## **Displeasure as a Noun**

### **Definitions of "Displeasure" as a noun**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “displeasure” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The feeling of being displeased or annoyed or dissatisfied with someone or something.*
- *A feeling of annoyance or disapproval.*



## Synonyms of "Displeasure" as a noun (13 Words)

- anger** A strong feeling of annoyance, displeasure, or hostility.  
*She could barely restrain her **anger** at this comment.*
- annoyance** A thing that annoys someone; a nuisance.  
*The Council found him an **annoyance**.*
- chagrin** Strong feelings of embarrassment.  
*To my **chagrin** he was nowhere to be seen.*
- crossness** A disposition to be ill-tempered.
- exasperation** An exasperated feeling of annoyance.  
*She rolled her eyes in **exasperation**.*
- indignation** A feeling of righteous anger.  
*The letter filled Lucy with **indignation**.*

<b>infuriation</b>	A feeling of intense anger. <i>Reactions ran the gamut from apathy to <b>infuriation</b>.</i>
<b>irritation</b>	The neural or electrical arousal of an organ or muscle or gland. <i>Some chemicals cause a direct <b>irritation</b> to the skin leading to dermatitis.</i>
<b>pique</b>	A sudden outburst of anger. <i>He left in a fit of <b>pique</b>.</i>
<b>rancour</b>	Bitterness or resentfulness, especially when long standing. <i>He spoke without <b>rancour</b>.</i>
<b>resentment</b>	Bitter indignation at having been treated unfairly. <i>Some people harbour <b>resentments</b> going back many years.</i>
<b>vexation</b>	The psychological state of being irritated or annoyed. <i>The <b>vexations</b> of life under canvas.</i>
<b>wrath</b>	Belligerence aroused by a real or supposed wrong (personified as one of the deadly sins). <i>He hid his pipe for fear of incurring his father's <b>wrath</b>.</i>

## Usage Examples of "Displeasure" as a noun

- *He started hanging around the local pubs, much to the displeasure of his mother.*

## Associations of "Displeasure" (30 Words)

<b>abhorrence</b>	Hate coupled with disgust. <i>The thought of marrying him filled her with <b>abhorrence</b>.</i>
<b>abhorrent</b>	Inspiring disgust and loathing; repugnant. <i>An <b>abhorrent</b> deed.</i>
<b>abomination</b>	A person who is loathsome or disgusting. <i>His treatment of the children is an <b>abomination</b>.</i>
<b>animus</b>	Motivation to do something. <i>The author's <b>animus</b> towards her.</i>
<b>annoyance</b>	The feeling or state of being annoyed; irritation. <i>There was <b>annoyance</b> at government interference.</i>
<b>antisocial</b>	Relating to or having an antisocial personality disorder. <i>Standoffish and <b>antisocial</b>.</i>
<b>arrogance</b>	Overbearing pride evidenced by a superior manner toward inferiors. <i>The <b>arrogance</b> of this man is astounding.</i>

<b>aversion</b>	A strong dislike or disinclination. <i>They made plain their <b>aversion</b> to the use of force.</i>
<b>condemnation</b>	(criminal law) a final judgment of guilty in a criminal case and the punishment that is imposed. <i>He deserved nothing but <b>condemnation</b>.</i>
<b>detestation</b>	A detested person or thing. <i>He is the <b>detestation</b> of the neighbourhood.</i>
<b>disaffected</b>	Dissatisfied, especially with people in authority or a system of control. <i>A military plot by <b>disaffected</b> elements in the army.</i>
<b><u>disapprove</u></b>	Officially refuse to agree to. <i>Bob strongly <b>disapproved</b> of drinking and driving.</i>
<b><u>discomfort</u></b>	Slight pain. <i>The patient complained of <b>discomfort</b> in the left calf.</i>
<b>discontent</b>	Dissatisfaction with one's circumstances; lack of contentment. <i>The <b>discontents</b> of the working class.</i>
<b>discourtesy</b>	An impolite act or remark. <i>The fact that MPs were not kept informed was an extraordinary <b>discourtesy</b>.</i>
<b>disfavor</b>	An inclination to withhold approval from some person or group. <i>He is in <b>disfavor</b> with the king.</i>
<b><u>disgruntled</u></b>	Angry or dissatisfied. <i>Judges receive letters from <b>disgruntled</b> members of the public.</i>
<b>dislike</b>	Have or feel a dislike or distaste for. <i>She <b>disliked</b> any kind of unnecessary rudeness.</i>
<b>displease</b>	Give displeasure to. <i>The tone of the letter <b>displeased</b> him.</i>
<b><u>dissatisfied</u></b>	Not content or happy with something. <i>His parents are <b>dissatisfied</b> with the quality of tuition on offer.</i>
<b>execrate</b>	Find repugnant. <i>They were <b>execrated</b> as dangerous and corrupt.</i>
<b>execration</b>	An appeal to some supernatural power to inflict evil on someone or some group.
<b><u>hatred</u></b>	The emotion of intense dislike; a feeling of dislike so strong that it demands action. <i>Racial <b>hatred</b>.</i>
<b>loathing</b>	Hate coupled with disgust. <i>The thought filled him with <b>loathing</b>.</i>

<b>malcontent</b>	Dissatisfied and complaining or rebellious. <i>The <b>malcontent</b> generals saw their role as leaders of this counter revolution.</i>
<b>odium</b>	State of disgrace resulting from detestable behavior. <i>He incurred widespread <b>odium</b> for military failures and government corruption.</i>
<b>repellent</b>	Able to repel a particular thing; impervious to a particular substance. <i>I find his obsequiousness <b>repellent</b>.</i>
<b>umbrage</b>	Shade or shadow, especially as cast by trees. <i>She took <b>umbrage</b> at his remarks.</i>
<b>unhappy</b>	Marked by or producing unhappiness. <i><b>Unhappy</b> with her raise.</i>
<b><u>unsatisfied</u></b>	Worried and uneasy. <i>The compromise left all sides <b>unsatisfied</b>.</i>
