <i>The sea crossing disagreed with her.</i>
disagreement	Lack of consensus or approval. <i>There was some disagreement about the details.</i>
discomfit	Make (someone) feel uneasy or embarrassed. <i>He was not noticeably discomfited by her tone.</i>
disconcert	Cause to feel embarrassment. <i>The abrupt change of subject disconcerted her.</i>
discordant	Disagreeing or incongruous. <i>The operative principle of democracy is a balance of discordant qualities.</i>
discrepancy	An illogical or surprising lack of compatibility or similarity between two or more facts. <i>There s a discrepancy between your account and his.</i>
discrepant	Not in accord. <i>Widely discrepant statements.</i>
dispute	Compete for; strive to win. <i>The point has been much disputed.</i>
dissension	Disagreement that leads to discord. <i>These issues caused bitter dissension in the party.</i>
dissonance	A conflict of people's opinions or actions or characters. <i>An unusual degree of dissonance for such choral styles.</i>
dissonant	Lacking harmony. <i>Irregular dissonant chords.</i>
divergence	The act of moving away in different direction from a common point. <i>An angle is formed by the divergence of two straight lines.</i>
divisive	Dissenting (especially dissenting with the majority opinion). <i>The highly divisive issue of abortion.</i>
factionous	Dissenting (especially dissenting with the majority opinion). <i>A factionous country.</i>
fight	The act of fighting any contest or struggle. <i>Britain might have given up her fight against Germany.</i>
incompatible	Used especially of drugs or muscles that counteract or neutralize each other's effect. <i>All four prototype camcorders used special tapes and were incompatible with each other.</i>

<u>inconsistency</u>	The quality of being inconsistent and lacking a harmonious uniformity among things or parts. <i>The inconsistency between his expressed attitudes and his actual behaviour.</i>
inharmonious	Not in harmony. <i>An inharmonious or incongruous mixture of architectural styles.</i>
<u>quarrel</u>	An arrow that is shot from a crossbow; has a head with four edges. <i>They had a quarrel.</i>
racket	Hit a ball with a racket. <i>A squash racket.</i>
squabble	A quarrel about petty points. <i>Family squabbles.</i>
strife	Trouble or difficulty of any kind. <i>Strife within the community.</i>
struggle	Be engaged in a fight; carry on a fight. <i>Getting through the crowd was a real struggle.</i>
wrestle	A wrestling bout or contest. <i>For over a year David wrestled with a guilty conscience.</i>
