deceitful	Intended to deceive. <i>Such an act would have been deceitful and irresponsible.</i>
double-dealing	Marked by deliberate deceptiveness especially by pretending one set of feelings and acting under the influence of another- Israel Zangwill.
duplicitous	Deceitful. <i>A duplicitous philanderer.</i>
faithless	Disloyal, especially to a spouse or partner. <i>Her faithless lover.</i>

false	Used in names of plants animals and gems that superficially resemble the thing properly so called e g false oat. <i>False pretenses.</i>
fickle	Liable to sudden unpredictable change. <i>Fickle friends.</i>
inconstant	Likely to change frequently often without apparent or cogent reason; variable. <i>An inconstant lover.</i>
janus-faced	Having or concerned with polarities or contrasts.
perfidious	Tending to betray; especially having a treacherous character as attributed to the Carthaginians by the Romans. <i>The perfidious Judas.</i>
<u>traitorous</u>	Relating to or characteristic of a traitor; treacherous. <i>When his traitorous actions were discovered he was imprisoned.</i>
two-faced	Marked by deliberate deceptiveness especially by pretending one set of feelings and acting under the influence of another- Israel Zangwill.
undependable	Not trustworthy and reliable. <i>An undependable generalization.</i>
<u>unfaithful</u>	Not trustworthy. <i>An unfaithful lover.</i>
unpatriotic	Showing lack of love for your country.
unreliable	Not able to be relied upon. <i>He s lazy and unreliable.</i>
<u>untrue</u>	Not true to an obligation or trust. <i>Is untrue to his highest opportunity and duty.</i>
untrustworthy	Not worthy of trust or belief. <i>Thomas considered her to be devious and untrustworthy.</i>

Usage Examples of "Disloyal" as an adjective

- *Disloyal aides revealed his indiscretions to the papers.*
- *Disloyal mutterings about his leadership.*
- *She was accused of being disloyal to the government.*

Associations of "Disloyal" (30 Words)

<u>apostate</u>	Not faithful to religion or party or cause. <i>After fifty years as an apostate he returned to the faith.</i>
betray	Give away information about somebody. <i>Many of those employed by diplomats betrayed secrets.</i>
<u>betrayal</u>	An act of deliberate betrayal. <i>These developments represented a betrayal of democracy.</i>
betrayor	One who reveals confidential information in return for money.
cheat	An act of cheating a fraud or deception. <i>She always cheats at cards.</i>
cheating	A deception for profit to yourself.
deceive	(of a thing) give (someone) a mistaken impression. <i>The area may seem to offer nothing of interest but don't be deceived.</i>
defector	A person who abandons their duty (as on a military post). <i>Staff interviewed escapees and defectors to the West.</i>
faithless	Disloyal, especially to a spouse or partner. <i>The faithless Benedict Arnold.</i>
infidelity	Disbelief in a particular religion, especially Christianity. <i>Her infidelity continued after her marriage.</i>
insurgent	Relating to rebels. <i>A series of insurgent attacks.</i>
mutinous	Disposed to or in a state of mutiny. <i>A mutinous speech.</i>
perfidious	Tending to betray; especially having a treacherous character as attributed to the Carthaginians by the Romans. <i>The perfidious Judas.</i>
perfidy	The state of being deceitful and untrustworthy. <i>Hapsburg perfidy.</i>
quisling	Someone who collaborates with an enemy occupying force. <i>He had the Quisling owner of the factory arrested.</i>
<u>rebel</u>	A person who takes part in an armed rebellion against the constituted authority especially in the hope of improving conditions. <i>Tory rebels.</i>
<u>rebellious</u>	Participating in organized resistance to a constituted government. <i>Temperamentally rebellious.</i>
<u>renegade</u>	Become a renegade. <i>Renegade supporters of the usurper.</i>

<u>revolt</u>	Take violent action against an established government or ruler; rebel. <i>Voters may revolt when they realize the cost of the measures.</i>
<u>revolutionary</u>	Engaged in or promoting political revolution. <i>A revolutionary new drug.</i>
<u>sedition</u>	In opposition to a civil authority or government. <i>The letter was declared sedition.</i>
<u>subversive</u>	A subversive person. <i>Subversive literature.</i>
<u>traitor</u>	A person who betrays someone or something, such as a friend, cause, or principle. <i>He was a traitor to his own class.</i>
<u>traitorous</u>	Having the character of, or characteristic of, a traitor. <i>A lying traitorous insurrectionist.</i>
<u>treacherous</u>	Tending to betray especially having a treacherous character as attributed to the Carthaginians by the Romans. <i>A holidaymaker was swept away by treacherous currents.</i>
<u>treachery</u>	Betrayal of a trust. <i>The treachery of language.</i>
<u>treason</u>	The crime of betraying one's country, especially by attempting to kill or overthrow the sovereign or government. <i>They were convicted of treason.</i>
<u>treasonable</u>	(of an offence or offender) punishable as treason or as committing treason. <i>There was no evidence of treasonable activity.</i>
<u>turncoat</u>	A person who deserts one party or cause in order to join an opposing one. <i>They denounced him as a turncoat.</i>
<u>unfaithful</u>	Not true to duty or obligation or promises. <i>Her husband was unfaithful.</i>
