<b>indifference</b>	Mediocrity. <i>The <b>indifference</b> of Chelsea s midfield.</i>
<b>lack of bias</b>	The state of needing something that is absent or unavailable.
<b>lack of care</b>	The state of needing something that is absent or unavailable.
<b>lack of concern</b>	The state of needing something that is absent or unavailable.
<b>lack of curiosity</b>	The state of needing something that is absent or unavailable.
<b>lack of enthusiasm</b>	The state of needing something that is absent or unavailable.
<b>lack of interest</b>	The state of needing something that is absent or unavailable.
<b>lack of prejudice</b>	The state of needing something that is absent or unavailable.
<b>neutrality</b>	The state of not supporting or helping either side in a conflict, disagreement, etc.; impartiality. <i>The clinical <b>neutrality</b> of the description.</i>
<b>objectivity</b>	Judgment based on observable phenomena and uninfluenced by emotions or personal prejudices. <i>The piece lacked any <b>objectivity</b>.</i>

<b>abandonment</b>	The voluntary surrender of property (or a right to property) without attempting to reclaim it or give it away. <i>She had a feeling of utter <b>abandonment</b> and loneliness.</i>
<b>apathy</b>	The trait of lacking enthusiasm for or interest in things generally. <i>Widespread <b>apathy</b> among students.</i>
<b>balance</b>	Bring into balance or equilibrium. <i>The <b>balance</b> of the voices is good.</i>
<b>callous</b>	Make insensitive or callous deaden feelings or morals. <i><b>Calloused</b> skin.</i>

<b><u>careless</u></b>	(of an action or its result) showing or caused by a lack of attention. <i>He admitted <b>careless</b> driving.</i>
<b>carelessness</b>	Failure to give sufficient attention to avoiding harm or errors; negligence. <i>Most road accidents are caused by <b>carelessness</b> on the part of motorists.</i>
<b>cynicism</b>	A school of ancient Greek philosophers, the Cynics. <i><b>Cynicism</b> about the future.</i>
<b>desertion</b>	The action of illegally leaving the armed forces. <i>The number of <b>desertions</b> was rising.</i>
<b>dispassionate</b>	Unaffected by strong emotion or prejudice. <i>A journalist should be a <b>dispassionate</b> reporter of fact.</i>
<b>equilibrium</b>	A state in which a process and its reverse are occurring at equal rates so that no overall change is taking place. <i>Ice is in <b>equilibrium</b> with water.</i>
<b>equipoise</b>	Equality of distribution. <i>As a piece of language it is as delicately <b>equipoised</b> as any.</i>
<b><u>equity</u></b>	The value of the shares issued by a company. <i>He owns 62 of the group s <b>equity</b>.</i>
<b>impartiality</b>	An inclination to weigh both views or opinions equally. <i>Entries had to be submitted under a pseudonym to ensure <b>impartiality</b> in the judging process.</i>
<b><u>inaction</u></b>	Lack of action where some is expected or appropriate. <i>Future generations will condemn us for <b>inaction</b>.</i>
<b>inattention</b>	Lack of attention. <i>His <b>inattention</b> to duty.</i>
<b>indifference</b>	Unbiased impartial unconcern. <i>It cannot be regarded as a matter of <b>indifference</b>.</i>
<b><u>insensitive</u></b>	Not responsive to physical stimuli. <i><b>Insensitive</b> to radiation.</i>
<b>negligent</b>	Characterized by neglect and undue lack of concern. <i><b>Negligent</b> in his correspondence.</i>
<b>neutrality</b>	Nonparticipation in a dispute or war. <i>The clinical <b>neutrality</b> of the description.</i>
<b>nonchalance</b>	The state of being nonchalant. <i>An air of <b>nonchalance</b>.</i>
<b>numbness</b>	Partial or total lack of sensation in a part of the body; a symptom of nerve damage or dysfunction. <i>Tingling and <b>numbness</b> in the left arm.</i>

<b><u>objectivity</u></b>	Judgment based on observable phenomena and uninfluenced by emotions or personal prejudices. <i>The piece lacked any <b>objectivity</b>.</i>
<b>passivity</b>	Acceptance of what happens, without active response or resistance. <i>The perceived <b>passivity</b> of the populace is deceptive.</i>
<b>rationalism</b>	(philosophy) the doctrine that knowledge is acquired by reason without resort to experience. <i>Scientific <b>rationalism</b>.</i>
<b>steadiness</b>	Freedom from wavering or indecision; constancy of resolve or conduct. <i>He trusted her clear <b>steadiness</b> that she would do what she said.</i>
<b>stolid</b>	Having or revealing little emotion or sensibility; not easily aroused or excited. <i>Her face showed nothing but <b>stolid</b> indifference.</i>
<b><u>symmetry</u></b>	An attribute of a shape or relation; exact reflection of form on opposite sides of a dividing line or plane. <i>The political <b>symmetry</b> between the two debates.</i>
<b>tonal</b>	Having tonality i e tones and chords organized in relation to one tone such as a keynote or tonic. <i>His ear for <b>tonal</b> colour.</i>
<b>unconcern</b>	A feeling of lack of concern. <i>He is famed for his laid back attitude his apparent <b>unconcern</b> about his actions.</i>
<b>unsettle</b>	Disturb the composure of. <i>The crisis has <b>unsettled</b> financial markets.</i>
