## **Disparate as an Adjective**

### **Definitions of "Disparate" as an adjective**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “disparate” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Fundamentally different or distinct in quality or kind.*
- *Including markedly dissimilar elements.*
- *Essentially different in kind; not able to be compared.*
- *Containing elements very different from one another.*



## Synonyms of "Disparate" as an adjective (6 Words)

- contrasting** Strikingly different; tending to contrast.  
***Contrasting** or contrastive colors.*
- different** Distinctly separate from the first.  
*Each interviewed **different** members of the community.*
- differing** Not the same as each other; dissimilar.  
*Widely **differing** circumstances.*
- dissimilar** Marked by dissimilarity.  
*The pleasures of the romance novel are not **dissimilar** from those of the chocolate bar.*
- unlike** Not alike or similar.  
*As **unlike** as two people could be.*
- unlike** Dissimilar or different from each other.  
*He was very **unlike** to any other man.*



## Usage Examples of "Disparate" as an adjective

- *They inhabit disparate worlds of thought.*
- *Disparate ideas.*
- *Such disparate attractions as grand opera and game fishing.*
- *A disparate aggregate of creeds and songs and prayers.*
- *A culturally disparate country.*



## Associations of "Disparate" (30 Words)

<b>categorize</b>	Place into or assign to a category. <i>Silk is <b>categorized</b> as a luxury import.</i>
<b>changed</b>	Changed in constitution or structure or composition by metamorphism. <i>A greatly <b>changed</b> country after the war.</i>
<b>contrastingly</b>	In a contrasting manner.
<b>diametrical</b>	Characterized by opposite extremes; completely opposed. <i>He s the <b>diametrical</b> opposite of Gabriel.</i>
<b><u>differ</u></b>	Be different. <i>He <b>differed</b> from his contemporaries in ethical matters.</i>



<b>differentiate</b>	Transform (a function) into its derivative. <i>Children can <b>differentiate</b> the past from the present.</i>
<b>differently</b>	In a way that is not the same as another or as before. <i>He likes to do things a bit <b>differently</b>.</i>
<b>discrepancy</b>	An illogical or surprising lack of compatibility or similarity between two or more facts. <i>There s a <b>discrepancy</b> between your account and his.</i>
<b>discrete</b>	Individually separate and distinct. <i>A government with three <b>discrete</b> divisions.</i>
<b>disjointed</b>	Lacking a coherent sequence or connection. <i>Piecing together <b>disjointed</b> fragments of information.</i>
<b>dissimilar</b>	Marked by dissimilarity. <i>A pump not <b>dissimilar</b> to those once found on every farm.</i>
<b>distinction</b>	An honor awarded to someone in recognition of achievement or superiority. <i>He learned the <b>distinction</b> between gold and lead.</i>
<b>distinguish</b>	Make conspicuous or noteworthy. <i>We <b>distinguish</b> several kinds of maple.</i>
<b>diversity</b>	A range of different things. <i>Cultural <b>diversity</b> within his businesses helped generate his success.</i>
<b>divided</b>	Not united; in disagreement. <i>A <b>divided</b> party leadership.</i>
<b>dramatically</b>	By a strikingly large amount or to a strikingly large extent; greatly. <i>She paused <b>dramatically</b>.</i>
<b>each</b>	To, for, or by every one of a group (used after a noun or an amount). <i>Paul and Bill have a glass <b>each</b>.</i>
<b>gap</b>	Make an opening or gap in. <i>There was a <b>gap</b> in his account.</i>
<b>heterogeneous</b>	Consisting of elements that are not of the same kind or nature. <i><b>Heterogeneous</b> catalysis.</i>
<b>incompatibility</b>	The condition of two things being so different in nature as to be incapable of coexisting. <i>Our different backgrounds had something to do with our <b>incompatibility</b>.</i>
<b>incompatible</b>	Incapable of being used with or connected to other devices or components without modification. <i><b>Incompatible</b> colors.</i>

<b>inconsistent</b>	Displaying a lack of consistency. <i><b>Inconsistent</b> with the roadmap.</i>
<b>individuation</b>	The quality of being individual.
<b><u>otherwise</u></b>	In a different state or situation. <i>He means mischief if it is no good pretending <b>otherwise</b>.</i>
<b>separable</b>	(of an English phrasal verb) allowing the insertion of the direct object between the base verb and the particle, e.g. look it over as opposed to go over it. <i>The siamese twins were not considered <b>separable</b>.</i>
<b>separate</b>	Separated according to race sex class or religion. <i>He regards the study of literature as quite <b>separate</b> from life.</i>
<b>separately</b>	Apart from others. <i>I shall consider that figure <b>separately</b> from the prime costs.</i>
<b><u>unlike</u></b>	Not like; different from. <i>They seemed utterly <b>unlike</b> despite being twins.</i>
<b>unshared</b>	Not shared. <i>Most of those placed in hostels would prefer <b>unshared</b> independent accommodation.</i>
<b><u>vary</u></b>	Become different in some particular way, without permanently losing one's or its former characteristics or essence. <i>The properties <b>vary</b> in price.</i>
