chaotic	Completely unordered and unpredictable and confusing. <i>The political situation was chaotic.</i>
cluttered	Filled or scattered with a disorderly accumulation of objects or rubbish. <i>His library was a cluttered room with piles of books on every chair.</i>
confused	Mentally confused unable to think with clarity or act intelligently. <i>Interviewing confused old people does take longer.</i>
disordered	Not arranged in order. <i>She went to comb her disordered hair.</i>
disorderly	Involving or contributing to a breakdown of peaceful and law-abiding behaviour. <i>Disorderly conduct.</i>
disorganised	Lacking order or methodical arrangement or function.
haphazard	Marked by great carelessness. <i>A haphazard plan of action.</i>
incapable	Not meeting requirements. <i>Incapable of doing the work.</i>
ineffective	Not producing any significant or desired effect. <i>An ineffective administration.</i>
ineffectual	(of a person) lacking the ability or qualities to fulfil a role or handle a situation. <i>An ineffectual campaign.</i>
inefficient	Lacking the ability or skill to perform effectively; inadequate. <i>Inefficient workers.</i>
jumbled	In utter disorder.
messy	Generating or involving mess. <i>Stripping wallpaper can be a messy time consuming job.</i>
mixed up	Involving or composed of different races.
muddled	Not clear or coherent; confused. <i>Such a view reflects muddled thinking.</i>
random	Odd, unusual, or unexpected. <i>Are you going to take some random guy on Twitter s word.</i>
topsy-turvy	In utter disorder.
undisciplined	Not subjected to correction or discipline. <i>The paintings were the work of an undisciplined talent.</i>

unmethodical	Not orderly and systematic. <i>The project failed through unmethodical planning.</i>
unorganized	Not affiliated in a trade union. <i>Unorganized data.</i>
unprepared	Without preparation; not prepared for- R.E.Danielson. <i>Paintings on unprepared canvas.</i>
unsystematic	Not done or acting according to a fixed plan or system; unmethodical. <i>Unsystematic and fragmentary records.</i>
untidy	Not neat and tidy. <i>Untidy and casual about money.</i>

boisterous	Violently agitated and turbulent. <i>A boisterous crowd.</i>
chaotic	Completely unordered and unpredictable and confusing. <i>The political situation was chaotic.</i>
complex	Make an atom or compound form a complex with another. <i>The complex of shopping malls houses and roads created a new town.</i>
confused	Mentally confused unable to think with clarity or act intelligently. <i>Interviewing confused old people does take longer.</i>
convolution	A function derived from two given functions by integration which expresses how the shape of one is modified by the other. <i>The convolutions of farm policy.</i>

<u>disjointed</u>	Separated at the joint. <i>A disjointed fowl.</i>
disordered	Thrown into a state of disarray or confusion. <i>She went to comb her disordered hair.</i>
disorderly	Involving or contributing to a breakdown of peaceful and law-abiding behaviour. <i>Disorderly youths.</i>
distributed	Shared or spread out. <i>The distributed supplies are meticulously monitored to make sure everyone gets their share.</i>
<u>dysfunctional</u>	(of a trait or condition) failing to serve an adjustive purpose. <i>Dysfunctional families.</i>
eddy	Founder of Christian Science in 1866 (1821-1910). <i>An eddy of chill air swirled into the carriage.</i>
garbled	(of a message, sound, or transmission) confused and distorted; unclear. <i>I got a garbled set of directions.</i>
helical	In the shape of a coil. <i>Helical molecules.</i>
illogical	Lacking orderly continuity. <i>An illogical fear of the supernatural.</i>
<u>incoherent</u>	(of spoken or written language) expressed in an incomprehensible or confusing way; unclear. <i>Incoherent with grief.</i>
intricate	Very complicated or detailed. <i>Intricate lacework.</i>
jumble	Be all mixed up or jumbled together. <i>We are collecting jumble for charity.</i>
maelstrom	A powerful whirlpool in the sea or a river. <i>The train station was a maelstrom of crowds.</i>
<u>messy</u>	Dirty and disorderly. <i>Stripping wallpaper can be a messy time consuming job.</i>
<u>promiscuous</u>	Casual and unrestrained in sexual behavior. <i>Promiscuous teenagers.</i>
purl	Knit with a purl stitch. <i>Knit one purl one.</i>
roil	Make (a liquid) turbid or muddy by disturbing the sediment. <i>The sea roiled below her.</i>

scattered	Occurring or found at intervals or various locations rather than all together. <i>Changes in the angular distribution of scattered light.</i>
<u>swirl</u>	Cause to move in a twisting or spiralling pattern. <i>Swirls of dust swept across the floor.</i>
tumultuous	Characterized by unrest or disorder or insubordination. <i>The tumultuous years of his administration.</i>
vortex	The shape of something rotating rapidly. <i>We were caught in a vortex of water.</i>
<u>whirl</u>	Revolve quickly and repeatedly around one's own axis. <i>Kate made her way back to the office her mind whirling.</i>
whirlpool	A quickly rotating mass of water in a river or sea into which objects may be drawn, typically caused by the meeting of conflicting currents. <i>He was drawing her down into an emotional whirlpool.</i>
