
Disillusionment as a Noun



Give reluctantly or resentfully. **begrudge**

She **begrudge**d Martin his affluence.

Extremely and sharply. bitterly

The two governments quarrelled **bitterly** over the terms of the loan.

A squeaking sound. creak

The garden gate creaked open.

Bring into a particular state by crying. cry

This situation is **cry**ing for attention.



disappoint Fail to meet the hopes or expectations of.

The governing coalition had bitterly **disappoint**ed the hopes of its voters.

disappointed (of hopes or expectations) prevented from being realized.

Disappointed expectations and thwarted ambitions.

Failing to fulfil someone's hopes or expectations.

It was **disappointing** that there were relatively few possibilities.

disillusioned Freed from illusion.

The minority groups were completely **disillusioned** with the party.

dreamer Someone guided more by ideals than by practical considerations.

A rebellious young **dreamer**.

embitter Cause to be bitter or resentful.

He didn t let illness and divorce **embitter** him.

envy A person or thing that inspires envy.

France has a film industry that is the **envy** of Europe.

Secure a boat with gripes.

gripe

My only gripe is the size of the page numbers.

grouse Hunt grouse.

interference

idealist A person who believes in the theory of idealism.

Hegel described himself as an absolute **idealist**.

The fading or disturbance of received radio signals caused by unwanted

signals from other sources, such as unshielded electrical equipment, or

broadcasts from other stations or channels.

An unwarranted **interference** with personal liberty.

jealousy A feeling of jealous envy (especially of a rival.

Cherish their official political freedom with fierce **jealousy**.

poignant Arousing affect. **Poignant** anxiety.

pout A pouting expression.

His lower lip protruded in a sulky **pout**.

rankle (of a wound or sore) continue to be painful; fester.

The injustice **rankle**d her.

resent Wish ill or allow unwillingly.

She **resent**s being paid less than her co workers.

sniffle Sniff slightly or repeatedly, typically because of a cold or fit of crying.

He was restraining his **sniffle**s rather well.

Snivel An act or sound of snivelling.

Lucy s torrent of howls weakened to a **snivel**.

The geese flew upriver **squawk**ing.

Angry or bitter disagreement over fundamental issues; conflict. strife

Decades of civil **strife**.

A period of sulking. sulk

He was **sulk**ing over the break up of his band.

Moving slowly. sulky

Disappointment was making her **sulky**.

Not satisfactory; not good enough.

unsatisfactory Her performance proved to be **unsatisfactory**.

A fit or period of weeping. weep

Sit down and have a weep.

A whimpering sound.

Their first appearance in the top flight ended with a **whimper** rather than **whimper**

a bang.

Move with a whining sound. whine

The dog **whine**d and scratched at the back door.
