- *Order or allow to leave; send away.*
- *Deliberately cease to think about.*
- *(of a group assembled under someone's authority) disperse.*
- *Refuse further hearing to (a case).*
- *Stop associating with.*
- *Bar from attention or consideration.*
- *Declare void.*
- *Cease to consider; put out of judicial consideration.*
- *End the innings of (a batsman or a side).*
- *End one's encounter with somebody by causing or permitting the person to leave.*

- Remove from employment or office, typically on the grounds of unsatisfactory performance.

Stop maintaining or insisting on; of ideas or claims.  
*They **abandoned** themselves to despair.*

### **banish**

Get rid of (something unwanted).  
*A number of people were **banished** to Siberia for political crimes.*

### **brush aside**

Remove with or as if with a brush.

### **brush off**

Rub with a brush, or as if with a brush.

### **can**

Preserve in a can or tin.  
*There are many ways holidaymakers **can** take money abroad.*

### **discharge**

Go off or discharge.  
***Discharge** one's duties.*

### **discount**

Buy or sell (a bill of exchange) before its due date at less than its maturity value.  
*I'd heard rumours but **discounted** them.*

### **displace**

Take the place of or have precedence over.  
*The refugees were **displaced** by the war.*

disregard

Refuse to acknowledge.

*The body of evidence is too substantial to **disregard**.*

dissolve

Disappear.

*She suddenly **dissolved** into floods of tears.*

**drop**

Score a goal by a drop kick.

*She **dropped** a remark about having been included in the selection.*

**fire**

Drive out or away by or as if by fire.

*If I were to hear anyone speak slightly of you I should **fire** up in a moment.*

**force out**

Urge or force (a person) to an action; constrain or motivate.

forget

Forget to do something.

*For years she had struggled to **forget** about him.*

**free**

Grant freedom to free from confinement.

*His inheritance **freed** him from financial constraints.*

**get rid of**

Go or come after and bring or take back.

**give notice**

Leave with; give temporarily.

**give someone their notice**

Estimate the duration or outcome of something.

**give the axe**

Estimate the duration or outcome of something.

**give the sack**

Execute and deliver.

**have done with**

Organize or be responsible for.

**ignore**

Bar from attention or consideration.

*The rules **ignore** one important principle of cricket.*

**lay aside**

Lay eggs.

**let go**

Grant use or occupation of under a term of contract.

**pay no heed to**

Convey, as of a compliment, regards, attention, etc.; bestow.

**push aside**

Press against forcefully without moving.

**put away**

Make an investment.

**put out of one's mind**

Adapt.

**release**

Release as from one's grip.

***Release** the holdings in the dictator's bank account.*

**sack**

Put into a sack or sacks.

*Any official found to be involved would be **sacked** on the spot.*

**send away**

Transfer.

**send packing**

Transfer.

<b>set aside</b>	Locate.
<b>shrug off</b>	Raise one's shoulders to indicate indifference or resignation.
<b>terminate</b>	Terminate the employment of discharge from an office or position. <i>Adamson s putting pressure on me to <b>terminate</b> you.</i>
<b>think no more of</b>	Focus one's attention on a certain state.
<b>throw out</b>	Move violently, energetically, or carelessly.
<b>usher out</b>	Take (someone) to their seats, as in theaters or auditoriums.

<b>abandon</b>	Cease to support or look after (someone); desert. <i>She danced with <b>abandon</b>.</i>
<b>bin</b>	Throw something away by putting it in a bin. <i>She was a bit weird so I <b>binned</b> her off.</i>
<b>blithe</b>	Showing a casual and cheerful indifference considered to be callous or improper. <i>A <b>blithe</b> seaside comedy.</i>
<b>carelessly</b>	In a rakish manner. <i>He replied <b>carelessly</b>.</i>
<b>connive</b>	Secretly allow (something immoral, illegal, or harmful) to occur. <i>Government officials were prepared to <b>connive</b> in impeding the course of justice.</i>
<b><u>crass</u></b>	Showing no intelligence or sensitivity. <i>The <b>crass</b> assumptions that men make about women.</i>

<b>disband</b>	Cause to break up or cease to function. <i>From today the choir shall be <b>disbanded</b>.</i>
<b><u>discard</u></b>	Anything that is cast aside or discarded. <i>Hilary bundled up the clothes she had <b>discarded</b>.</i>
<b>dispose</b>	Give, sell, or transfer to another. <i>The government proposed but the trade union movement <b>disposed</b>.</i>
<b><u>disregard</u></b>	The action or state of paying no attention to something. <i>The body of evidence is too substantial to <b>disregard</b>.</i>
<b>dump</b>	A piece of land where waste materials are dumped. <i>She <b>dumped</b> her boyfriend when she fell in love with a rich man.</i>
<b>eliminate</b>	Eliminate from the body. <i>The cyclist has <b>eliminated</b> all the competitors in the race.</i>
<b>ignore</b>	Fail to consider (something significant). <i>The rules <b>ignore</b> one important principle of cricket.</i>
<b><u>jettison</u></b>	The action of jettisoning something. <i>Six aircraft <b>jettisoned</b> their loads in the sea.</i>
<b>junk</b>	Junk bonds. <i>You do anything for <b>junk</b> cheat lie steal.</i>
<b>leave</b>	Go and leave behind either intentionally or by neglect or forgetfulness. <i><b>Leave</b> lots of time for the trip.</i>
<b>leaving</b>	The act of departing.
<b><u>lighthearted</u></b>	Carefree and happy and lighthearted. <i>Her <b>lighthearted</b> nature.</i>
<b><u>neglect</u></b>	The state of something that has been unused and neglected. <i>The place had a hopeless air of <b>neglect</b>.</i>
<b><u>overlook</u></b>	Bewitch with the evil eye. <i>He was <b>overlooked</b> by the Nobel committee.</i>
<b>quiet</b>	With little or no activity or no agitation quiet is a nonstandard variant for quietly. <i>The street was <b>quiet</b>.</i>
<b><u>rebuff</u></b>	Reject outright and bluntly. <i>I asked her to be my wife and was <b>rebuffed</b> in no uncertain terms.</i>
<b>reject</b>	Reject with contempt. <i><b>Reject</b> china plates.</i>
<b>resign</b>	Accept as inevitable. <i>Four deputies <b>resigned</b> their seats.</i>



<b>snub</b>	Refuse to acknowledge. <i>The move was a <b>snub</b> to the government.</i>
<b>squander</b>	Spend extravagantly. <i>You <b>squandered</b> the opportunity to get an advanced degree.</i>
<b>terminate</b>	Terminate the employment of; discharge from an office or position. <i>The chain <b>terminated</b> in an iron ball covered with spikes.</i>
<b>tranquelize</b>	Cause to be calm or quiet as by administering a sedative to.
<b>trash</b>	An amphetamine derivative (trade name Methedrine) used in the form of a crystalline hydrochloride; used as a stimulant to the nervous system and as an appetite suppressant. <i>Clubs patronized by rock <b>trash</b>.</i>
<b>waste</b>	Run off as waste. <i>The icy <b>wastes</b> of the Antarctic.</i>
