### **Definitions of "Discrete" as an adjective**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “discrete” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Constituting a separate entity or part.*
- *Individually separate and distinct.*



## Synonyms of "Discrete" as an adjective (9 Words)

- detached** Being or feeling set or kept apart from others.  
*A **detached** part.*
- disconnected** Music marked by or composed of disconnected parts or sounds cut short crisply.  
***Disconnected** fragments of a story.*
- discontinuous** Having intervals or gaps.  
***Discontinuous** applause.*
- disjoined** Have the connection undone; having become separate.
- disjunct** Disjoined and distinct from one another.  
***Disjunct** distribution of king crabs.*



<b>distinct</b>	Recognizable; marked. <i>Management had interests quite <b>distinct</b> from those of their employees.</i>
<b>individual</b>	Separate and distinct from others of the same kind. <i>Please mark the <b>individual</b> pages.</i>
<b>separate</b>	Have the connection undone having become separate. <i>Melt the white and plain chocolate in <b>separate</b> bowls.</i>
<b>unattached</b>	(of animals) able to swim about; not attached. <i>Local people <b>unattached</b> to any organization.</i>



### Usage Examples of "Discrete" as an adjective

- *Speech sounds are produced as a continuous sound signal rather than discrete units.*
- *A government with three discrete divisions.*





## Associations of "Discrete" (30 Words)

- compare** Point out or describe the resemblances with; liken to.  
*Individual schools **compared** their facilities with those of others in the area.*
- conflicting** In disagreement- John Morley.  
*There are **conflicting** accounts of what occurred.*
- contradiction** The speech act of contradicting someone.  
*The second sentence appears to be in flat **contradiction** of the first.*
- contrast** The perceptual effect of the juxtaposition of very different colors.  
*Careful adjustment of the **contrast** to suit the prevailing light is critical.*
- contrastingly** In a contrasting manner.

<b>diametrical</b>	(of opposites) complete; absolute. <i><b>Diametrical</b> or opposite points of view.</i>
<b>differ</b>	Be different. <i>He <b>differed</b> from his contemporaries in ethical matters.</i>
<b>different</b>	Unlike in nature or quality or form or degree. <i>This new music is certainly <b>different</b> but I don't really like it.</i>
<b>differential</b>	A difference between amounts of things. <i><b>Differential</b> equation.</i>
<b>differentiated</b>	Exhibiting biological specialization; adapted during development to a specific function or environment.
<b>differently</b>	In a way that is not the same as another or as before. <i>We work <b>differently</b> from other developers.</i>
<b>discrepancy</b>	An illogical or surprising lack of compatibility or similarity between two or more facts. <i>There's a <b>discrepancy</b> between your account and his.</i>
<b>disjointed</b>	Lacking orderly continuity. <i>Piecing together <b>disjointed</b> fragments of information.</i>
<b>disparate</b>	Things so unlike that there is no basis for comparison. <i>A <b>disparate</b> aggregate of creeds and songs and prayers.</i>
<b>dissimilar</b>	Marked by dissimilarity. <i>The pleasures of the romance novel are not <b>dissimilar</b> from those of the chocolate bar.</i>
<b>distinct</b>	(often followed by 'from') not alike; different in nature or quality. <i>The gallery is divided into five <b>distinct</b> spaces.</i>
<b>distinction</b>	A difference or contrast between similar things or people. <i>A novelist of <b>distinction</b>.</i>
<b>distinguish</b>	Recognize or treat (someone or something) as different. <i>What <b>distinguishes</b> sport from games.</i>
<b>divergence</b>	The process or state of diverging. <i>The <b>divergence</b> between primates and other groups.</i>
<b>gap</b>	Make an opening or gap in. <i>There are many <b>gaps</b> in our understanding of what happened.</i>
<b>incompatibility</b>	Inability of equipment, computer programs, etc. to be used in combination. <i>Genetic <b>incompatibility</b>.</i>

<b><u>incompatible</u></b>	Used especially of drugs or muscles that counteract or neutralize each other's effect. <i>Long hours are simply <b>incompatible</b> with family life.</i>
<b><u>inconsistency</u></b>	An inconsistent aspect or element. <i>The <b>inconsistency</b> between his expressed attitudes and his actual behaviour.</i>
<b>inconsistent</b>	Not staying the same throughout. <i>The quality of the material was often <b>inconsistent</b>.</i>
<b>individuation</b>	Discriminating the individual from the generic group or species.
<b>repugnance</b>	The relation between propositions that cannot both be true at the same time. <i>Our <b>repugnance</b> at the bleeding carcasses.</i>
<b>revulsion</b>	Intense aversion. <i>News of the attack will be met with sorrow and <b>revulsion</b>.</i>
<b>separate</b>	Have the connection undone having become separate. <i><b>Separate</b> the eggs and beat the egg yolks.</i>
<b><u>unlike</u></b>	Not like; different from. <i>He was very <b>unlike</b> to any other man.</i>
<b>unshared</b>	Not shared. <i>Most of those placed in hostels would prefer <b>unshared</b> independent accommodation.</i>
