- aghast** Filled with horror or shock.
*She winced **aghast** at his cruelty.*
- appalled** Greatly dismayed or horrified.
*I am absolutely **appalled** that anyone should be attacked in this manner.*
- shocked** Struck with fear, dread, or consternation.

abominable	Very bad; terrible. <i>The uprising was suppressed with abominable cruelty.</i>
afraid	Filled with regret or concern; used often to soften an unpleasant statement. <i>Afraid even to turn his head.</i>
aghast	Filled with horror or shock. <i>She winced aghast at his cruelty.</i>
alarmed	Experiencing a sudden sense of danger.
amazed	Greatly surprised; astonished. <i>She shook her head in amazed disbelief.</i>
astonished	Filled with the emotional impact of overwhelming surprise or shock. <i>I stood enthralled astonished by the vastness and majesty of the cathedral.</i>

astounded	Filled with the emotional impact of overwhelming surprise or shock. <i>Astounded viewers wept at the pictures from the Oklahoma City bombing.</i>
bemuse	Puzzle, confuse, or bewilder (someone). <i>He was bemused by what was happening.</i>
<u>bemused</u>	Perplexed by many conflicting situations or statements; filled with bewilderment. <i>A crowd of bemused onlookers.</i>
bewildered	Perplexed and confused; very puzzled. <i>He saw the bewildered look on my face.</i>
<u>complicated</u>	Consisting of many interconnecting parts or elements; intricate. <i>Complicated Middle East politics.</i>
confused	Mentally confused unable to think with clarity or act intelligently. <i>A confused expression crossed her face.</i>
<u>disorganized</u>	Unable to plan one's activities efficiently. <i>She s very muddled and disorganized.</i>
fearful	Extremely distressing. <i>Fearful slum conditions.</i>
<u>flabbergasted</u>	As if struck dumb with astonishment and surprise. <i>This news has left me totally flabbergasted.</i>
<u>formidable</u>	Inspiring fear- G.H.Johnston. <i>The formidable army of brains at the Prime Minister s disposal.</i>
illusive	Based on or having the nature of an illusion. <i>Illusive hopes of finding a better job.</i>
loon	Large somewhat primitive fish-eating diving bird of the northern hemisphere having webbed feet placed far back; related to the grebes. <i>If only she weren t such a lovesick loon.</i>
melee	A confused crowd of people. <i>The melee of people that were always thronging the streets.</i>
mistakenly	In a mistaken way; wrongly. <i>Warplanes mistakenly bombed a village.</i>
<u>perplexed</u>	Completely baffled; very puzzled. <i>Perplexed language.</i>
perplexing	Completely baffling; very puzzling. <i>Perplexing to someone who knew nothing about it.</i>
<u>puzzled</u>	Unable to understand; perplexed. <i>Puzzled that she left without saying goodbye.</i>

scared	Made afraid. <i>I m scared stiff of flying.</i>
<u>shattered</u>	Exhausted. <i>Our shattered dreams of peace and prosperity.</i>
<u>shocked</u>	Struck with fear, dread, or consternation.
<u>startled</u>	Feeling or showing sudden shock or alarm. <i>Her startled expression.</i>
surprise	Cause to be surprised. <i>Joe was surprised that he enjoyed the journey.</i>
surprised	Taken unawares or suddenly and feeling wonder or astonishment. <i>A surprised expression.</i>
<u>vertigo</u>	A sensation of whirling and loss of balance, associated particularly with looking down from a great height, or caused by disease affecting the inner ear or the vestibular nerve; giddiness.
