<b>account</b>	A client having an account with a supplier. <i>The barman was doing his <b>accounts</b>.</i>
<b>announcement</b>	The action of making an announcement. <i>A loudspeaker <b>announcement</b> echoed across the field.</i>
<b>briskness</b>	Liveliness and eagerness.
<b><u>bulletin</u></b>	A regular newsletter or report issued by an organization.

<b>communication</b>	Means of sending or receiving information, such as phone lines or computers. <i>There was a lack of <b>communication</b> between Pamela and her parents.</i>
<b>communiqué</b>	An official report (usually sent in haste).
<b>consignment</b>	The delivery of goods for sale or disposal. <i>A <b>consignment</b> of drugs.</i>
<b>despatch</b>	An official report (usually sent in haste).
<b>destruction</b>	The termination of something by causing so much damage to it that it cannot be repaired or no longer exists. <i>Gambling was his <b>destruction</b>.</i>
<b>elimination</b>	The act of removing or getting rid of something. <i>Bezout's method of <b>elimination</b>.</i>
<b>epistle</b>	A poem or other literary work in the form of a letter or series of letters. <i>Activists firing off angry <b>epistles</b>.</i>
<b>expedition</b>	The people involved in an expedition. <i>A shopping <b>expedition</b>.</i>
<b>expeditiousness</b>	The property of being prompt and efficient.
<b>extermination</b>	Complete annihilation. <i>The near <b>extermination</b> of the buffalo herds.</i>
<b>haste</b>	Excessive speed or urgency of movement or action; hurry. <i>In his <b>haste</b> to leave he forgot his book.</i>
<b>hastiness</b>	Hasty impulsiveness.
<b>hurriedness</b>	Overly eager speed (and possible carelessness).
<b>instruction</b>	A code in a program which defines and carries out an operation. <i><b>Instruction</b> in the Roman Catholic faith.</i>
<b>killings</b>	A very large profit. <i>The community was shocked by the brutal <b>killings</b>.</i>
<b>letter</b>	An emblem in the shape of the initial letter of a school or university's name awarded to a student for achievement in sport. <i>Your personality matters far more than <b>letters</b> after your name.</i>
<b>line</b>	Denoting an image consisting of lines and solid areas with no gradation of tone. <i>He opened another <b>line</b> of attack.</i>
<b>liquidation</b>	The clearing of a debt. <i>The company went into <b>liquidation</b>.</i>

<b>mailing</b>	The action or process of sending something by mail. <i>The postmark indicates the time of <b>mailing</b>.</i>
<b>massacre</b>	An indiscriminate and brutal slaughter of many people. <i>The 25 000 ecstatic fans that packed into Coruna s shabby Riazor Stadium witnessed a <b>massacre</b>.</i>
<b>message</b>	A television or radio advertisement. <i>He sent a three word <b>message</b>.</i>
<b>missive</b>	A letter, especially a long or official one. <i>Yet another <b>missive</b> from the Foreign Office.</i>
<b>note</b>	A written sign representing the pitch and duration of a musical note. <i>A ten pound <b>note</b>.</i>
<b>promptness</b>	The quality or habit of adhering to an appointed time.
<b><u>quickness</u></b>	The quality of being prompt to understand, think, or learn. <i>An athlete with outstanding <b>quickness</b> and agility.</i>
<b>rapidity</b>	The quality of moving or reacting with great speed. <i>Technology spreads with extraordinary <b>rapidity</b>.</i>
<b>release</b>	A handle or catch that releases part of a mechanism. <i>There was a sudden <b>release</b> of oxygen.</i>
<b>report</b>	The act of informing by verbal report. <i>He was a person of bad <b>report</b>.</i>
<b>sending</b>	An unpleasant or evil thing or creature supposedly sent by someone with paranormal or magical powers to warn, punish, or take revenge on a person.
<b>shipment</b>	The act of sending off something. <i>The <b>shipment</b> arrived at Liverpool.</i>
<b>shipping</b>	Conveyance provided by the ships belonging to one country or industry. <i>The <b>shipping</b> of his works abroad.</i>
<b><u>slaughter</u></b>	The killing of animals for food. <i>The <b>slaughter</b> of 20 peaceful demonstrators.</i>
<b><u>speed</u></b>	Something that matches one's tastes or inclinations. <i>They were bemused by the <b>speed</b> of events.</i>
<b>speediness</b>	A rate that is rapid.
<b>statement</b>	A line of code written as part of a computer program. <i>Minton s love of clear <b>statement</b>.</i>
<b>swiftness</b>	Lack of delay; promptness. <i>Researchers were impressed with the <b>swiftness</b> of responses.</i>

**transmittal**

The act of sending a message; causing a message to be transmitted.  
*A law prohibiting unlicensed money **transmittals**.*

**urgency**

Insistent solicitation and entreaty.  
*Emilia heard the **urgency** in his voice.*

<b>complete</b>	Complete a pass. <i>Please <b>complete</b> the attached forms.</i>
<b><u>conclude</u></b>	Decide by reasoning; draw or come to a conclusion. <i>They <b>concluded</b> an economic agreement.</i>
<b>deal with</b>	Be in charge of, act on, or dispose of.
<b>despatch</b>	Kill without delay.
<b>discharge</b>	Go off or discharge. <i>She was conditionally <b>discharged</b> for two years at Oxford Crown Court.</i>
<b>dispose of</b>	Give, sell, or transfer to another.
<b>do away with</b>	Engage in.

