Synonyms of "Disproportionate" as an adjective (5 Words)

disproportional	Out of proportion. <i>A few people have a disproportional impact on policy.</i>
not appropriate to	Suitable for a particular person or place or condition etc.
not commensurate with	Corresponding in size or degree or extent.
not in proportion to	Holding office.
out of proportion to	Directed outward or serving to direct something outward.

- *People on lower incomes spend a disproportionate amount of their income on fuel.*

asymmetry	Lack of equality or equivalence between parts or aspects of something; lack of symmetry. <i>There was an asymmetry between the right and left ears.</i>
disharmony	A lack of harmony. <i>We will become evermore a nation of social disharmony.</i>
disparity	A great difference. <i>The arrangements could lead to disparity of treatment between companies.</i>
dubiety	The state or quality of being doubtful; uncertainty. <i>His enemies made much of the dubiety of his paternity.</i>
fluctuate	Cause to fluctuate or move in a wavelike pattern. <i>The stock market fluctuates.</i>
fluctuation	An instance of change; the rate or magnitude of change. <i>The fluctuations of the sea.</i>
imbalance	(mathematics) a lack of symmetry. <i>The condition is caused by a hormonal imbalance.</i>
impact	Come into forcible contact with. <i>The move is not expected to impact the company's employees.</i>
incapable	Unable to behave rationally or manage one's affairs. <i>Wilson blushed and was incapable of speech.</i>
incommensurate	Out of keeping or proportion with. <i>Man's influence on the earth's surface seems incommensurate with his scale.</i>
indiscriminate	(of a person) not using or exercising discrimination. <i>She was indiscriminate with her affections.</i>
inequality	Difference in size, degree, circumstances, etc.; lack of equality. <i>The inequality of the ground hindered their footing.</i>

inequity	Lack of fairness or justice. <i>Policies aimed at redressing racial inequity.</i>
<u>instability</u>	Unreliability attributable to being unstable. <i>Political and economic instability.</i>
<u>irregular</u>	A member of an irregular armed force that fights a stronger force by sabotage and harassment. <i>Irregular troops.</i>
irregularity	A thing that is irregular in form or nature. <i>The irregularity of his breathing.</i>
random	Governed by or involving equal chances for each item. <i>We stumbled on another live band playing at a random bar.</i>
unbalance	A lack of symmetry, balance, or stability. <i>This sharing can often unbalance even the closest of relationships.</i>
<u>uncertainty</u>	The state of being unsure of something. <i>Times of uncertainty and danger.</i>
uncommon	Marked by an uncommon quality especially superlative or extreme of its kind. <i>He was uncommon afraid.</i>
undiscerning	Lacking discernment. <i>An undiscerning audience.</i>
unequal	A person or thing regarded as unequal to another in status or level. <i>She was unequal to the task.</i>
<u>uneven</u>	Variable and recurring at irregular intervals. <i>Wood with an uneven grain.</i>
unfair	Not fair; marked by injustice or partiality or deception. <i>Took an unfair advantage.</i>
<u>unpredictable</u>	Not occurring at expected times. <i>An unpredictable or indeterminate future.</i>
<u>unrest</u>	A state of agitation or turbulent change or development. <i>Social unrest.</i>
<u>unsatisfactory</u>	Not giving satisfaction. <i>Her performance proved to be unsatisfactory.</i>
wanting	Lacking in a required or necessary quality. <i>Tested and found wanting.</i>
