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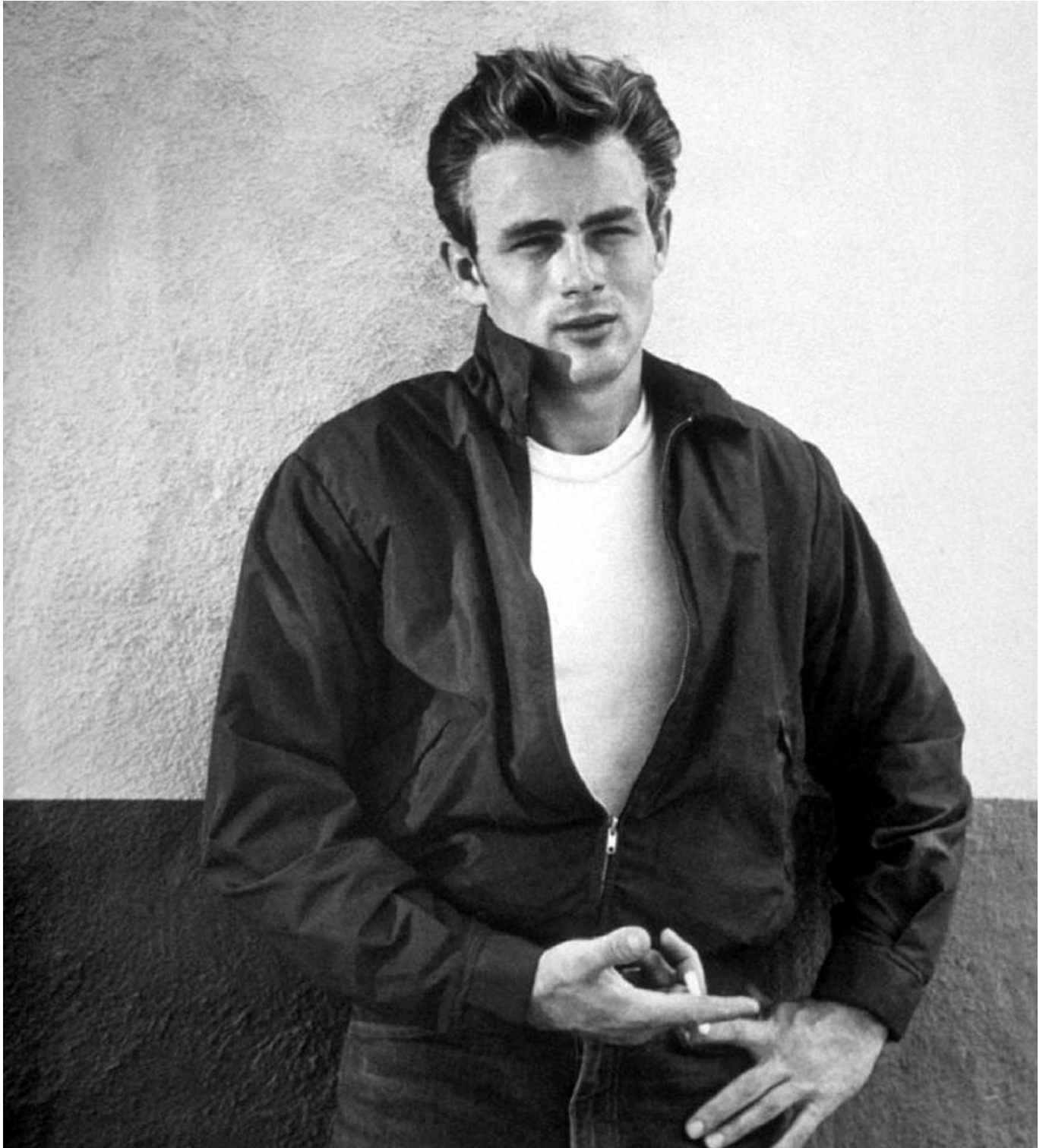
**The synonyms of “Disillusionment” are: disenchantment, disillusion**

## **Disillusionment as a Noun**

### **Definitions of "Disillusionment" as a noun**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “disillusionment” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A feeling of disappointment resulting from the discovery that something is not as good as one believed it to be.*
- *Freeing from false belief or illusions.*