<b>execute</b>	Produce (a work of art). <i>Police <b>executed</b> a search warrant.</i>
<b>finish</b>	Come or bring to a finish or an end. <i>They were straining to <b>finish</b> the job.</i>
<b>finish off</b>	Come or bring to a finish or an end.
<b>freight</b>	Load with goods for transportation. <i>The metals had been <b>freighted</b> from the city.</i>
<b>hit</b>	Score a run or point by hitting a ball with a bat racket stick etc. <i>It was still night when we <b>hit</b> the outskirts of London.</i>
<b>mail</b>	Send someone email. <i>His site is OK and I can even <b>mail</b> him direct.</i>

<b>off</b>	Kill intentionally and with premeditation. <i>I finally snapped and <b>offed</b> the guy.</i>
<b>perform</b>	Carry out or perform an action. <i>Our 120 million investment in the company is not <b>performing</b> at present.</i>
<b>polish off</b>	Make (a surface) shine.
<b>put an end to</b>	Cause to be in a certain state; cause to be in a certain relation.
<b>put to death</b>	Formulate in a particular style or language.
<b>remove</b>	Remove from a position or an office. <i>They <b>removed</b> thousands of needy youngsters from the benefit system.</i>
<b>send</b>	Send a message or letter. <i><b>Send</b> me your latest results.</i>
<b>send off</b>	Cause to go somewhere.
<b>settle</b>	Bring to an end settle conclusively. <i>They listened to the soft ticking and creaking as the house <b>settled</b>.</i>
<b>ship</b>	Fix something such as a rudder or mast in its place on a boat or ship. <i>People wishing to get from London to New York <b>ship</b> at Liverpool.</i>
<b>slay</b>	Greatly impress or amuse (someone). <i>You <b>slay</b> me you really do.</i>
<b>sort out</b>	Arrange or order by classes or categories.
<b>take the life of</b>	Ascertain or determine by measuring, computing or take a reading from a dial.

<b><u>annihilate</u></b>	Convert (a subatomic particle) into radiant energy. <i>The stronger force <b>annihilated</b> its opponent virtually without loss.</i>
<b>assassinate</b>	Destroy or damage seriously, as of someone's reputation. <i>He <b>assassinated</b> his enemy's character.</i>



<b>butcher</b>	Slaughter or cut up (an animal) for food. <i>They rounded up and <b>butchered</b> 250 people.</i>
<b>convey</b>	Transfer the title to (property). <i>She <b>conveyed</b> the message to me.</i>
<b>delivery</b>	The act of throwing a baseball by a pitcher to a batter. <i>Injuries sustained during <b>delivery</b>.</i>
<b>demolish</b>	Comprehensively refute (an argument or its proponent). <i>His book <b>demolishes</b> an old myth.</i>
<b>destroy</b>	Destroy completely damage irreparably. <i>He has been determined to <b>destroy</b> her.</i>
<b>dilapidation</b>	A cause of action to force a tenant to pay for dilapidations. <i>The mill was in a state of <b>dilapidation</b>.</i>
<b>dying</b>	(of a period of time) final; closing. <i>The <b>dying</b> moments of the match.</i>
<b>execution</b>	The performance of an instruction or program. <i>Sixty seven <b>executions</b> were ordered against goods.</i>
<b>exterminate</b>	Kill (a pest). <i>They use poison to <b>exterminate</b> moles.</i>
<b>mailing</b>	The transmission of a letter. <i>The candidate sent out three large <b>mailings</b>.</i>
<b>massacre</b>	Kill a large number of people indiscriminately. <i>Thousands were brutally <b>massacred</b> by soldiers.</i>
<b>milkman</b>	A man who delivers and sells milk.
<b>obviate</b>	Do away with. <i>A parachute can be used to <b>obviate</b> disaster.</i>
<b>off</b>	Located on the side of a vehicle that is normally furthest from the kerb offside. <i>The wedding is definitely <b>off</b>.</i>
<b>raze</b>	Completely destroy (a building, town, or other settlement). <i>Villages were <b>razed</b> to the ground.</i>
<b>relay</b>	A signal or broadcast transmitted by a relay. <i>The wagons were pulled by <b>relays</b> of horses.</i>
<b>remove</b>	Remove from a position or an office. <i>The death of her mother <b>removed</b> the last obstacle to their marriage.</i>
<b>send</b>	Send a message or letter. <i><b>Send</b> me your latest results.</i>

<b>shatter</b>	Break or cause to break suddenly and violently into pieces. <i>Everyone was <b>shattered</b> by the news.</i>
<b><u>slaughter</u></b>	The killing of a large number of people or animals in a cruel or violent way. <i>The <b>slaughter</b> of 20 peaceful demonstrators.</i>
<b><u>slay</u></b>	Murder (someone). <i>You <b>slay</b> me you really do.</i>
<b>spam</b>	A canned meat made largely from pork. <i>An autogenerated <b>spam</b> website.</i>
<b><u>subversion</u></b>	The undermining of the power and authority of an established system or institution. <i>An 11 year sentence for inciting <b>subversion</b>.</i>
<b>transfer</b>	The act of transferring something from one form to another. <i>You can easily <b>transfer</b> your personal data to another PC using the export feature.</i>
<b><u>transmit</u></b>	Transmit or serve as the medium for transmission. <i>The programme was <b>transmitted</b> on 7 October.</i>
<b>transportation</b>	The United States federal department that institutes and coordinates national transportation programs created in 1966. <i>The sentence was one of <b>transportation</b> for life.</i>
