

Definitions of "Disengage" as a verb

According to the Oxford Dictionary of English, "disengage" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- Release from something that holds fast, connects, or entangles.
- Pass the point of one's sword over or under the opponent's sword to change the line of attack.
- Remove (troops) from an area of conflict.
- Free or remove obstruction from.
- Separate or release (someone or something) from something to which they are attached or connected.
- Become released.
- · Become free.










Usage Examples of "Disengage" as a verb
