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## Associations of "Disenfranchisement" (30 Words)

<a href="#">buccaneer</a>	Live like a buccaneer. <i>The marauding <b>buccaneers</b> who used to terrorize the Mediterranean coasts.</i>
<a href="#">confiscate</a>	Surrendered as a penalty. <i>The government <b>confiscated</b> his property early in the war.</i>
<b>corruption</b>	Inducement (as of a public official) by improper means (as bribery) to violate duty (as by committing a felony). <i>The term <b>hobgoblin</b> is thought to be a <b>corruption</b> of <b>Robgoblin</b>.</i>
<b>decayed</b>	Damaged by decay; hence unsound and useless. <i><b>Decayed</b> teeth.</i>
<a href="#">depravity</a>	A corrupt or depraved or degenerate act or practice. <i>Its brothels its opium parlors its <b>depravity</b>.</i>
<a href="#">deprive</a>	Prevent (a person or place) from having or using something. <i>The city was <b>deprived</b> of its water supplies.</i>
<b>despoil</b>	Steal or violently remove valuable possessions from; plunder. <i>The church was <b>despoiled</b> of its marble wall covering.</i>
<b>foul</b>	Commit a foul break the rules. <i>It sometimes becomes advantageous to anchor during the periods of <b>foul</b> tide.</i>
<b>impound</b>	Seize and take legal custody of (something, especially a vehicle, goods, or documents) because of an infringement of a law. <i>The customs agents <b>impounded</b> the illegal shipment.</i>
<b>impoverish</b>	Exhaust the strength or vitality of. <i>The wars had <b>impoverished</b> him.</i>
<a href="#">loot</a>	Steal (goods) in a war, riot, etc. <i>The gang escaped with their <b>loot</b>.</i>
<b>malodorous</b>	Smelling very unpleasant. <i>Leaking taps and <b>malodorous</b> drains.</i>

<b>marauder</b>	Someone who attacks in search of booty. <i>A band of English <b>marauders</b> were surprised and overcome.</i>
<b>pillage</b>	Goods or money obtained illegally. <i>Rebellious peasants intent on <b>pillage</b>.</i>
<b>plunder</b>	Plunder a town after capture. <i>Looters moved into the disaster area to <b>plunder</b> shops.</i>
<b>putrefaction</b>	Moral perversion; impairment of virtue and moral principles. <i>The breeze shifted and we caught the stench of <b>putrefaction</b>.</i>
<b>putrid</b>	In an advanced state of decomposition and having a foul odor. <i>The <b>putrid</b> smells from the slaughterhouses.</i>
<b>rancid</b>	(used of decomposing oils or fats) having a rank smell or taste usually due to a chemical change or decomposition. <i>Without preservatives fat goes <b>rancid</b>.</i>
<b>ransack</b>	Steal goods; take as spoils. <i>Burglars <b>ransacked</b> her home.</i>
<b>rapine</b>	The violent seizure of someone's property. <i>The fruits of violence and <b>rapine</b>.</i>
<b>rob</b>	Rip off; ask an unreasonable price. <i>Someone had <b>robbed</b> my jacket.</i>
<b>rotten</b>	Having decayed or disintegrated; usually implies foulness. <i><b>Rotten</b> floor boards.</i>
<b>steal</b>	Steal a base. <i>At 59 95 it s an absolute <b>steal</b>.</i>
<b>terrorism</b>	The unlawful use of violence and intimidation, especially against civilians, in the pursuit of political aims. <i>The fight against <b>terrorism</b>.</i>
<b>theft</b>	The act of taking something from someone unlawfully. <i>He was convicted of <b>theft</b>.</i>
<b>thieve</b>	Take by theft. <i>The students have been <b>thieving</b> my favourite art books.</i>
<b>underhand</b>	Slyly and secretly- John Donne- C.G.Bowers. <i>Mean revenge committed <b>underhand</b>.</i>
<b>unemployed</b>	People who are involuntarily out of work (considered as a group). <i>A training programme for the long term <b>unemployed</b>.</i>
<b>usurp</b>	Take the place of. <i>The Hanoverian dynasty had <b>usurped</b> the Stuarts.</i>