## Synonyms of "Disillusionment" as a noun (2 Words)

- disenchantment** Freeing from false belief or illusions.  
*Their growing **disenchantment** with the leadership.*
- disillusion** Disappointment resulting from the discovery that something is not as good as one believed it to be.  
*The old enthusiasm for the government evaporated into a more cynical **disillusion**.*





## Usage Examples of "Disillusionment" as a noun

- *The high abstention rate at the election reflected the voters' growing disillusionment with politics.*



## Associations of "Disillusionment" (30 Words)

### **begrudge**

Give reluctantly or resentfully.  
*She **begrudged** Martin his affluence.*

### **bitterly**

Extremely and sharply.  
*The two governments quarrelled **bitterly** over the terms of the loan.*

### **creak**

A squeaking sound.  
*The garden gate **creaked** open.*

### **cry**

Bring into a particular state by crying.  
*This situation is **crying** for attention.*

<b>disappoint</b>	Fail to meet the hopes or expectations of. <i>The governing coalition had bitterly <b>disappointed</b> the hopes of its voters.</i>
<b>disappointed</b>	(of hopes or expectations) prevented from being realized. <i><b>Disappointed</b> expectations and thwarted ambitions.</i>
<b>disappointing</b>	Failing to fulfil someone's hopes or expectations. <i>It was <b>disappointing</b> that there were relatively few possibilities.</i>
<b>disillusioned</b>	Freed from illusion. <i>The minority groups were completely <b>disillusioned</b> with the party.</i>
<b>dreamer</b>	Someone guided more by ideals than by practical considerations. <i>A rebellious young <b>dreamer</b>.</i>
<b>embitter</b>	Cause to be bitter or resentful. <i>He didn't let illness and divorce <b>embitter</b> him.</i>
<b>envy</b>	A person or thing that inspires envy. <i>France has a film industry that is the <b>envy</b> of Europe.</i>
<b>gripe</b>	Secure a boat with gripes. <i>My only <b>gripe</b> is the size of the page numbers.</i>
<b>grouse</b>	Hunt grouse.
<b>idealist</b>	A person who believes in the theory of idealism. <i>Hegel described himself as an absolute <b>idealist</b>.</i>
<b>interference</b>	The fading or disturbance of received radio signals caused by unwanted signals from other sources, such as unshielded electrical equipment, or broadcasts from other stations or channels. <i>An unwarranted <b>interference</b> with personal liberty.</i>
<b>jealousy</b>	A feeling of jealous envy (especially of a rival). <i>Cherish their official political freedom with fierce <b>jealousy</b>.</i>
<b>poignant</b>	Arousing affect. <i><b>Poignant</b> anxiety.</i>
<b>pout</b>	A pouting expression. <i>His lower lip protruded in a sulky <b>pout</b>.</i>
<b>rankle</b>	(of a wound or sore) continue to be painful; fester. <i>The injustice <b>rankled</b> her.</i>
<b>resent</b>	Wish ill or allow unwillingly. <i>She <b>resents</b> being paid less than her co workers.</i>
<b>sniffle</b>	Sniff slightly or repeatedly, typically because of a cold or fit of crying. <i>He was restraining his <b>sniffles</b> rather well.</i>
<b>snivel</b>	An act or sound of snivelling. <i>Lucy's torrent of howls weakened to a <b>snivel</b>.</i>

<b>squawk</b>	The noise of squawking. <i>The geese flew upriver <b>squawking</b>.</i>
<b>strife</b>	Angry or bitter disagreement over fundamental issues; conflict. <i>Decades of civil <b>strife</b>.</i>
<b>sulk</b>	A period of sulking. <i>He was <b>sulking</b> over the break up of his band.</i>
<b>sulky</b>	Moving slowly. <i>Disappointment was making her <b>sulky</b>.</i>
<u><b>unsatisfactory</b></u>	Not satisfactory; not good enough. <i>Her performance proved to be <b>unsatisfactory</b>.</i>
<u><b>weep</b></u>	A fit or period of weeping. <i>Sit down and have a <b>weep</b>.</i>
<u><b>whimper</b></u>	A whimpering sound. <i>Their first appearance in the top flight ended with a <b>whimper</b> rather than a bang.</i>
<b>whine</b>	Move with a whining sound. <i>The dog <b>whined</b> and scratched at the back door.</i>
