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Associations of "Displaced" (30 Words)

agent	Any agent or representative of a federal agency or bureau. <i>Speak to your letting agent about refurbishing the property.</i>
alternate	Of leaves or shoots placed alternately on the two sides of the stem. <i>He shall be entitled to exercise the vote of the director for whom he is an alternate.</i>
alternating	(of two or more things) occurring in turn repeatedly. <i>Alternating feelings of love and hate.</i>
alternative	Serving or used in place of another. <i>She had no alternative but to break the law.</i>
alternatively	In place of, or as an alternative to. <i>Alternatively we could buy a used car.</i>
bump	In a race gain a bump against. <i>The bump threw him off the bicycle.</i>
deputy	An assistant with power to act when his superior is absent. <i>The deputy prime minister.</i>
exchange	Exchange a penalty for a less severe one. <i>They had a bitter exchange.</i>
fungible	(of goods contracted for without an individual specimen being specified) replaceable by another identical item; mutually interchangeable. <i>It is by no means the world's only fungible commodity.</i>
indirect	Not direct in spatial dimension; not leading by a straight line or course to a destination. <i>Sometimes taking an indirect path saves time.</i>
instead	As an alternative or substitute. <i>She never married preferring instead to remain single.</i>
interchange	Reciprocal transfer of equivalent sums of money (especially the currencies of different countries). <i>We have a significant interchange of staff with the nearby college.</i>

permanently	In a way that lasts or continues without interruption; continually. <i>We need to be permanently vigilant.</i>
permutation	A selection of a specified number of matches in a football pool. <i>His thoughts raced ahead to fifty different permutations of what he must do.</i>
preempt	Make a preemptive bid in the game of bridge. <i>Discussion of the emergency situation will preempt the lecture by the professor.</i>
proxy	A person authorized to act for another. <i>The use of a US wealth measure as a proxy for the true worldwide measure.</i>
replace	Put (something) back in a previous place or position. <i>We need to replace the secretary that left a month ago.</i>
replacement	Someone who takes the place of another person. <i>A hip replacement.</i>
reversal	Turning in an opposite direction or position. <i>The reversal of the image in the lens.</i>
<u>substitute</u>	Act or serve as a substitute. <i>Customs officers substituted the drugs with another substance.</i>
substitution	The act of putting one thing or person in the place of another. <i>The substitution of rail services with buses.</i>
successor	A person or thing that succeeds another. <i>He was President Lincoln's successor.</i>
supersede	Take the place or move into the position of.
supersede	Take the place or move into the position of. <i>The older models of car have now been superseded.</i>
supplant	Supersede and replace. <i>Domestic production has been supplanted by imports and jobs have been lost.</i>
surrogate	Denoting a child to whom a woman gives birth as a surrogate mother. <i>She has given birth to three surrogate babies.</i>
temporarily	For a limited period of time; not permanently. <i>A temporarily vacant department store.</i>
transpose	Cause (two or more things) to exchange places. <i>A sequence of French tales transposed into English.</i>
transposition	The act of reversing the order or place of. <i>Transposition of word order.</i>
