Synonyms of "Disgruntled" as an adjective (9 Words)

aggrieved	Feeling resentment at having been unfairly treated. <i>They were aggrieved at the outcome.</i>
disaffected	Dissatisfied, especially with people in authority or a system of control. <i>A military plot by disaffected elements in the army.</i>
disappointed	Disappointingly unsuccessful. <i>I m disappointed in you Mary.</i>
discontented	Showing or experiencing dissatisfaction or restless longing. <i>I am so discontented with my work.</i>
displeased	Not pleased; experiencing or manifesting displeasure. <i>He was displeased with your work.</i>

dissatisfied	Not content or happy with something. <i>Dissatisfied customers.</i>
malcontent	Discontented as toward authority. <i>The malcontent generals saw their role as leaders of this counter revolution.</i>
resentful	Full of or marked by resentment or indignant ill will. <i>Resentful at the way he was treated.</i>
unhappy	Unfortunate. <i>Many were unhappy about the scale of the cuts.</i>

Usage Examples of "Disgruntled" as an adjective

- *Judges receive letters from disgruntled members of the public.*

Associations of "Disgruntled" (30 Words)

complain	Express complaints discontent displeasure or unhappiness. <i>My mother complains all day.</i>
disaffected	Discontented as toward authority. <i>A military plot by disaffected elements in the army.</i>
discontent	A longing for something better than the present situation. <i>The cause attracted a motley crew of discontents and zealots.</i>
discontented	Dissatisfied, especially with one's circumstances. <i>I am so discontented with my work.</i>
displeasure	Annoy; displeasure. <i>He started hanging around the local pubs much to the displeasure of his mother.</i>
dissatisfied	In a state of sulky dissatisfaction. <i>His parents are dissatisfied with the quality of tuition on offer.</i>
impermissible	Not permitted. <i>Impermissible behavior.</i>
impossible	(used of persons or their behavior) not acceptable or reasonable. <i>It was almost impossible to keep up with him.</i>
inadequate	Of insufficient quantity to meet a need. <i>An inadequate income.</i>
inadmissible	Not to be allowed or tolerated. <i>An inadmissible interference in the affairs of the Church.</i>

insufferable	Having or showing unbearable arrogance or conceit. <i>An insufferable bully.</i>
intolerable	Incapable of being put up with. <i>The intolerable pressures of his work.</i>
malcontent	A person who is dissatisfied and rebellious. <i>The malcontent generals saw their role as leaders of this counter revolution.</i>
objectionable	Causing disapproval or protest. <i>A vulgar and objectionable person.</i>
offensive	Morally offensive. <i>An impending military offensive against the guerrillas.</i>
outrageous	Grossly offensive to decency or morality; causing horror. <i>The outrageous claims made by the previous government.</i>
pessimist	A person who tends to see the worst aspect of things or believe that the worst will happen. <i>He finds solace in the writings of pessimist philosophers.</i>
prohibition	The period from 1920 to 1933 when the sale of alcoholic beverages was prohibited in the United States by a constitutional amendment. <i>In 1920 the 18th amendment to the Constitution established prohibition in the US.</i>
taboo	Place under a taboo. <i>Many taboos have developed around physical exposure.</i>
unacceptable	Not satisfactory or allowable. <i>The following use of access was judged unacceptable by a panel of linguists You can access your cash at any of 300 automatic tellers.</i>
unbearable	Not able to be endured or tolerated. <i>The heat was getting unbearable.</i>
unendurable	Incapable of being tolerated or endured. <i>Cries of unendurable suffering.</i>
unhappy	Not happy. <i>Had an unhappy time at school.</i>
unimaginable	Totally unlikely. <i>Lives of almost unimaginable deprivation.</i>
unpalatable	Not pleasant or acceptable to the taste or mind. <i>Unpalatable truths.</i>
unsatisfactory	Not giving satisfaction. <i>Years of living in unsatisfactory rented accommodation.</i>

- unsatisfied** Not having been satisfied.
*The compromise left all sides **unsatisfied**.*
- unsavory** Morally offensive.
*An **unsavory** scandal.*
- unsupportable** Not able to be supported or defended.
- unthinkable** Incapable of being conceived or considered.
*The **unthinkable** happened I spoke up.*
