### Synonyms of "Disgruntled" as an adjective (9 Words)

<b><a href="#">aggrieved</a></b>	Feeling resentment at having been unfairly treated. <i>They were <b>aggrieved</b> at the outcome.</i>
<b>disaffected</b>	Dissatisfied, especially with people in authority or a system of control. <i>A military plot by <b>disaffected</b> elements in the army.</i>
<b>disappointed</b>	Disappointingly unsuccessful. <i>I m <b>disappointed</b> in you Mary.</i>
<b>discontented</b>	Showing or experiencing dissatisfaction or restless longing. <i>I am so <b>discontented</b> with my work.</i>
<b><a href="#">displeased</a></b>	Not pleased; experiencing or manifesting displeasure. <i>He was <b>displeased</b> with your work.</i>

<b>dissatisfied</b>	Not content or happy with something. <i><b>Dissatisfied</b> customers.</i>
<b>malcontent</b>	Discontented as toward authority. <i>The <b>malcontent</b> generals saw their role as leaders of this counter revolution.</i>
<b>resentful</b>	Full of or marked by resentment or indignant ill will. <i><b>Resentful</b> at the way he was treated.</i>
<b>unhappy</b>	Unfortunate. <i>Many were <b>unhappy</b> about the scale of the cuts.</i>

## Associations of "Disgruntled" (30 Words)

<b>complain</b>	Express complaints discontent displeasure or unhappiness. <i>My mother <b>complains</b> all day.</i>
<b>disaffected</b>	Discontented as toward authority. <i>A military plot by <b>disaffected</b> elements in the army.</i>
<b>discontent</b>	A longing for something better than the present situation. <i>The cause attracted a motley crew of <b>discontents</b> and zealots.</i>
<b>discontented</b>	Dissatisfied, especially with one's circumstances. <i>I am so <b>discontented</b> with my work.</i>
<b>displeasure</b>	Annoy; displeasure. <i>He started hanging around the local pubs much to the <b>displeasure</b> of his mother.</i>
<b>dissatisfied</b>	In a state of sulky dissatisfaction. <i>His parents are <b>dissatisfied</b> with the quality of tuition on offer.</i>
<b>impermissible</b>	Not permitted. <i><b>Impermissible</b> behavior.</i>
<b>impossible</b>	(used of persons or their behavior) not acceptable or reasonable. <i>It was almost <b>impossible</b> to keep up with him.</i>
<b>inadequate</b>	Of insufficient quantity to meet a need. <i>An <b>inadequate</b> income.</i>
<b>inadmissible</b>	Not to be allowed or tolerated. <i>An <b>inadmissible</b> interference in the affairs of the Church.</i>

<b>insufferable</b>	Having or showing unbearable arrogance or conceit. <i>An <b>insufferable</b> bully.</i>
<b>intolerable</b>	Incapable of being put up with. <i>The <b>intolerable</b> pressures of his work.</i>
<b>malcontent</b>	A person who is dissatisfied and rebellious. <i>The <b>malcontent</b> generals saw their role as leaders of this counter revolution.</i>
<b>objectionable</b>	Causing disapproval or protest. <i>A vulgar and <b>objectionable</b> person.</i>
<b>offensive</b>	Morally offensive. <i>An impending military <b>offensive</b> against the guerrillas.</i>
<u><b>outrageous</b></u>	Grossly offensive to decency or morality; causing horror. <i>The <b>outrageous</b> claims made by the previous government.</i>
<u><b>pessimist</b></u>	A person who tends to see the worst aspect of things or believe that the worst will happen. <i>He finds solace in the writings of <b>pessimist</b> philosophers.</i>
<b>prohibition</b>	The period from 1920 to 1933 when the sale of alcoholic beverages was prohibited in the United States by a constitutional amendment. <i>In 1920 the 18th amendment to the Constitution established <b>prohibition</b> in the US.</i>
<u><b>taboo</b></u>	Place under a taboo. <i>Many <b>taboos</b> have developed around physical exposure.</i>
<b>unacceptable</b>	Not satisfactory or allowable. <i>The following use of access was judged <b>unacceptable</b> by a panel of linguists You can access your cash at any of 300 automatic tellers.</i>
<u><b>unbearable</b></u>	Not able to be endured or tolerated. <i>The heat was getting <b>unbearable</b>.</i>
<b>unendurable</b>	Incapable of being tolerated or endured. <i>Cries of <b>unendurable</b> suffering.</i>
<b>unhappy</b>	Not happy. <i>Had an <b>unhappy</b> time at school.</i>
<b>unimaginable</b>	Totally unlikely. <i>Lives of almost <b>unimaginable</b> deprivation.</i>
<u><b>unpalatable</b></u>	Not pleasant or acceptable to the taste or mind. <i><b>Unpalatable</b> truths.</i>
<u><b>unsatisfactory</b></u>	Not giving satisfaction. <i>Years of living in <b>unsatisfactory</b> rented accommodation.</i>

- unsatisfied** Not having been satisfied.  
*The compromise left all sides **unsatisfied**.*
- unsavory** Morally offensive.  
*An **unsavory** scandal.*
- unsupportable** Not able to be supported or defended.
- unthinkable** Incapable of being conceived or considered.  
*The **unthinkable** happened I spoke up.*
