disregardless In spite of everything; without regard to drawbacks.

irrespective In spite of everything; without regard to drawbacks.

no matter Not in any degree or manner; not at all.

regardless Despite the prevailing circumstances.
*They were determined to carry on **regardless**.*



Associations of "Disregarding" (30 Words)

blithe	Happy or carefree. <i>A merry blithesome nature.</i>
<u>cheerful</u>	Pleasantly (even unrealistically) optimistic. <i>Cheerful news.</i>
condone	Excuse, overlook, or make allowances for; be lenient with. <i>Those arrested were released and the exhibition was officially condoned a few weeks later.</i>
connive	Conspire to do something immoral, illegal, or harmful. <i>She connived with a senior official to rig the results of last year's election.</i>
<u>crass</u>	Showing no intelligence or sensitivity. <i>The crass assumptions that men make about women.</i>

<u>dismiss</u>	End one's encounter with somebody by causing or permitting the person to leave. <i>The prime minister dismissed five members of his cabinet.</i>
disparagingly	In a disparaging manner. <i>These mythological figures are described disparagingly as belonging only to a story.</i>
<u>downplay</u>	Represent as less significant or important. <i>This report downplays the seriousness of global warming.</i>
education	The United States federal department that administers all federal programs dealing with education including federal aid to educational institutions and students created 1979. <i>A course of education.</i>
flatten	Press (oneself or one's body) against a surface. <i>Flatten a road.</i>
<u>forget</u>	Forget to do something. <i>I m sorry Cassie I forget myself.</i>
ignore	Refuse to take notice of or acknowledge; disregard intentionally. <i>The rules ignore one important principle of cricket.</i>
intelligence	Information about recent and important events. <i>Extraterrestrial intelligences.</i>
<u>irrelevant</u>	Having no bearing on or connection with the subject at issue. <i>An irrelevant comment.</i>
leave	Go and leave behind either intentionally or by neglect or forgetfulness. <i>I ll leave the door open.</i>
<u>lighthearted</u>	Carefree and happy and lighthearted. <i>Her lighthearted nature.</i>
<u>neglect</u>	The state of something that has been unused and neglected. <i>The house was in a terrible state of neglect.</i>
<u>obscurity</u>	The quality of being unclear or abstruse and hard to understand. <i>Poems of impenetrable obscurity.</i>
<u>omit</u>	Fail or neglect to do. <i>He modestly omits to mention that he was a pole vault champion.</i>
<u>optimistic</u>	Expecting the best. <i>The optimistic mood of the Sixties.</i>
<u>overlook</u>	Pass over (someone) in favour of another. <i>It s better if the property isn t overlooked.</i>

potter	A craftsman who shapes pottery on a potter s wheel and bakes them it a kiln. <i>An afternoon s potter through the rooms and possessions of the rich.</i>
rebuff	An abrupt or ungracious rejection of an offer, request, or friendly gesture. <i>Callers phoning a chatline need have no fear of rebuff.</i>
repulse	Drive back (an attack or attacker) by force. <i>Rioters tried to storm the Ministry but were repulsed by police.</i>
repulsion	A feeling of intense distaste or disgust. <i>People talk about the case with a mixture of fascination and repulsion.</i>
scoff	Treat with contemptuous disregard. <i>You a scientist he scoffed.</i>
snub	An act of rebuffing or ignoring someone or something. <i>They snubbed his invitation to a meeting of foreign ministers.</i>
unconcerned	Showing a lack of worry or interest, especially when this is surprising or callous. <i>The average American is unconcerned that his or her plight is the result of a complex of personal and economic and governmental actions beyond the normal citizen s comprehension and control.</i>
undeserved	Not warranted, merited, or earned. <i>Has an undeserved reputation as a coward.</i>
unnoticed	Not noticed. <i>Hoped his departure had passed unnoticed.</i>
