Disposable as an Adjective

Definitions of "Disposable" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “disposable” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Free or available for use or disposition.*
- *Designed to be disposed of after use.*
- *(of an article) intended to be thrown away after use.*
- *(chiefly of financial assets) readily available for the owner's use as required.*
- *(of a person or idea) able to be dispensed with; easily dismissed.*



Synonyms of "Disposable" as an adjective (11 Words)

- accessible** Capable of being reached.
*The town is **accessible** by bus.*
- available** Convenient for use or disposal.
*He was **available** and willing to accompany her.*
- expendable** Of relatively little significance, and therefore able to be abandoned or destroyed.
*The region is **expendable** in the wider context of national politics.*
- inessential** Not absolutely necessary.
***Inessential** information.*
- obtainable** Capable of being obtained.
*Customers financial details are easily **obtainable**.*
- replaceable** Denoting those hydrogen atoms in an acid which can be displaced by metal atoms when forming salts.
*A knife with a **replaceable** blade.*

skippable	(of an activity, event, etc.) not worth doing or attending. <i>Why did elite men's players treat the Olympics as a skippable event.</i>
spendable	Remaining after taxes. Spendable income.
throwaway	Intended to be thrown away after use. A throwaway camera.
unessential	Not absolutely necessary; inessential. <i>A train has broken down resulting in a call to postpone all unessential travel.</i>
usable	Fit or ready for use or service. Usable information.



Usage Examples of "Disposable" as an adjective

- *A disposable razor.*
- *He made a mental inventory of his disposable assets.*
- *The poor performer is motivated by the fear that he or she is highly disposable.*

Associations of "Disposable" (30 Words)

bin	Store something especially wine in a bin. <i>The whole idea had to be binned.</i>
detritus	Gravel, sand, silt, or other material produced by erosion. <i>The streets were foul with detritus.</i>
diaper	A linen or cotton fabric woven in a repeating pattern of small diamonds.
<u>discard</u>	Anything that is cast aside or discarded. <i>West led a heart and East was able to discard his club loser.</i>

discarded	Thrown away.
disposal	The action of overcoming a rival or threat. <i>Disposals of fixed and non current assets.</i>
dispose	Incline (someone) towards a particular activity or mood. <i>The Scottish champions were buoyant after they disposed of English champions Leeds.</i>
dump	A heap of rubbish left at a dump. <i>She dumped her knapsack on the floor.</i>
dumping	Selling goods abroad at a price below that charged in the domestic market.
garbage	A receptacle where waste can be discarded. <i>She tossed the moldy bread into the garbage.</i>
incinerator	A furnace for incinerating (especially to dispose of refuse).
jettison	The action of jettisoning something. <i>The jettison lever.</i>
junk	Junk bonds. <i>I only have an hour to get all my junk together.</i>
landfill	Waste material used in landfill sites. <i>Our reusable packaging eliminates tons of landfill.</i>
litter	Provide a horse or other animal with litter as bedding. <i>The spiders live in leaf litter.</i>
napkin	A square piece of cloth or paper used at a meal to wipe the fingers or lips and to protect garments. <i>She unfolded her napkin and put it on her lap.</i>
recycle	Convert (waste) into reusable material. <i>He reserves the right to recycle his own text.</i>
recycling	The act of processing used or abandoned materials for use in creating new products. <i>A call for the recycling of all paper.</i>
refuse	Refuse to accept. <i>He s so conceited he d never believe anyone would refuse him.</i>
reusable	An item which can be used again or more than once. <i>Reusable shopping bags.</i>
reuse	The action of using something again. <i>The tape could be magnetically erased and reused.</i>
rubble	Waste or rough fragments of stone, brick, concrete, etc., especially as the debris from the demolition of buildings. <i>Two buildings collapsed trapping scores of people in the rubble.</i>

<u>scavenge</u>	Search for discarded items or food in (a place). <i>The feral cat preferred to scavenge carrion from the forest floor.</i>
sewage	Waste matter carried away in sewers or drains. Sewage treatment.
squander	Spend extravagantly. <i>You squandered the opportunity to get an advanced degree.</i>
<u>trash</u>	Nonsensical talk or writing. <i>She almost trashed the email window.</i>
usable	Fit or ready for use or service. Usable information.
waste	Run off as waste. <i>The wastefulness of missed opportunities.</i>
wastebasket	A waste-paper basket.
