### Definitions of "Disloyal" as an adjective

- *Deserting your allegiance or duty to leader or cause or principle.*
- *Failing to be loyal to a person, country, or organization to which one has obligations.*
- *Showing lack of love for your country.*
- *(of a remark or thought) demonstrating a lack of loyalty.*

### Synonyms of "Disloyal" as an adjective (17 Words)

<b>deceitful</b>	Intended to deceive. <i>Such an act would have been <b>deceitful</b> and irresponsible.</i>
<b>double-dealing</b>	Marked by deliberate deceptiveness especially by pretending one set of feelings and acting under the influence of another- Israel Zangwill.
<b>duplicitous</b>	Deceitful. <i>A <b>duplicitous</b> philanderer.</i>
<b>faithless</b>	Disloyal, especially to a spouse or partner. <i>Her <b>faithless</b> lover.</i>

<b>false</b>	Used in names of plants animals and gems that superficially resemble the thing properly so called e g false oat. <b>False pretenses.</b>
<b>fickle</b>	Liable to sudden unpredictable change. <b>Fickle friends.</b>
<b>inconstant</b>	Likely to change frequently often without apparent or cogent reason; variable. <b>An inconstant lover.</b>
<b>janus-faced</b>	Having or concerned with polarities or contrasts.
<b>perfidious</b>	Tending to betray; especially having a treacherous character as attributed to the Carthaginians by the Romans. <b>The perfidious Judas.</b>
<b>traitorous</b>	Relating to or characteristic of a traitor; treacherous. <i>When his <b>traitorous</b> actions were discovered he was imprisoned.</i>
<b>two-faced</b>	Marked by deliberate deceptiveness especially by pretending one set of feelings and acting under the influence of another- Israel Zangwill.
<b>undependable</b>	Not trustworthy and reliable. <b>An undependable generalization.</b>
<b>unfaithful</b>	Not trustworthy. <b>An unfaithful lover.</b>
<b>unpatriotic</b>	Showing lack of love for your country.
<b>unreliable</b>	Not able to be relied upon. <i>He s lazy and <b>unreliable</b>.</i>
<b>untrue</b>	Not true to an obligation or trust. <i>Is <b>untrue</b> to his highest opportunity and duty.</i>
<b>untrustworthy</b>	Not worthy of trust or belief. <i>Thomas considered her to be devious and <b>untrustworthy</b>.</i>

### Usage Examples of "Disloyal" as an adjective

- *Disloyal aides revealed his indiscretions to the papers.*
- *Disloyal mutterings about his leadership.*
- *She was accused of being disloyal to the government.*

### Associations of "Disloyal" (30 Words)

<b><u>apostate</u></b>	Not faithful to religion or party or cause. <i>After fifty years as an <b>apostate</b> he returned to the faith.</i>
<b>betray</b>	Give away information about somebody. <i>Many of those employed by diplomats <b>betrayed</b> secrets.</i>
<b><u>betrayal</u></b>	An act of deliberate betrayal. <i>These developments represented a <b>betrayal</b> of democracy.</i>
<b>betrayor</b>	One who reveals confidential information in return for money.
<b>cheat</b>	An act of cheating a fraud or deception. <i>She always <b>cheats</b> at cards.</i>
<b>cheating</b>	A deception for profit to yourself.
<b>deceive</b>	(of a thing) give (someone) a mistaken impression. <i>The area may seem to offer nothing of interest but don t be <b>deceived</b>.</i>
<b>defector</b>	A person who abandons their duty (as on a military post). <i>Staff interviewed escapees and <b>defectors</b> to the West.</i>
<b>faithless</b>	Disloyal, especially to a spouse or partner. <i>The <b>faithless</b> Benedict Arnold.</i>
<b>infidelity</b>	Disbelief in a particular religion, especially Christianity. <i>Her <b>infidelity</b> continued after her marriage.</i>
<b>insurgent</b>	Relating to rebels. <i>A series of <b>insurgent</b> attacks.</i>
<b>mutinous</b>	Disposed to or in a state of mutiny. <i>A <b>mutinous</b> speech.</i>
<b>perfidious</b>	Tending to betray; especially having a treacherous character as attributed to the Carthaginians by the Romans. <i>The <b>perfidious</b> Judas.</i>
<b>perfidy</b>	The state of being deceitful and untrustworthy. <i>Hapsburg <b>perfidy</b>.</i>
<b>quisling</b>	Someone who collaborates with an enemy occupying force. <i>He had the <b>Quisling</b> owner of the factory arrested.</i>
<b><u>rebel</u></b>	A person who takes part in an armed rebellion against the constituted authority especially in the hope of improving conditions. <i>Tory <b>rebels</b>.</i>
<b><u>rebellious</u></b>	Participating in organized resistance to a constituted government. <i>Temperamentally <b>rebellious</b>.</i>
<b><u>renegade</u></b>	Become a renegade. <i><b>Renegade</b> supporters of the usurper.</i>

<b><u>revolt</u></b>	Take violent action against an established government or ruler; rebel. <i>Voters may <b>revolt</b> when they realize the cost of the measures.</i>
<b><u>revolutionary</u></b>	Engaged in or promoting political revolution. <i>A <b>revolutionary</b> new drug.</i>
<b>seeditious</b>	In opposition to a civil authority or government. <i>The letter was declared <b>seeditious</b>.</i>
<b><u>subversive</u></b>	A subversive person. <i><b>Subversive</b> literature.</i>
<b><u>traitor</u></b>	A person who betrays someone or something, such as a friend, cause, or principle. <i>He was a <b>traitor</b> to his own class.</i>
<b><u>traitorous</u></b>	Having the character of, or characteristic of, a traitor. <i>A lying <b>traitorous</b> insurrectionist.</i>
<b>treacherous</b>	Tending to betray especially having a treacherous character as attributed to the Carthaginians by the Romans. <i>A holidaymaker was swept away by <b>treacherous</b> currents.</i>
<b><u>treachery</u></b>	Betrayal of a trust. <i>The <b>treachery</b> of language.</i>
<b><u>treason</u></b>	The crime of betraying one's country, especially by attempting to kill or overthrow the sovereign or government. <i>They were convicted of <b>treason</b>.</i>
<b>treasonable</b>	(of an offence or offender) punishable as treason or as committing treason. <i>There was no evidence of <b>treasonable</b> activity.</i>
<b><u>turncoat</u></b>	A person who deserts one party or cause in order to join an opposing one. <i>They denounced him as a <b>turncoat</b>.</i>
<b><u>unfaithful</u></b>	Not true to duty or obligation or promises. <i>Her husband was <b>unfaithful</b>.</i>
