- Designed to be disposed of after use.
- (of an article) intended to be thrown away after use.
- (chiefly of financial assets) readily available for the owner's use as required.
- (of a person or idea) able to be dispensed with; easily dismissed.

accessible Capable of being reached.

The town is **accessible** by bus.

available Convenient for use or disposal.

He was **available** and willing to accompany her.

Of relatively little significance, and therefore able to be abandoned or

The region is **expendable** in the wider context of national politics.

inessential Not absolutely necessary. *Inessential* information.

Capable of being obtained.

obtainable Capable of being obtained.
Customers financial details are easily obtainable.

Denoting those hydrogen atoms in an acid which can be displaced by metal

replaceable atoms when forming salts.

A knife with a **replaceable** blade.



usable

skippable (of an activity, event, etc.) not worth doing or attending.

Why did elite men s players treat the Olympics as a **skippable** event.

**spendable** Remaining after taxes. **Spendable** income.

Intended to be thrown away after use.

throwaway A throwaway camera.

unessential Not absolutely necessary; inessential.

A train has broken down resulting in a call to postpone all **unessential** travel.

Fit or ready for use or service.

**Usable** information.

landfill Waste material used in landfill sites.

Provide a horse or other animal with litter as bedding.

A square piece of cloth or paper used at a meal to wipe the fingers or lips

**napkin** and to protect garments.

She unfolded her **napkin** and put it on her lap.

recycle Convert (waste) into reusable material.

He reserves the right to **recycle** his own text.

The act of processing used or abandoned materials for use in creating new

**recycling** products.

refuse

A call for the **recycling** of all paper.

Refuse to accept.

He s so conceited he d never believe anyone would **refuse** him.

An item which can be used again or more than once.

reusable Reusable shopping bags.

The action of using something again.

The tape could be magnetically erased and **reuse**d.

Waste or rough fragments of stone, brick, concrete, etc., especially as the

**rubble** debris from the demolition of buildings.

Scavenge Search for discarded items or food in (a place.
