| deconstruct | Analyse a text or linguistic or conceptual system by deconstruction. <i>I want to deconstruct this myth that poverty breeds crime.</i> |
| dismember | Cut off the limbs of (a person or animal). <i>The winning powers of World War I set out to dismember the Ottoman Empire.</i> |
| dissatisfy | Fail to satisfy (someone). <i>What is it about these words that dissatisfies you?</i> |
| dissection | Detailed critical analysis or examination one part at a time (as of a literary work). <i>This dissection of modern relationships.</i> |
| evaluate | Evaluate or estimate the nature quality ability extent or significance of. <i>How do you evaluate this grant proposal.</i> |
| examine | Question or examine thoroughly and closely. <i>A doctor examined me and said I might need a caesarean.</i> |
| fracture | Sustain a fracture of a bone. <i>The stone has fractured.</i> |
| inquest | A discussion or investigation into something that has happened, especially something undesirable. <i>An inquest by New York newspapers into a subway fire.</i> |
| moiety | Each of two parts into which a thing is or can be divided. <i>The enzyme removes the sulphate moiety.</i> |
| morgue | A mortuary. <i>The cadavers were bagged and removed to the city morgue.</i> |
| parse | An act of parsing a string or a text. <i>A user question input is parsed into an internal conceptual representation.</i> |
| partition | Divide a room into smaller rooms or areas by erecting partitions. <i>The hall was partitioned to contain the noise of the computers.</i> |

| rend | Wrench (something) violently. <i>Snapping teeth that would rend human flesh to shreds.</i> |
| rive | Split or tear apart violently. <i>The wood was riven with deep cracks.</i> |
| segmentation | The act of dividing or partitioning; separation by the creation of a boundary that divides or keeps apart. <i>The segmentation of society means that often we don't have arguments across the political divide.</i> |
| sort | Resolve (a problem or difficulty). <i>She served a creamy sort of dessert thing.</i> |
| <u>split</u> | A single thickness of split hide. <i>I could never do the splits before.</i> |
