insufferable Having or showing unbearable arrogance or conceit.

An **insufferable** bully.

intolerable Incapable of being put up with.

The **intolerable** pressures of his work.

A person who is dissatisfied and rebellious.

malcontent The **malcontent** generals saw their role as leaders of this counter

objectionable Causing disapproval or protest.

A vulgar and **objectionable** person.

offensive Morally offensive.

An impending military **offensive** against the guerrillas.

outrageous

Grossly offensive to decency or morality; causing horror.

The **outrageous** claims made by the previous government.

A person who tends to see the worst aspect of things or believe that the

pessimist worst will happen.

He finds solace in the writings of pessimist philosophers.
