### Definitions of "Disregard" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "disregard" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Bar from attention or consideration.*
- *Refuse to acknowledge.*
- *Give little or no attention to.*
- *Pay no attention to; ignore.*

### Synonyms of "Disregard" as a verb (14 Words)

<b>brush aside</b>	Touch lightly and briefly.
<b>brush off</b>	Cover by brushing.

<b>cut</b>	Form or shape by cutting or incising. <i>This knife <b>cuts</b> well.</i>
<b>discount</b>	Deduct an amount from (the usual price of something). <i>A product may carry a price which cannot easily be <b>discounted</b>.</i>
<b><u>dismiss</u></b>	Deliberately cease to think about. <i>This case is <b>dismissed</b>.</i>
<b>ignore</b>	Give little or no attention to. <i>He <b>ignored</b> her outraged question.</i>
<b><u>neglect</u></b>	Fail to care for properly. <i>He <b>neglected</b> to write to her.</i>
<b>pay no attention to</b>	Dedicate.
<b>pay no heed to</b>	Give money, usually in exchange for goods or services.
<b>push aside</b>	Move with force.
<b>refuse to acknowledge</b>	Elude, especially in a baffling way.
<b>snub</b>	Check the movement of (a horse or boat), especially by a rope wound round a post. <i>She <b>snubbed</b> his proposal.</i>
<b>take no account of</b>	Make use of or accept for some purpose.
<b>take no notice of</b>	Engage for service under a term of contract.

## Usage Examples of "Disregard" as a verb

- *The body of evidence is too substantial to disregard.*

## Associations of "Disregard" (30 Words)

<b>blithe</b>	Happy or carefree. <i>Spoke with <b>blithe</b> ignorance of the true situation.</i>
<b><u>cheerful</u></b>	Causing happiness by its nature or appearance. <i>As <b>cheerful</b> as anyone confined to a hospital bed could be.</i>
<b>condone</b>	Excuse, overlook, or make allowances for; be lenient with. <i>She <b>condoned</b> her husband's occasional infidelities.</i>
<b>connive</b>	Secretly allow (something immoral, illegal, or harmful) to occur. <i>She <b>connived</b> with a senior official to rig the results of last year's election.</i>
<b><u>crass</u></b>	So unrefined as to be lacking in discrimination and sensibility. <i>An act of <b>crass</b> stupidity.</i>

<b><u>dismiss</u></b>	(of a group assembled under someone's authority) disperse. <i>I was <b>dismissed</b> after I gave my report.</i>
<b>disparagingly</b>	In a disparaging manner. <i>These mythological figures are described <b>disparagingly</b> as belonging only to a story.</i>
<b><u>downplay</u></b>	Understate the importance or quality of. <i>This report <b>downplays</b> the seriousness of global warming.</i>
<b>education</b>	The United States federal department that administers all federal programs dealing with education including federal aid to educational institutions and students created 1979. <i>He received no formal <b>education</b>.</i>
<b>flatten</b>	Defeat heavily in a contest. <i>The landscape <b>flattened</b>.</i>
<b><u>forget</u></b>	Forget to do something. <i>For years she had struggled to <b>forget</b> about him.</i>
<b>ignore</b>	Give little or no attention to. <i>He <b>ignored</b> her outraged question.</i>
<b>intelligence</b>	Information in general; news. <i>The gathering of <b>intelligence</b>.</i>
<b><u>irrelevant</u></b>	Having no bearing on or connection with the subject at issue. <i>An <b>irrelevant</b> comment.</i>
<b>leave</b>	Go and leave behind either intentionally or by neglect or forgetfulness. <i><b>Leave</b> the flowers that you see in the park behind.</i>
<b><u>lighthearted</u></b>	Carefree and happy and lighthearted. <i>Her <b>lighthearted</b> nature.</i>
<b><u>neglect</u></b>	The trait of neglecting responsibilities and lacking concern. <i>The house was in a terrible state of <b>neglect</b>.</i>
<b><u>obscurity</u></b>	A thing that is unclear or difficult to understand. <i>Poems of impenetrable <b>obscurity</b>.</i>
<b><u>omit</u></b>	Prevent from being included or considered or accepted. <i>He was <b>omitted</b> from the second Test.</i>
<b><u>optimistic</u></b>	Hopeful and confident about the future. <i>The government was <b>optimistic</b> that reform would take place.</i>
<b><u>overlook</u></b>	Watch over. <i>I am <b>overlooking</b> her work.</i>

<b>potter</b>	A craftsman who shapes pottery on a potter's wheel and bakes them in a kiln. <i>An afternoon's <b>potter</b> through the rooms and possessions of the rich.</i>
<b>rebuff</b>	A deliberate discourteous act (usually as an expression of anger or disapproval). <i>I asked her to be my wife and was <b>rebuffed</b> in no uncertain terms.</i>
<b>repulse</b>	Force or drive back. <i>Rioters tried to storm the Ministry but were <b>repulsed</b> by police.</i>
<b>repulsion</b>	A feeling of intense distaste or disgust. <i>People talk about the case with a mixture of fascination and <b>repulsion</b>.</i>
<b>scoff</b>	Showing your contempt by derision. <i>You, a scientist, he <b>scoffed</b>.</i>
<b>snub</b>	(of a person's nose) short and turned up at the end. <i>The move was a <b>snub</b> to the government.</i>
<b>unconcerned</b>	Lacking in interest or care or feeling. <i>The average American is <b>unconcerned</b> that his or her plight is the result of a complex of personal and economic and governmental actions beyond the normal citizen's comprehension and control.</i>
<b>undeserved</b>	Not deserved or earned. <i>Has an <b>undeserved</b> reputation as a coward.</i>
<b>unnoticed</b>	Not noticed. <i>A deliberate kick that went <b>unnoticed</b> by the referee.</i>
