According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "discourse" as a noun can have the following definitions:

- An address of a religious nature (usually delivered during a church service.
- Extended verbal expression in speech or writing.
- An extended communication (often interactive) dealing with some particular topic.
- Written or spoken communication or debate.
- A connected series of utterances; a text or conversation.
- A formal discussion of a topic in speech or writing.

- Speak or write authoritatively about a topic.
- To consider or examine in speech or writing.
