Definitions of "Discriminatory" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “discriminatory” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Manifesting partiality.*
- *Containing or implying a slight or showing prejudice.*
- *Capable of making fine distinctions.*
- *Making or showing an unjust or prejudicial distinction between different categories of people, especially on the grounds of ethnicity, sex, age, or disability.*
- *Being biased or having a belief or attitude formed beforehand.*

Synonyms of "Discriminatory" as an adjective (12 Words)

biased	Favoring one person or side over another. A biased account of the trial.
discriminative	Expressing careful judgment. Discriminative censure.
inequitable	Unfair; unjust. The present taxes are inequitable .

invidious	(of a comparison or distinction) unfairly discriminating; unjust. <i>It seems invidious to make special mention of one aspect of his work.</i>
one-sided	Involving only one part or side.
partisan	Prejudiced in favour of a particular cause. <i>Newspapers have become increasingly partisan.</i>
preferential	(of voting or an election) in which the voter puts candidates in order of preference. <i>A preferential shop gives priority or advantage to union members in hiring or promoting.</i>
prejudiced	Having or showing a dislike or distrust that is derived from prejudice; bigoted. <i>A prejudiced judge.</i>
prejudicial	Harmful to someone or something; detrimental. <i>The proposals were considered prejudicial to the city centre.</i>
unfair	Not based on or behaving according to the principles of equality and justice. <i>It was an unfair trial.</i>
unjust	Not equitable or fair. <i>Resistance to unjust laws.</i>
weighted	Made heavy or weighted down with weariness. <i>Weighted eyelids.</i>

Associations of "Discriminatory" (30 Words)

bias	Cause to be biased. <i>You are biasing my choice by telling me yours.</i>
biased	Unfairly prejudiced for or against someone or something. <i>We will not tolerate this biased media coverage.</i>
bigot	A prejudiced person who is intolerant of any opinions differing from his own. <i>Don't let a few small minded bigots destroy the good image of the city.</i>

bigoted	Obstinately or unreasonably attached to a belief, opinion, or faction, in particular prejudiced against or antagonistic towards a person or people on the basis of their membership of a particular group. <i>A bigoted group of reactionaries.</i>
comparison	The act of examining resemblances. <i>The fractions selected for comparison must require pupils to consider both numerator and denominator.</i>
disapproving	Expressing or manifesting disapproval. <i>He shot a disapproving glance at her.</i>
discriminate	Recognize or perceive the difference. <i>Features that discriminate this species from other gastropods.</i>
discrimination	The ability to judge what is of high quality; good judgement or taste. <i>Discrimination between right and wrong.</i>
equality	The quality of being the same in quantity or measure or value or status. <i>An organization aiming to promote racial equality.</i>
grievance	A real or imagined cause for complaint, especially unfair treatment. <i>He was nursing a grievance.</i>
illiberal	Not generous; mean. <i>Illiberal and anti democratic policies.</i>
inequality	Lack of smoothness or regularity in a surface. <i>The growing inequality between rich and poor.</i>
iniquity	Immoral or grossly unfair behaviour. <i>A den of iniquity.</i>
injustice	The practice of being unjust or unfair. <i>Brooding over life s injustices.</i>
intolerance	Unwillingness to recognize and respect differences in opinions or beliefs. <i>Avoiding cross contamination is essential to people with gluten intolerance.</i>
intolerant	Unable to be given (a medicine or other treatment) or to eat (a food) without adverse effects. <i>He s recently been diagnosed as gluten intolerant.</i>
invidious	(of a comparison or distinction) unfairly discriminating; unjust. <i>Invidious comparisons.</i>
jaundiced	Showing or affected by prejudice or envy or distaste. <i>Takes a jaundiced view of societies and clubs.</i>
misogynist	Relating to or characteristic of a misogynist. <i>A bachelor and renowned misogynist.</i>

<u>partial</u>	A harmonic with a frequency that is a multiple of the fundamental frequency. Partial immunity.
partiality	An inclination to favor one group or view or opinion over alternatives. <i>An attack on the partiality of judges.</i>
prejudice	Give rise to prejudice in someone make biased. <i>Accusations of racial prejudice.</i>
prejudiced	Emanating from a person's emotions and prejudices. <i>People are prejudiced against us.</i>
racism	Discriminatory or abusive behavior towards members of another race. <i>A programme to combat racism.</i>
racist	Characterized by or showing prejudice, discrimination, or antagonism against a person or people on the basis of their membership of a particular racial or ethnic group, typically one that is a minority or marginalized. <i>We are investigating complaints about racist abuse.</i>
<u>sexist</u>	A person with sexist views. <i>A blatantly sexist remark.</i>
<u>subjective</u>	The subjective case. <i>There is always the danger of making a subjective judgement.</i>
unfair	Not based on or behaving according to the principles of equality and justice. <i>Used unfair methods.</i>
<u>unfavorable</u>	Tending to hinder or oppose. Unfavorable conditions.
<u>unjust</u>	Not fair; marked by injustice or partiality or deception. <i>Resistance to unjust laws.</i>
