## Discord as a Noun

### Definitions of "Discord" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “discord” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *Strife resulting from a lack of agreement.*
- *A chord which (in conventional harmonic terms) is regarded as displeasing or requiring resolution by another.*
- *Lack of harmony between notes sounding together.*
- *Lack of agreement or harmony.*
- *A single note dissonant with another.*
- *A harsh mixture of sounds.*
- *Disagreement among those expected to cooperate.*
- *Any interval except unison, an octave, a perfect fifth or fourth, a major or minor third and sixth, or their octaves.*
- *Disagreement between people.*
- *Lack of agreement or harmony between things.*



## Synonyms of "Discord" as a noun (10 Words)

<b>cacophony</b>	A loud harsh or strident noise. <i>A <b>cacophony</b> of deafening alarm bells.</i>
<b>conflict</b>	A disagreement or argument about something important. <i>This form of <b>conflict</b> is essential to Mann's writing.</i>
<b>discordance</b>	A harsh mixture of sounds. <i>Fast songs can go through slow phases and minor keys and <b>discordance</b> may be employed.</i>
<b>disharmony</b>	Lack of harmony or agreement. <i>We will become evermore a nation of social <b>disharmony</b>.</i>
<b>dissension</b>	Disagreement that leads to discord. <i>These issues caused bitter <b>dissension</b> in the party.</i>
<b>dissonance</b>	Disagreeable sounds. <i>The party faithful might be willing to put up with such <b>dissonance</b> among their candidates.</i>

- friction** The action of one surface or object rubbing against another.  
*The **friction** of braking.*
- hostility** A hostile (very unfriendly) disposition.  
*Their **hostility** to all outsiders.*
- lack of harmony** The state of needing something that is absent or unavailable.
- strife** Trouble or difficulty of any kind.  
*Decades of civil **strife**.*



### Usage Examples of "Discord" as a noun

- *A prosperous family who showed no signs of discord.*
- *The music faded in discord.*
- *The discord between indigenous and Western cultures.*



## Discord as a Verb

### Definitions of "Discord" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "discord" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *(of things) be different.*
- *Be different from one another.*
- *(of people) disagree.*

### Synonyms of "Discord" as a verb (2 Words)

**disaccord** Disagree; be at variance.  
*This **disaccords** with the precise date.*

**disagree** Have or express a different opinion.  
*The sea crossing **disagreed** with her.*

### Usage Examples of "Discord" as a verb

- *We discorded commonly on two points.*
- *The party's views were apt to discord with those of the leading members of the government.*

### Associations of "Discord" (30 Words)

**argument** An independent variable associated with a function or proposition and determining its value For example in the expression  $y = F(x)$  the arguments of the function  $F$  are  $x$  and  $x$  and the value is  $y$ .  
*The editor added the **argument** to the poem.*

**cacophony** A loud harsh or strident noise.  
*A **cacophony** of deafening alarm bells.*

**conflict** Be in conflict.  
*Regional **conflicts**.*

**controversy** A contentious speech act; a dispute where there is strong disagreement.  
*The announcement ended a protracted **controversy**.*

**cracked** Informal or slang terms for mentally irregular.  
*You must think my family are **cracked**.*

<b>din</b>	Make (someone) learn or remember an idea by constant repetition. <i>The sound <b>dinned</b> irritatingly into Marian s head.</i>
<b>disagree</b>	Have or express a different opinion. <i>The sea crossing <b>disagreed</b> with her.</i>
<b>disagreement</b>	Lack of consensus or approval. <i>There was some <b>disagreement</b> about the details.</i>
<b>discomfit</b>	Make (someone) feel uneasy or embarrassed. <i>He was not noticeably <b>discomfited</b> by her tone.</i>
<b>disconcert</b>	Cause to feel embarrassment. <i>The abrupt change of subject <b>disconcerted</b> her.</i>
<b>discordant</b>	Disagreeing or incongruous. <i>The operative principle of democracy is a balance of <b>discordant</b> qualities.</i>
<b>discrepancy</b>	An illogical or surprising lack of compatibility or similarity between two or more facts. <i>There s a <b>discrepancy</b> between your account and his.</i>
<b>discrepant</b>	Not in accord. <i>Widely <b>discrepant</b> statements.</i>
<b>dispute</b>	Compete for; strive to win. <i>The point has been much <b>disputed</b>.</i>
<b>dissension</b>	Disagreement that leads to discord. <i>These issues caused bitter <b>dissension</b> in the party.</i>
<b>dissonance</b>	A conflict of people’s opinions or actions or characters. <i>An unusual degree of <b>dissonance</b> for such choral styles.</i>
<b>dissonant</b>	Lacking harmony. <i>Irregular <b>dissonant</b> chords.</i>
<b>divergence</b>	The act of moving away in different direction from a common point. <i>An angle is formed by the <b>divergence</b> of two straight lines.</i>
<b>divisive</b>	Dissenting (especially dissenting with the majority opinion). <i>The highly <b>divisive</b> issue of abortion.</i>
<b>factious</b>	Dissenting (especially dissenting with the majority opinion). <i>A <b>factious</b> country.</i>
<b>fight</b>	The act of fighting any contest or struggle. <i>Britain might have given up her <b>fight</b> against Germany.</i>
<b>incompatible</b>	Used especially of drugs or muscles that counteract or neutralize each other’s effect. <i>All four prototype camcorders used special tapes and were <b>incompatible</b> with each other.</i>

<b><u>inconsistency</u></b>	The quality of being inconsistent and lacking a harmonious uniformity among things or parts. <i>The <b>inconsistency</b> between his expressed attitudes and his actual behaviour.</i>
<b>inharmonious</b>	Not in harmony. <i>An <b>inharmonious</b> or incongruous mixture of architectural styles.</i>
<b><u>quarrel</u></b>	An arrow that is shot from a crossbow; has a head with four edges. <i>They had a <b>quarrel</b>.</i>
<b>racket</b>	Hit a ball with a racket. <i>A squash <b>racket</b>.</i>
<b>squabble</b>	A quarrel about petty points. <i>Family <b>squabbles</b>.</i>
<b>strife</b>	Trouble or difficulty of any kind. <i><b>Strife</b> within the community.</i>
<b>struggle</b>	Be engaged in a fight; carry on a fight. <i>Getting through the crowd was a real <b>struggle</b>.</i>
<b>wrestle</b>	A wrestling bout or contest. <i>For over a year David <b>wrestled</b> with a guilty conscience.</i>
