<b>break</b>	The act of breaking something. <i>The company has attempted to <b>break</b> the strike using non union labour.</i>
<b>cadaver</b>	A corpse. <i>The <b>cadaver</b> was intended for dissection.</i>
<b>cleave</b>	Split or sever (something), especially along a natural line or grain. <i>They watched a coot <b>cleave</b> the smooth water.</i>
<b>collate</b>	To assemble in proper sequence. <i>These accounts he <b>collated</b> with his own experience.</i>
<b>corpse</b>	The dead body of a human being. <i>He believed that fascism would revive the <b>corpse</b> of Europe.</i>
<b>deconstruct</b>	Analyse a text or linguistic or conceptual system by deconstruction. <i>I want to <b>deconstruct</b> this myth that poverty breeds crime.</i>
<b>dismember</b>	Cut off the limbs of (a person or animal). <i>The winning powers of World War I set out to <b>dismember</b> the Ottoman Empire.</i>
<b>dissatisfy</b>	Fail to satisfy (someone). <i>What is it about these words that dissatisfies you?</i>
<b>dissection</b>	Detailed critical analysis or examination one part at a time (as of a literary work). <i>This <b>dissection</b> of modern relationships.</i>
<b>evaluate</b>	Evaluate or estimate the nature quality ability extent or significance of. <i>How do you <b>evaluate</b> this grant proposal.</i>
<b>examine</b>	Question or examine thoroughly and closely. <i>A doctor <b>examined</b> me and said I might need a caesarean.</i>
<b>fracture</b>	Sustain a fracture of a bone. <i>The stone has <b>fractured</b>.</i>
<b>inquest</b>	A discussion or investigation into something that has happened, especially something undesirable. <i>An <b>inquest</b> by New York newspapers into a subway fire.</i>
<b>moiety</b>	Each of two parts into which a thing is or can be divided. <i>The enzyme removes the sulphate <b>moiety</b>.</i>
<b>morgue</b>	A mortuary. <i>The cadavers were bagged and removed to the city <b>morgue</b>.</i>
<b>parse</b>	An act of parsing a string or a text. <i>A user question input is <b>parsed</b> into an internal conceptual representation.</i>
<b>partition</b>	Divide a room into smaller rooms or areas by erecting partitions. <i>The hall was <b>partitioned</b> to contain the noise of the computers.</i>



<b>piece</b>	Slowly make sense of something from separate pieces of evidence. <i>He sacrificed a <b>piece</b> to get a strategic advantage.</i>
<b>postmortem</b>	An examination and dissection of a dead body to determine cause of death or the changes produced by disease. <i>The <b>postmortem</b> discussion of the President's TV address.</i>
<b>rend</b>	Wrench (something) violently. <i>Snapping teeth that would <b>rend</b> human flesh to shreds.</i>
<b>rive</b>	Split or tear apart violently. <i>The wood was <b>riven</b> with deep cracks.</i>
<b>segmentation</b>	The act of dividing or partitioning; separation by the creation of a boundary that divides or keeps apart. <i>The <b>segmentation</b> of society means that often we don't have arguments across the political divide.</i>
<b>sort</b>	Resolve (a problem or difficulty). <i>She served a creamy <b>sort</b> of dessert thing.</i>
<b><u>split</u></b>	A single thickness of split hide. <i>I could never do the <b>splits</b> before.</i>
