Displeased as an Adjective

Definitions of "Displeased" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “displeased” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Not pleased; experiencing or manifesting displeasure.*
- *Feeling or showing annoyance and displeasure.*



Synonyms of "Displeased" as an adjective (4 Words)

- disappointed** Disappointingly unsuccessful.
*The rising was a revolution of **disappointed** hopes.*
- discontented** Dissatisfied, especially with one's circumstances.
*Strikes by **discontented** workers.*
- disgruntled** Angry or dissatisfied.
*Judges receive letters from **disgruntled** members of the public.*
- dissatisfied** In a state of sulky dissatisfaction.
***Dissatisfied** customers.*



Usage Examples of "Displeased" as an adjective

- *He was displeased with your work.*

| <u>abhorrence</u> | A feeling of revulsion; disgusted loathing. <i>The thought of marrying him filled her with abhorrence.</i> |
| <u>abhorrent</u> | Offensive to the mind. <i>An abhorrent deed.</i> |
| <u>abominate</u> | Find repugnant. <i>They abominated the very idea of monarchy.</i> |
| abomination | Hate coupled with disgust. <i>His treatment of the children is an abomination.</i> |
| arrogance | The quality of being arrogant. <i>The arrogance of this man is astounding.</i> |
| <u>avenge</u> | Inflict harm in return for (an injury or wrong done to oneself or another). <i>They avenged themselves on the interlopers.</i> |
| aversion | A strong dislike or disinclination. <i>My dog s pet aversion is visitors particularly males.</i> |
| <u>despite</u> | Contempt; disdain. <i>She wanted neither favor nor despite.</i> |
| <u>detest</u> | Dislike intensely; feel antipathy or aversion towards. <i>She detests politicians.</i> |
| detestation | Hate coupled with disgust. <i>He is the detestation of the neighbourhood.</i> |
| disfavor | Put at a disadvantage; hinder, harm. <i>He is in disfavor with the king.</i> |
| disinclined | Unwilling; reluctant. <i>Disinclined to say anything to anybody.</i> |
| dislike | Have or feel a dislike or distaste for. <i>She disliked any kind of unnecessary rudeness.</i> |
| <u>displeasure</u> | Annoy; displease. <i>He started hanging around the local pubs much to the displeasure of his mother.</i> |
| execrable | Deserving a curse. <i>Execrable cheap wine.</i> |
| halfhearted | Feeling or showing little interest or enthusiasm. <i>A halfhearted effort.</i> |

| hate | An intensely disliked person or thing. <i>The boys hate each other.</i> |
| <u>loathe</u> | Feel intense dislike or disgust for. <i>She loathed him on sight.</i> |
| loathing | A feeling of intense dislike or disgust; hatred. <i>The thought filled him with loathing.</i> |
| misanthrope | Someone who dislikes people in general. <i>Scrooge wasn't the mean spirited misanthrope most of us believe him to be.</i> |
| misanthropic | Believing the worst of human nature and motives; having a sneering disbelief in e.g. selflessness of others. <i>With his misanthropic outlook he was an ugly character.</i> |
| misanthropy | A dislike of humankind. <i>The streak of misanthropy in his nature.</i> |
| nauseating | Causing or able to cause nausea. <i>Some nauseating sentimental ditty.</i> |
| negative | A negative photographic image made on film or specially prepared glass from which positive prints may be made. <i>The percentage of false negatives generated by a cancer test was of great concern.</i> |
| odium | General or widespread hatred or disgust incurred by someone as a result of their actions. <i>He incurred widespread odium for military failures and government corruption.</i> |
| repelling | Highly offensive; arousing aversion or disgust. |
| repugnant | Given to stubborn resistance. <i>Morally repugnant customs.</i> |
| <u>undesirable</u> | One whose presence is undesirable. <i>The drug's undesirable side effects.</i> |
| <u>unpleasant</u> | Offensive or disagreeable; causing discomfort or unhappiness. <i>When drunk he could become very unpleasant.</i> |
