## Disproportionate as an Adjective

### Definitions of "Disproportionate" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “disproportionate” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Not proportionate.*
- *Too large or too small in comparison with something else.*
- *Out of proportion.*

### Synonyms of "Disproportionate" as an adjective (5 Words)

<b>disproportional</b>	Out of proportion. <i>A few people have a <b>disproportional</b> impact on policy.</i>
<b>not appropriate to</b>	Suitable for a particular person or place or condition etc.
<b>not commensurate with</b>	Corresponding in size or degree or extent.
<b>not in proportion to</b>	Holding office.
<b>out of proportion to</b>	Directed outward or serving to direct something outward.

### Usage Examples of "Disproportionate" as an adjective

- *Persistent offenders were given sentences that were disproportionate to the offences*

*they had committed.*

- *People on lower incomes spend a disproportionate amount of their income on fuel.*

<b>arrhythmic</b>	Not rhythmic; without rhythm or regularity. <i>The <b>arrhythmic</b> phrasing of the music.</i>
<b>asymmetric</b>	Characterized by asymmetry in the spatial arrangement or placement of parts or components.
<b>asymmetry</b>	Lack of equality or equivalence between parts or aspects of something; lack of symmetry. <i>There was an <b>asymmetry</b> between the right and left ears.</i>
<b>disharmony</b>	A lack of harmony. <i>We will become evermore a nation of social <b>disharmony</b>.</i>
<b>disparity</b>	A great difference. <i>The arrangements could lead to <b>disparity</b> of treatment between companies.</i>
<b>dubiety</b>	The state or quality of being doubtful; uncertainty. <i>His enemies made much of the <b>dubiety</b> of his paternity.</i>
<b>fluctuate</b>	Cause to fluctuate or move in a wavelike pattern. <i>The stock market <b>fluctuates</b>.</i>
<b>fluctuation</b>	An instance of change; the rate or magnitude of change. <i>The <b>fluctuations</b> of the sea.</i>
<b>imbalance</b>	(mathematics) a lack of symmetry. <i>The condition is caused by a hormonal <b>imbalance</b>.</i>
<b>impact</b>	Come into forcible contact with. <i>The move is not expected to <b>impact</b> the company's employees.</i>
<b>incapable</b>	Unable to behave rationally or manage one's affairs. <i>Wilson blushed and was <b>incapable</b> of speech.</i>
<b>incommensurate</b>	Out of keeping or proportion with. <i>Man's influence on the earth's surface seems <b>incommensurate</b> with his scale.</i>
<b>indiscriminate</b>	(of a person) not using or exercising discrimination. <i>She was <b>indiscriminate</b> with her affections.</i>
<b>inequality</b>	Difference in size, degree, circumstances, etc.; lack of equality. <i>The <b>inequality</b> of the ground hindered their footing.</i>

<b>inequity</b>	Lack of fairness or justice. <i>Policies aimed at redressing racial <b>inequity</b>.</i>
<b><u>instability</u></b>	Unreliability attributable to being unstable. <i>Political and economic <b>instability</b>.</i>
<b><u>irregular</u></b>	A member of an irregular armed force that fights a stronger force by sabotage and harassment. <i><b>Irregular</b> troops.</i>
<b>irregularity</b>	A thing that is irregular in form or nature. <i>The <b>irregularity</b> of his breathing.</i>
<b>random</b>	Governed by or involving equal chances for each item. <i>We stumbled on another live band playing at a <b>random</b> bar.</i>
<b>unbalance</b>	A lack of symmetry, balance, or stability. <i>This sharing can often <b>unbalance</b> even the closest of relationships.</i>
<b><u>uncertainty</u></b>	The state of being unsure of something. <i>Times of <b>uncertainty</b> and danger.</i>
<b>uncommon</b>	Marked by an uncommon quality especially superlative or extreme of its kind. <i>He was <b>uncommon</b> afraid.</i>
<b>undiscerning</b>	Lacking discernment. <i>An <b>undiscerning</b> audience.</i>
<b>unequal</b>	A person or thing regarded as unequal to another in status or level. <i>She was <b>unequal</b> to the task.</i>
<b><u>uneven</u></b>	Variable and recurring at irregular intervals. <i>Wood with an <b>uneven</b> grain.</i>
<b>unfair</b>	Not fair; marked by injustice or partiality or deception. <i>Took an <b>unfair</b> advantage.</i>
<b><u>unpredictable</u></b>	Not occurring at expected times. <i>An <b>unpredictable</b> or indeterminate future.</i>
<b><u>unrest</u></b>	A state of agitation or turbulent change or development. <i>Social <b>unrest</b>.</i>
<b><u>unsatisfactory</u></b>	Not giving satisfaction. <i>Her performance proved to be <b>unsatisfactory</b>.</i>
<b>wanting</b>	Lacking in a required or necessary quality. <i>Tested and found <b>wanting</b>.</i>
