<b><u>cheerful</u></b>	Pleasantly (even unrealistically) optimistic. <i><b>Cheerful</b> news.</i>
<b>condone</b>	Excuse, overlook, or make allowances for; be lenient with. <i>Those arrested were released and the exhibition was officially <b>condoned</b> a few weeks later.</i>
<b>connive</b>	Conspire to do something immoral, illegal, or harmful. <i>She <b>connived</b> with a senior official to rig the results of last year's election.</i>
<b><u>crass</u></b>	Showing no intelligence or sensitivity. <i>The <b>crass</b> assumptions that men make about women.</i>

<b><u>dismiss</u></b>	End one's encounter with somebody by causing or permitting the person to leave. <i>The prime minister <b>dismissed</b> five members of his cabinet.</i>
<b>disparagingly</b>	In a disparaging manner. <i>These mythological figures are described <b>disparagingly</b> as belonging only to a story.</i>
<b><u>downplay</u></b>	Represent as less significant or important. <i>This report <b>downplays</b> the seriousness of global warming.</i>
<b>education</b>	The United States federal department that administers all federal programs dealing with education including federal aid to educational institutions and students created 1979. <i>A course of <b>education</b>.</i>
<b>flatten</b>	Press (oneself or one's body) against a surface. <i><b>Flatten</b> a road.</i>
<b><u>forget</u></b>	Forget to do something. <i>I m sorry Cassie I <b>forget</b> myself.</i>
<b>ignore</b>	Refuse to take notice of or acknowledge; disregard intentionally. <i>The rules <b>ignore</b> one important principle of cricket.</i>
<b>intelligence</b>	Information about recent and important events. <i>Extraterrestrial <b>intelligences</b>.</i>
<b><u>irrelevant</u></b>	Having no bearing on or connection with the subject at issue. <i>An <b>irrelevant</b> comment.</i>
<b>leave</b>	Go and leave behind either intentionally or by neglect or forgetfulness. <i>I ll <b>leave</b> the door open.</i>
<b><u>lighthearted</u></b>	Carefree and happy and lighthearted. <i>Her <b>lighthearted</b> nature.</i>
<b><u>neglect</u></b>	The state of something that has been unused and neglected. <i>The house was in a terrible state of <b>neglect</b>.</i>
<b><u>obscurity</u></b>	The quality of being unclear or abstruse and hard to understand. <i>Poems of impenetrable <b>obscurity</b>.</i>
<b><u>omit</u></b>	Fail or neglect to do. <i>He modestly <b>omits</b> to mention that he was a pole vault champion.</i>
<b><u>optimistic</u></b>	Expecting the best. <i>The <b>optimistic</b> mood of the Sixties.</i>
<b><u>overlook</u></b>	Pass over (someone) in favour of another. <i>It s better if the property isn t <b>overlooked</b>.</i>

<b>potter</b>	A craftsman who shapes pottery on a potter s wheel and bakes them it a kiln. <i>An afternoon s <b>potter</b> through the rooms and possessions of the rich.</i>
<b>rebuff</b>	An abrupt or ungracious rejection of an offer, request, or friendly gesture. <i>Callers phoning a chatline need have no fear of <b>rebuff</b>.</i>
<b>repulse</b>	Drive back (an attack or attacker) by force. <i>Rioters tried to storm the Ministry but were <b>repulsed</b> by police.</i>
<b>repulsion</b>	A feeling of intense distaste or disgust. <i>People talk about the case with a mixture of fascination and <b>repulsion</b>.</i>
<b>scoff</b>	Treat with contemptuous disregard. <i>You a scientist he <b>scoffed</b>.</i>
<b>snub</b>	An act of rebuffing or ignoring someone or something. <i>They <b>snubbed</b> his invitation to a meeting of foreign ministers.</i>
<b>unconcerned</b>	Showing a lack of worry or interest, especially when this is surprising or callous. <i>The average American is <b>unconcerned</b> that his or her plight is the result of a complex of personal and economic and governmental actions beyond the normal citizen s comprehension and control.</i>
<b>undeserved</b>	Not warranted, merited, or earned. <i>Has an <b>undeserved</b> reputation as a coward.</i>
<b>unnoticed</b>	Not noticed. <i>Hoped his departure had passed <b>unnoticed</b>.</i>
