Discrete as an Adjective

Definitions of "Discrete" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “discrete” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Constituting a separate entity or part.*
- *Individually separate and distinct.*



Synonyms of "Discrete" as an adjective (9 Words)

- detached** Being or feeling set or kept apart from others.
*A **detached** part.*
- disconnected** Music marked by or composed of disconnected parts or sounds cut short crisply.
***Disconnected** fragments of a story.*
- discontinuous** Having intervals or gaps.
***Discontinuous** applause.*
- disjoined** Have the connection undone; having become separate.
- disjunct** Disjoined and distinct from one another.
***Disjunct** distribution of king crabs.*

distinct	Recognizable; marked. <i>Management had interests quite distinct from those of their employees.</i>
individual	Separate and distinct from others of the same kind. <i>Please mark the individual pages.</i>
separate	Have the connection undone having become separate. <i>Melt the white and plain chocolate in separate bowls.</i>
unattached	(of animals) able to swim about; not attached. <i>Local people unattached to any organization.</i>



Usage Examples of "Discrete" as an adjective

- *Speech sounds are produced as a continuous sound signal rather than discrete units.*
- *A government with three discrete divisions.*



Associations of "Discrete" (30 Words)

- compare** Point out or describe the resemblances with; liken to.
*Individual schools **compared** their facilities with those of others in the area.*
- conflicting** In disagreement- John Morley.
*There are **conflicting** accounts of what occurred.*
- contradiction** The speech act of contradicting someone.
*The second sentence appears to be in flat **contradiction** of the first.*
- contrast** The perceptual effect of the juxtaposition of very different colors.
*Careful adjustment of the **contrast** to suit the prevailing light is critical.*
- contrastingly** In a contrasting manner.

diametrical	(of opposites) complete; absolute. <i>Diametrical or opposite points of view.</i>
differ	Be different. <i>He differed from his contemporaries in ethical matters.</i>
different	Unlike in nature or quality or form or degree. <i>This new music is certainly different but I don't really like it.</i>
differential	A difference between amounts of things. <i>Differential equation.</i>
differentiated	Exhibiting biological specialization; adapted during development to a specific function or environment.
differently	In a way that is not the same as another or as before. <i>We work differently from other developers.</i>
discrepancy	An illogical or surprising lack of compatibility or similarity between two or more facts. <i>There's a discrepancy between your account and his.</i>
disjointed	Lacking orderly continuity. <i>Piecing together disjointed fragments of information.</i>
disparate	Things so unlike that there is no basis for comparison. <i>A disparate aggregate of creeds and songs and prayers.</i>
dissimilar	Marked by dissimilarity. <i>The pleasures of the romance novel are not dissimilar from those of the chocolate bar.</i>
distinct	(often followed by 'from') not alike; different in nature or quality. <i>The gallery is divided into five distinct spaces.</i>
distinction	A difference or contrast between similar things or people. <i>A novelist of distinction.</i>
distinguish	Recognize or treat (someone or something) as different. <i>What distinguishes sport from games.</i>
divergence	The process or state of diverging. <i>The divergence between primates and other groups.</i>
gap	Make an opening or gap in. <i>There are many gaps in our understanding of what happened.</i>
incompatibility	Inability of equipment, computer programs, etc. to be used in combination. <i>Genetic incompatibility.</i>

<u>incompatible</u>	Used especially of drugs or muscles that counteract or neutralize each other's effect. <i>Long hours are simply incompatible with family life.</i>
<u>inconsistency</u>	An inconsistent aspect or element. <i>The inconsistency between his expressed attitudes and his actual behaviour.</i>
inconsistent	Not staying the same throughout. <i>The quality of the material was often inconsistent.</i>
individuation	Discriminating the individual from the generic group or species.
repugnance	The relation between propositions that cannot both be true at the same time. <i>Our repugnance at the bleeding carcasses.</i>
revulsion	Intense aversion. <i>News of the attack will be met with sorrow and revulsion.</i>
separate	Have the connection undone having become separate. <i>Separate the eggs and beat the egg yolks.</i>
<u>unlike</u>	Not like; different from. <i>He was very unlike to any other man.</i>
unshared	Not shared. <i>Most of those placed in hostels would prefer unshared independent accommodation.</i>
