## **Dispersion as a Noun**

### **Definitions of "Dispersion" as a noun**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “dispersion” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The pattern of distribution of individuals within a habitat.*
- *The separation of white light into colours or of any radiation according to wavelength.*
- *Spreading widely or driving off.*
- *The extent to which values of a variable differ from a fixed value such as the mean.*
- *The action or process of distributing things or people over a wide area.*
- *The act of dispersing or diffusing something.*
- *A mixture of one substance dispersed in another medium.*
- *The state of being dispersed.*
- *The spatial or geographic property of being scattered about over a range, area, or volume.*

*The **diffusion** of knowledge.*
- dispersal** The action or process of distributing or spreading things or people over a wide area.

*The **dissemination** of public information.*
- distribution** The spatial or geographic property of being scattered about over a range, area, or volume.

<b>asunder</b>	Apart. <i>Those whom God hath joined together let no man put <b>asunder</b>.</i>
<b>diffuse</b>	Spread or diffuse through. <i>The problem is how to <b>diffuse</b> power without creating anarchy.</i>
<b>diffusion</b>	The intermingling of substances by the natural movement of their particles. <i>The rate of <b>diffusion</b> of a gas.</i>
<b>dispel</b>	Force to go away; used both with concrete and metaphoric meanings. <i>The brightness of the day did nothing to <b>dispel</b> Elaine's dejection.</i>
<b>dispersal</b>	The act of dispersing or diffusing something. <i><b>Dispersals</b> of archaic populations.</i>
<b>disperse</b>	Denoting a phase dispersed in another phase as in a colloid. <i>The crowds <b>dispersed</b>.</i>

<b>dispersed</b>	Distributed or spread over a considerable extent. <i>Has ties with many widely <b>dispersed</b> friends.</i>
<b>disseminate</b>	Spread (something, especially information) widely. <i>There is a subset of these low grade tumours that can <b>disseminate</b> and migrate.</i>
<b>dissemination</b>	The opening of a subject to widespread discussion and debate. <i>The <b>dissemination</b> of public information.</i>
<b>dissipate</b>	Waste or fritter away (money, energy, or resources). <i>No power is <b>dissipated</b> in this sort of control element.</i>
<b>distribute</b>	Cause be distributed. <i>The birds are mainly <b>distributed</b> in marshes and river valleys.</i>
<b>distribution</b>	The spatial or geographic property of being scattered about over a range, area, or volume. <i>In complementary <b>distribution</b>.</i>
<b>diversify</b>	Enlarge or vary the range of products or the field of operation of (a business). <i><b>Diversify</b> a course of study.</i>
<b>effluence</b>	A substance that flows out from something.
<b>imbue</b>	Fill soak or imbue totally. <i>His works are invariably <b>imbued</b> with a sense of calm and serenity.</i>
<b>intersperse</b>	Introduce one's writing or speech with certain expressions. <i><b>Intersperse</b> exclamation marks in the text.</i>
<b>pervasiveness</b>	The quality of filling or spreading throughout. <i>The <b>pervasiveness</b> of the odor of cabbage in tenement hallways.</i>
<b>proliferate</b>	Cause to grow or increase rapidly. <i>Cultured cells often <b>proliferate</b> indefinitely.</i>
<b>proliferation</b>	A large number of something. <i>A continuing threat of nuclear <b>proliferation</b>.</i>
<b>propagate</b>	Cause to propagate as by grafting or layering. <i>Sound and light <b>propagate</b> in this medium.</i>
<b>rumor</b>	Tell or spread rumors. <i>It was <b>rumored</b> that the next president would be a woman.</i>
<b>scatter</b>	The scattering of light other electromagnetic radiation or particles. <i>The light is <b>scattered</b> as it strikes particles suspended in the air.</i>
<b>scattered</b>	(of electromagnetic radiation or particles) deflected or diffused. <i><b>Scattered</b> villages.</i>

- share** Have give or receive a share of.  
*He **shared** the pie with her.*
- spray** A can or container holding a spray.  
*Many people try to discourage their cats from **spraying**.*
- spread** The fact or process of spreading over an area.  
*The **spread** of the urban population into rural areas.*
- spreading** Act of extending over a wider scope or expanse of space or time.
- sprinkle** Tiny sugar strands and balls used for decorating cakes and desserts.  
*A generous **sprinkle** of pepper.*
- strew** Scatter or spread (things) untidily over a surface or area.  
*Dead bodies **strewed** the ground.*
- suffuse** Cause to spread or flush or flood through, over, or across.  
*Her cheeks were **suffused** with colour.*
