## Disintegrate as a Verb

### Definitions of "Disintegrate" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “disintegrate” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Undergo or cause to undergo disintegration at a subatomic level.*
- *Break into parts or components or lose cohesion or unity.*
- *Lose a stored charge, magnetic flux, or current.*
- *Cause to undergo fission or lose particles.*
- *Break up into small parts as the result of impact or decay.*
- *Lose strength or cohesion and gradually fail.*



## Synonyms of "Disintegrate" as a verb (29 Words)

- be frustrated**      Occupy a certain position or area.
- be unsuccessful**    Have life, be alive.
- break apart**        Scatter or part.
- break down**        Break down literally or metaphorically.
- break up**            Become separated into pieces or fragments.
- come to grief**      Reach a destination; arrive by movement or progress.
- come to nothing**    Come from; be connected by a relationship of blood, for example.
- corrode**             Destroy or weaken (something) gradually.  
*Over the years copper pipework **corrodes**.*
- decay**                Undergo decay or decomposition.  
*The trapped radiocarbon begins to **decay** at a known rate.*

<b><u>decompose</u></b>	Break down. <i>Living organisms are used to <b>decompose</b> water into hydrogen and oxygen.</i>
<b>deteriorate</b>	Become progressively worse. <i>If the situation continues to <b>deteriorate</b> the consequences could be severe.</i>
<b>fail</b>	Fail to do something leave something undone. <i>She studied hard but <b>failed</b> nevertheless.</i>
<b>fall apart</b>	Be due.
<b>fall flat</b>	Come as if by falling.
<b>fall through</b>	Be captured.
<b>fall to bits</b>	Be born, used chiefly of lambs.
<b>fall to pieces</b>	Be inherited by.
<b><u>fold</u></b>	Become folded or folded up. <i>The club <b>folded</b> earlier this year.</i>
<b><u>founder</u></b>	Break down, literally or metaphorically. <i>The project <b>foundered</b>.</i>
<b><u>fracture</u></b>	Fracture a bone of. <i>The movement had <b>fractured</b> without his leadership.</i>
<b>fragment</b>	Break or cause to break into fragments. <i>The plate <b>fragmented</b>.</i>
<b>go wrong</b>	Move away from a place into another direction.
<b>miscarry</b>	(of a pregnant woman) experience a miscarriage. <i>Such a rash crime and one so very likely to <b>miscarry</b>.</i>
<b>moulder</b>	Slowly decay or disintegrate, especially because of neglect. <i>The books if any are ever printed will <b>moulder</b> in the warehouse.</i>
<b>not succeed</b>	Attain success or reach a desired goal.
<b>perish</b>	Be suffering from extreme cold. <i>The children <b>perished</b> in the fire.</i>
<b><u>rot</u></b>	Gradually deteriorate, especially through neglect. <i>The chalets were neglected and their woodwork was <b>rotting</b> away.</i>
<b>shatter</b>	Damage or destroy (something abstract). <i>Everyone was <b>shattered</b> by the news.</i>
<b>splinter</b>	Break up into splinters or slivers. <i>He crashed into a fence <b>splintering</b> the wooden barricade.</i>



## Usage Examples of "Disintegrate" as a verb

- *The material disintegrated.*
- *Our shoes had to last until they disintegrated on our feet.*
- *It has become a relatively easy matter to disintegrate almost any atom.*
- *A meson can spontaneously disintegrate.*
- *The group disintegrated after the leader died.*
- *Their marriage disintegrated.*
- *The particles disintegrated during the nuclear fission process.*



## Associations of "Disintegrate" (30 Words)

<b>break</b>	Break a piece from a whole. <i><b>Break</b> into tears.</i>
<b><u>collapse</u></b>	Collapse due to fatigue an illness or a sudden attack. <i>The wall <b>collapsed</b>.</i>
<b>corpse</b>	The dead body of a human being. <i>He believed that fascism would revive the <b>corpse</b> of Europe.</i>
<b>crumb</b>	Break into crumbs. <i>Endless scrabbling for <b>crumbs</b> from the public spending table is undermining morale.</i>
<b>crumble</b>	A pudding made with crumble and fruit. <i>The building <b>crumbled</b> after the explosion.</i>
<b>decay</b>	Fall into decay or ruin. <i>The gas radon is produced by the <b>decay</b> of uranium in rocks and soil.</i>
<b><u>decompose</u></b>	Separate (substances) into constituent elements or parts. <i>Living organisms are used to <b>decompose</b> water into hydrogen and oxygen.</i>
<b>decomposition</b>	The analysis of a vector field. <i>The <b>decomposition</b> of organic waste.</i>
<b><u>deconstruct</u></b>	Analyse a text or linguistic or conceptual system by deconstruction. <i>I want to <b>deconstruct</b> this myth that poverty breeds crime.</i>
<b><u>degradation</u></b>	A low or downcast state. <i>A trail of human misery and <b>degradation</b>.</i>
<b>disassemble</b>	Take (something) to pieces. <i>The piston can be <b>disassembled</b> for transport.</i>
<b>disband</b>	(with reference to an organized group) break up or cause to break up. <i>The principal <b>disbanded</b> the political student organization.</i>
<b><u>dismantle</u></b>	Tear down so as to make flat with the ground. <i>The engines were <b>dismantled</b> and the bits piled into a heap.</i>
<b>dismember</b>	Separate the limbs from the body. <i>He watched a doctor <b>dismember</b> the body.</i>
<b><u>dissolve</u></b>	(film) a gradual transition from one scene to the next; the next scene is gradually superimposed as the former scene fades out. <i>The sugar quickly <b>dissolved</b> in the coffee.</i>
<b>iconoclast</b>	A Puritan of the 16th or 17th century.

<b>iron</b>	A shot made with an iron. <i>Her father had a will of <b>iron</b>.</i>
<b>mangle</b>	Press with a mangle. <i>The car was <b>mangled</b> almost beyond recognition.</i>
<b>molder</b>	Break down.
<b>mutilate</b>	Alter so as to make unrecognizable. <i><b>Mutilated</b> bodies.</i>
<b>perishable</b>	(of something abstract) having a brief life or significance; transitory. <i>Caviar is extremely <b>perishable</b>.</i>
<b>permafrost</b>	A thick subsurface layer of soil that remains below freezing point throughout the year, occurring chiefly in polar regions. <i>Hilly terrain underlain by <b>permafrost</b>.</i>
<b>putrefaction</b>	The process of decay or rotting in a body or other organic matter. <i>The breeze shifted and we caught the stench of <b>putrefaction</b>.</i>
<b>putrid</b>	In an advanced state of decomposition and having a foul odor- Somerset Maugham. <i>Horrible like raw and <b>putrid</b> flesh.</i>
<b>rot</b>	Liver rot in sheep. <i>The education system has been allowed to <b>rot</b>.</i>
<b>rotten</b>	Extremely unpleasant. <i>She was a <b>rotten</b> cook.</i>
<b>soluble</b>	Susceptible of solution or of being solved or explained. <i>The poison is <b>soluble</b> in alcohol.</i>
<b>solvable</b>	Capable of being solved. <i>Such problems are perfectly <b>solvable</b>.</i>
<b>spoil</b>	The act of spoiling something by causing damage to it. <i>Cooper was <b>spoiling</b> for a fight.</i>
<b>spoilage</b>	The action or process of spoiling, especially the deterioration of food and other perishable goods.
