indiscriminate (of a person) not using or exercising discrimination.

She was **indiscriminate** with her affections.

Difference in size, degree, circumstances, etc.; lack of equality.

The **inequality** of the ground hindered their footing.



inequity Lack of fairness or justice.

Policies aimed at redressing racial **inequity**.

instability Unreliability attributable to being unstable.

Political and economic **instability**.

A member of an irregular armed force that fights a stronger force by

<u>irregular</u> sabotage and harassment.

Irregular troops.

irregularity A thing that is irregular in form or nature.

The **irregularity** of his breathing.

random Governed by or involving equal chances for each item.

We stumbled on another live band playing at a **random** bar.

A lack of symmetry, balance, or stability.

This sharing can often **unbalance** even the closest of relationships.

uncertainty The state of being unsure of something.

Times of uncertainty and danger.

Marked by an uncommon quality especially superlative or extreme of its

undiscerning Lacking discernment.
