| <b>offensive</b>             | Morally offensive.<br><i>An impending military <b>offensive</b> against the guerrillas.</i>   |
| <b><u>outrageous</u></b>     | Grossly offensive to decency or morality; causing horror.<br><i>The <b>outrageous</b> claims made by the previous government.</i>   |

| <b><u>unbearable</u></b>     | Not able to be endured or tolerated.<br><i>The heat was getting <b>unbearable</b>.</i>  |
| <b>unendurable</b>           | Incapable of being tolerated or endured.<br><i>Cries of <b>unendurable</b> suffering.</i>   |
| <b>unhappy</b>               | Not happy.<br><i>Had an <b>unhappy</b> time at school.</i>  |
| <b>unimaginable</b>          | Totally unlikely.<br><i>Lives of almost <b>unimaginable</b> deprivation.</i>  |
