Dispersion as a Noun

Definitions of "Dispersion" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “dispersion” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The pattern of distribution of individuals within a habitat.*
- *The separation of white light into colours or of any radiation according to wavelength.*
- *Spreading widely or driving off.*
- *The extent to which values of a variable differ from a fixed value such as the mean.*
- *The action or process of distributing things or people over a wide area.*
- *The act of dispersing or diffusing something.*
- *A mixture of one substance dispersed in another medium.*
- *The state of being dispersed.*
- *The spatial or geographic property of being scattered about over a range, area, or volume.*



Synonyms of "Dispersion" as a noun (5 Words)

<u>diffusion</u>	The dissemination of elements of culture to another region or people. <i>The diffusion of knowledge.</i>
dispersal	The action or process of distributing or spreading things or people over a wide area. <i>The dispersal of the crowd by mounted police.</i>
dissemination	The opening of a subject to widespread discussion and debate. <i>The dissemination of public information.</i>
distribution	The spatial or geographic property of being scattered about over a range, area, or volume. <i>The distribution of nerve fibers.</i>
scattering	An act of scattering something. <i>The first scatterings of green.</i>

- *Some seeds rely on birds for dispersion.*
- *The virus is transmitted in the dispersion of droplets which results from sneezing or coughing.*



Associations of "Dispersion" (30 Words)

<u>asunder</u>	Apart. <i>Those whom God hath joined together let no man put asunder.</i>
<u>diffuse</u>	Spread or diffuse through. <i>The problem is how to diffuse power without creating anarchy.</i>
<u>diffusion</u>	The intermingling of substances by the natural movement of their particles. <i>The rate of diffusion of a gas.</i>
<u>dispel</u>	Force to go away; used both with concrete and metaphoric meanings. <i>The brightness of the day did nothing to dispel Elaine's dejection.</i>
dispersal	The act of dispersing or diffusing something. <i>Dispersals of archaic populations.</i>
disperse	Denoting a phase dispersed in another phase as in a colloid. <i>The crowds dispersed.</i>

dispersed	Distributed or spread over a considerable extent. <i>Has ties with many widely dispersed friends.</i>
disseminate	Spread (something, especially information) widely. <i>There is a subset of these low grade tumours that can disseminate and migrate.</i>
dissemination	The opening of a subject to widespread discussion and debate. <i>The dissemination of public information.</i>
dissipate	Waste or fritter away (money, energy, or resources). <i>No power is dissipated in this sort of control element.</i>
distribute	Cause be distributed. <i>The birds are mainly distributed in marshes and river valleys.</i>
distribution	The spatial or geographic property of being scattered about over a range, area, or volume. <i>In complementary distribution.</i>
diversify	Enlarge or vary the range of products or the field of operation of (a business). <i>Diversify a course of study.</i>
effluence	A substance that flows out from something.
imbue	Fill soak or imbue totally. <i>His works are invariably imbued with a sense of calm and serenity.</i>
intersperse	Introduce one's writing or speech with certain expressions. <i>Intersperse exclamation marks in the text.</i>
pervasiveness	The quality of filling or spreading throughout. <i>The pervasiveness of the odor of cabbage in tenement hallways.</i>
proliferate	Cause to grow or increase rapidly. <i>Cultured cells often proliferate indefinitely.</i>
proliferation	A large number of something. <i>A continuing threat of nuclear proliferation.</i>
propagate	Cause to propagate as by grafting or layering. <i>Sound and light propagate in this medium.</i>
rumor	Tell or spread rumors. <i>It was rumored that the next president would be a woman.</i>
scatter	The scattering of light other electromagnetic radiation or particles. <i>The light is scattered as it strikes particles suspended in the air.</i>
scattered	(of electromagnetic radiation or particles) deflected or diffused. <i>Scattered villages.</i>

share	Have give or receive a share of. <i>He shared the pie with her.</i>
spray	A can or container holding a spray. <i>Many people try to discourage their cats from spraying.</i>
spread	The fact or process of spreading over an area. <i>The spread of the urban population into rural areas.</i>
spreading	Act of extending over a wider scope or expanse of space or time.
sprinkle	Tiny sugar strands and balls used for decorating cakes and desserts. <i>A generous sprinkle of pepper.</i>
strew	Scatter or spread (things) untidily over a surface or area. <i>Dead bodies strewed the ground.</i>
suffuse	Cause to spread or flush or flood through, over, or across. <i>Her cheeks were suffused with colour.</i>
